In many ways 2021 was a continuation of 2020 with many of the same challenges we faced as a county.

Luckily Grow Wabash County was again able to rise above the challenges and to achieve many great accomplishments throughout the year.

Once again, we can be proud of the resiliency and perseverance of Wabash County both as individuals and collectively. Through the ongoing challenges, Grow Wabash County kept a focus on many activities essential to the success and growth of our county and businesses.

Grow Wabash County assisted individuals improve their skills by leveraging over \$311,000 in workforce training funds. Specifically, Grow Wabash County facilitated awarding \$85,793 in local scholarships to 37 Wabash County residents to attend training courses with grants from Community Foundation of Wabash County and the Wabash County United Fund.

Grow Wabash County also worked on behalf of 13 projects in Wabash County to help secure \$50 Million in READI grants for NE Indiana. In addition, Grow Wabash County has worked on the housing issue with the City of Wabash, Town of North Manchester and county to develop new housing prospects. One visible sign of this is the purchase and demolition of East Market Street in Wabash, to prepare for a new housing project.

Lastly, Grow Wabash County continued working on the population initiative in the county, co-chairing work with the Community Foundation of Wabash County. The results of which will soon be released to the public with recommendations and actions for follow up.

We look forward to what 2022 brings and the many achievements throughout the county that will make Wabash County more prosperous.

Mid-America EDC Entrepreneurship Award

During its annual conference in December 2021, the Mid-America EDC presented its 2021 Entrepreneurship Award for Small Communities to Grow Wabash County for our ongoing work in developing a comprehensive network of programming and support for student entrepreneurs through the Wabash County High School Entrepreneurship Collaborative.



Duke Energy Excellence in Economic Development Partner Achievement Award

Our President and CEO, Keith Gillenwater, was presented with an award by Duke Energy in 2021 to recognize the incredible work being done by the Grow Wabash County team, especially in regards to the work done to attract talent, business, and investment to Wabash County and Northeast Indiana.

Hoosier By Choice

Chelsea Boulrisse, our project manager, became a familiar face across the state in 2021 after being selected as one of the first Hoosiers By Choice to be featured in the state's talent attraction campaign. In 2021, our project manager, Chelsea Boulrisse, completed a Microsoft Excel training course to increase her efficiency to track metrics and data relevant to our organization and investors. Chelsea also attended a workshop series led by Content Creative about how to build better marketing campaigns to share the Grow Wabash County brand and mission.



Grant Awards for 2021

Don Wood Foundation Grant - \$21,000

Grow Wabash County was once again fortunate enough to partner with the Don Wood Foundation (formerly the 80/20 Foundation Trust) to continue our work to promote student entrepreneurship in Wabash County. With the funds provided by the Foundation, Grow Wabash County purchased an extensive library of books from Dave Ramsay's EntreLeadership series. Every school received 100 books and an additional set was purchased for community use at the Grow Wabash County office.

The funds were also used to renew the license for the CO.STARTERS Generator curriculum and pay upfront costs for the 2022 INnovate Wabash County pitch competition.

Wabash County United Fund Grant #1 - \$15,000

Much of the success of filling Spring 2021 training programs was due to the \$15,000 in grant funding awarded to Grow Wabash County by the Wabash County United Fund to provide scholarships to applicants that were negatively affected by COVID-19 and were in search of a chance to skill up and find a higher-wage job. In total, the WCUF grant helped pay tuition for 4 students that were financially negatively impacted by COVID19. These participants participated in the following courses: two welding students (\$3,750 each), one CNC Machining Student (\$3,000) and one CDL Driving Student (\$4,500). In the Spring of 2021, GWC and its partners successfully filled several classes including: MSSC-CPT Industrial Maintenance course (March 30), Computer Numerical Control (CNC) Machining course (May 17), and a Welding course (June 8th). We have also helped connect people with trainings to become an EMT or receive their Class A CDL license.

