EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

PROCESS OVERVIEW

In January 2024, the Indiana Office of Community and Rural Affairs (OCRA) launched the Stellar Pathways Program, building off of the previous reiterations of the Stellar Communities Program. The Stellar Pathways Program is a multi-agency, multi-million-dollar investment initiative created to provide resources for transformative quality of place improvements. This program promotes local and regional partnerships and is intended to assist two regions in implementing sustainable solutions to challenges faced by Indiana's rural communities.

In May 2024, Wabash County, including all five municipalities, submitted a Letter of Intent documenting our interest and qualifications for the program. On June 18, 2024, Lt. Gov. Suzanne Crouch and the Indiana Office of Community and Rural Affairs announced four regions as finalists for the 2024 Stellar Pathways Program.

As a finalist, Wabash County developed this Strategic Investment Plan (SIP) which identifies 14 projects and programs that would be completed during the five-year Stellar Pathways designation period. The Wabash County Strategic Investment Plan builds on the ideas and input generated from recent planning efforts including the Imagine One 85 county-wide comprehensive plan and Manchester Together, a College and Community Collaborative Initiative facilitated through the Lilly Endowment.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Providing frequent and transparent ways to get involved and share input has been one of the primary tools for building our culture of collaboration and a sense of ownership in Wabash County. While our region understands and values the engagement process, the timeline of the 2024 Stellar Pathways program was such that several methods were needed to gather input quickly. Throughout this process, community engagement and outreach were primary goals; however, this strategic plan also relied heavily on past planning efforts.

A few key highlights from this SIP process includes –

- Members of the development team attended and distributed project materials at four community events during the month of September.
- An online survey, available in both English and Spanish, received over 300 responses.
- Nearly 300 people attended the public open house and Grow Wabash County Annual Celebration Dinner.
- Members of the development team facilitated stakeholder meetings with Spanish-speaking immigrants, the Amish community, and university students.

OUR GOALS & DESIRED ACHIEVEMENTS

As a region, Wabash County intends to use the Stellar Pathways designation to execute projects and programs that improve the quality of life and place as an approach to stabilizing the population. Wabash County has been acutely aware of the dangers of population loss in the region and the many negative effects that it brings.

- Declining school enrollment, which affects funding, programmatic offerings, and the tone amongst the students and staff, is a huge threat to the community.
- A shrinking workforce, coupled with macroeconomic shifts from a predominantly manufacturing-centric workforce has stressed our largest employment sector.
- A declining customer base for all the small businesses our region has come to enjoy and depend upon are struggling.

Furthermore, increasing taxes and fees burden those still here to pay for the necessary infrastructure, utilities, and services that a community needs. These ill effects of population decline are the biggest threat and challenge to Wabash County's resiliency.

Secondly, Wabash County intends to use the Stellar Pathways designation to execute projects and programs that make this region a welcoming place for all – regardless of demographics, socioeconomic status, and abilities. This designation would support the county's effort to provide more equitable and inclusive opportunities.

While our goals are shared, we recognize that each of our communities plays a unique role in advancing and achieving these accomplishments. Attracting and retaining residents and creating a welcoming place for all doesn't happen in a vacuum. There isn't one thing that will lead to success, but this designation would allow us to continue building momentum and capacity at both individual and county-wide scales. Together, we will use the resources and funding the Stellar Pathways program provides to implement initiatives that move the needle on the two regional accomplishments listed above.

OUR STELLAR PROJECTS & PROGRAMS

At the kick-off of the strategic planning process, the development team prepared a list of 30 projects and programs. These projects were previously identified through community conversations and local leadership needs. This master project list was organized by "funding buckets" provided by the seven state agency partners. It quickly became apparent that the development team needed a methodology for narrowing down and prioritizing the master project list. This prioritization process included completing a feasibility matrix, reviewing funding source qualifications, vetting the projects with the public, and then classifying the projects.

Once the Stellar projects were identified, the development team wanted to find a way to showcase the other project and program ideas from the original master project list. It was important to the development team not to lose track of these ideas. With that being said, a classification system was created. This system classifies each initiative as one of three categories — a Stellar project, a supporting project, or a complementary project.

Through public engagement and a thoughtful prioritization process, Wabash County has identified 14 Stellar projects, 21 supporting projects, and 8 complementary projects. Our proposed projects and programs have been selected for their ability to improve quality of life and plan and provide more equitable opportunities