Wabash County United Fund Grant #2 - \$15,000

GWC was able to remove barriers completely again for four additional Wabash County residents that did not qualify for other funding avenues whom were all negatively impacted by COVID19 thanks to the generous support of the Wabash County United Fund. As a result, we completely expended the \$15,000 awarded to us through the Basic and Essential Needs R3 Workforce Grant. These scholars included: two welding certifications students, one Certified Clinical Medical Assistant (CCMA) certification student, and one Computer Numerical Control (CNC) Machining certification student scholarships. Award recipients noted that in addition to the trainings, these classes help obtained knowledge to better perform at their current job, obtained a pay raise from their existing employer at current job, received a promotion or new job opportunity at current employer, and/or found a new career opportunity at a new employer or within a new industry.

Community Foundation of Wabash County Workforce Grant - \$35,000

The primary use for this grant was to develop our local workforce through the removal of financial barriers for Wabash County residents looking to pursue professional certifications in a variety of high-demand skills and industries.

We were able to successfully expend the entire \$35,000 to cover tuition costs for 36 Wabash County residents that pursued certifications in CDL A licensure (3); Lean Six Sigma (1); Certified Clinical Medical Assistance (1); Welding (12); Chimney Sweeping (2); EMT (11) and CNC Machining (6).

Almost 40% of applicants stated that they had been negatively impacted by COVID, with several stating that they had lost their jobs or had their hours severely cut during the pandemic and 79% of applicants were identified as low-to-moderate income individuals, despite most working full-time hours.

In addition to providing access to education, the grants also helped major employers looking to fill empty positions with newly certified candidates eager to take on these high-wage jobs.

Duke Energy Marketing Grant - \$5,000

Duke Energy and Grow Wabash County enjoy an incredible partnership that has spanned several years. In 2021, Duke Energy awarded Grow Wabash County marketing grant funds to purchase the LinkedIn Insights software and provide training for that software for Tenille Zartman, vice president of Grow Wabash County.

As Wabash County explores opportunities to grow its population and attract talent to our communities, this software will allow Grow Wabash County to connect with and attract potential newcomers.

Wabash County High School Entrepreneurship Collaborative

Grow Wabash County firmly believes that innovation has no age requirement. In 2021, Grow Wabash County was able to expand and consolidate its many efforts to promote student entrepreneurship through the development of the Wabash County High School Entrepreneurship Collaborative. Through the Collaborative, supported in part by grant funding from the Don Wood Foundation, Grow Wabash County was able to provide our local schools with a robust variety of resources and programs to support entrepreneurship in the classroom.

CO.STARTERS Generator

When speaking with the business educators at our local high schools, their main feedback was the need for a structured, mainstreamed curriculum that allowed every teacher to use the same concepts, vocabulary and best practices with their students. The Generator curriculum from CO.STARTERS is geared toward students, breaking down the important concepts and processes for starting a business. Every business educator was trained to become a licensed CO.STARTERS instructor and was provided the materials and workbooks to teach the Generator curriculum in class.

STARTed UP Chapter

At the beginning of the 2021-2022 academic year, Grow Wabash County helped launch northeast Indiana's first chapter of the STARTed UP Foundation. Every month, 25 freshmen and sophomores from each Wabash County high school meet in the Grow Wabash County conference room to work together to brainstorm solutions for challenges presented by guest speakers. The goal of this program is to empower students to think and work critically and collaboratively and teach them how to professionally present (or pitch) their ideas to a prospective client.

Guest speakers for this program have included: Grow Wabash County, Arc of Wabash County, Transform Consulting Group, Small Business Development Center, Wabash County Solid Waste Management.



EntreLeadership Library

In the interest of providing even more opportunities to teach and inspire student entrepreneurs, Grow Wabash County purchased a complete collection of books from Dave Ramsey's EntreLeadership series. Over 600 books were purchased and delivered to all five Wabash County high schools. An additional library of the books will also be located at the Grow Wabash County office for use by entrepreneurs of all ages.

INnovate Wabash County Pitch Competition

After being forced to cancel our 2020 competition, the INnovate Wabash County student pitch competition made its triumphant return in 2021!

By using the CO.STARTERS canvas outline and the Generator curriculum, entrepreneurship students went through the process from idea to business pitch, learning about important topics along the way such as funding, target audiences and marketing.

Once their ideas were solidified, every student team was given a \$100 Visa gift card to use as seed money for their business. Some students used the money to create merchandise and marketing pieces, while others invested it into their business ventures to purchase equipment or products that allowed them to operate as an actual business.

On April 28, 2021, 17 student teams, representing every Wabash County high school, pitched their business ideas to a panel of local business owners, mentors and professionals on stage at the Eagles Theatre.

While the top four teams won \$5,000 in total cash prizes, none of the students walked away empty-handed. Manchester University presented every student that competed with a \$500 scholarship to attend MU. Ivy Tech Community College also awarded the first place team with vouchers to take one free course.

Certification Training Programs

It became clear in 2021 that in this post-pandemic "new normal," that there was a clear deficit of skilled workers, especially in health care and manufacturing, leaving many key roles at local companies vacant. Grow Wabash County responded by working with educational partners in and around Wabash County to develop and launch a series of classes to help people earn certifications in high-demand skills.

As a result, Grow Wabash County launched 9 certification programs in the following disciplines:

- CNC Mill & Lathe Operation
- Gas Arc Welding
- Certified Clinical Medical Assistant
- MSSC-CPT Industrial Maintenance
- Class A CDL Licensure

These courses were developed in partnership with Freedom Academy, Ivy Tech Community College and Heartland Career Center.

Scholarships

Grow Wabash County spent a great deal of effort to remove financial barriers for as many Wabash County residents as possible looking to attend these training programs and receive industry certifications.

Our organization leveraged over \$311,000 in direct financial assistance for Wabash County residents. GWC helped many of the students qualify for funding through the state's Next Level Jobs program, and an additional \$85,793 was awarded in local scholarships to 37 recipients thanks to grants awarded to GWC by Wabash County United Fund and Community Foundation of Wabash County.

In addition to providing scholarships for people to attend the various certification trainings developed in part by Grow Wabash County, funding was also awarded to Wabash County residents pursuing specialized programs including EMT training and Chimney Sweep certification.

Success Story - Jake Collis



Jake Collis attended a Welding course facilitated by Ivy Tech Community College thanks to a scholarship from Grow Wabash County.

Before taking the course, Jake had a general understanding of welding and could carry out basic welding projects, but Jake was hoping to expand his skills in welding, knowing the doors it would open up for him professionally.

As luck would have it, Jake found out about the welding course and the scholarships available through Grow Wabash County through social media and knew it was a sign that he needed to pursue this further. The opportunity to have it all paid for was too good of a chance to pass up.

Now, Jake is certified in welding and has already been able to put these advanced skills to good use at 10X. The jobs he used to do before with hesitancy he is able to carry out with confidence knowing they are done correctly and will help his team and 10X become more effective and efficient in their business.

His advice to anyone considering pursuing a certification course in welding, or in any sort of trade that is popular right now, is to "get on it" He believes "knowledge is power" and if there are opportunities to take a course and maybe even get it paid for by a local organization, employer or state program, than there is no reason to not do it.

Hiring Support

Not only did Grow Wabash County help grow the local skilled workforce, we also helped local employers, of all sizes, better connect with that workforce and find the ideal candidates to fill their vacancies.

Job Postings

In 2021, we posted close to 100 jobs for 33 Grow Wabash County investors, and the Job Directory was one of top pages visited on our website, averaging around 125 page views per month.

We also utilized our social media channels to promote open jobs advertised by our investors as well as the GWC Job Directory, many posts resulted in dozens of shares, likes and comments to further spread the word about these exciting job opportunities in Wabash County.

Manufacturing Job Fair

Grow Wabash County teamed up with WorkOne Northeast and Northeast Indiana Works in Fall 2021 to host a Manufacturing Job Fair. On Tuesday, Sept. 28, 2021, 12 major employers from the Wabash County manufacturing sector, all of which were eager to fill their job openings with skilled applicants, hosted a booth at the Heartland REMC building.

To garner excitement for the event, Grow Wabash County enlisted the help of Nick's Dog Cart and WKUZ KISS FM to set up at the event and help draw more people to the job fair.

Over 100 people attended the job fair, including students from Heartland Career Center looking to build rapport and network with employers that could hire them on in the near future as interns, apprentices or full-time employees.



Heartland Learning Center Project

The **Heartland Learning Center** received **\$5 million** from the **Economic Development Administration** and Grow Wabash County has been working closely with HLC to raise the required 20% match locally. This expansion will allow our footprint to grow by constructing a **37,000 square foot** building to create an adult education center that will offer advanced manufacturing and health credentials.

Leadership Development Wabash County

After a hiatus due to COVID-19, Leadership Development Wabash County made its triumphant return in October 2021 with 25 emerging leaders, with a few notable changes made behind the scenes. Following the retirement of Jim Smith, Grow Wabash County's Vice President, Tenille Zartman, took up the reins as program facilitator. The program signed a contract with Indiana University of Kokomo, allowing professors from the IU network to present a variety of topics related to leadership.

Other guests, including Sue Roesner Chapman, Anthony Juliano and Carrie Gillenwater, have also presented their own perspectives on how to be effective leaders.

The cohort was also tasked with using the Strategic Doing method to select community service projects that best fit each group's talents, passions and resources.

This cohort also included Bailey Roberts, the inaugural recipient of the Jim Smith Scholarship, which allowed for her to attend the program at no cost to her.

Young Professionals of Wabash County

The Young Professionals of Wabash County stayed busy in 2021 by finding new and creative ways to encourage local young professionals and emerging leaders to engage with each other and their communities. The launch of the Board Engagement survey has allowed YP to be the connector between young people looking to be more involved and organizations in search of new talent on their boards and committees.

The YPWC Steering Committee organized a robust slate of events that invited YPs to explore Wabash County more.

This year's events took young professionals to Lagro to hike at the Kokiwanee Nature Preserve, to North Manchester to promote YP at the Manchester University Involvement Fair, and even onto the Wabash River via White Rock Recreation canoes and to help out during the annual River Clean-Up.

We also helped many local entrepreneurs and business professionals celebrate their success by hosting events at Jojo's OI Factory & Co., 950 Speakeasy Bistro, BABE of Wabash County, and Market Street Grill.

Thanks to a \$5,000 Good Deeds grant awarded to YPWC by the Community Foundation of Wabash County, 2022 is slated to be another exciting year, featuring more events to connect our young and emerging leaders to each other and the Wabash County community at large.

Housing Committee

Grow Wabash County leads several housing development efforts in conjunction with our local partners across Wabash County. Since its inception, Grow Wabash County has partnered with and advised the Town of North Manchester on its Chester Heights subdivision which is underway and has several houses already constructed with more on the way in 2021.

Grow Wabash County also leads the City of Wabash's Housing Committee, which is comprised of a group of community stakeholders who advise Mayor Long and Grow Wabash County on needs, wants, and various other aspects as related to housing need in our community.

We currently have several housing projects underway – the redevelopment of the former Parkview Legacy Site, the development of the GDX site as we progress through the environmental remediation of the land, and several other properties that have been identified as potential housing projects. At least one of these projects should move forward and break ground in mid-2021.

Grow Wabash County also partnered with Indiana Landmarks and pledged **\$10,000** payable in 2021 to preserve 6 of the most historic houses and architecturally significant homes in a concentrated area out of 23 that came up for auction in City of Wabash in fall of 2020.

Finally, Grow Wabash County and our supporting foundation the Wabash County Business Alliance Foundation, Inc., in partnership with Mayor Scott Long & the City of Wabash have been working to acquire and redevelop the northside of East Market St between Allen and Huntington Streets. As of this writing, we own most of the properties on that street, and with the help of the City of Wabash Street Department have removed most of the structures.

Once we finish the property acquisition process in Spring 2021, we will start an RFI process to redevelop the site into premium market-rate urban residential homes.


Attraction and Newcomers Efforts


As Grow Wabash County and its many partners expanded their efforts to attract new families and young professionals to the community,
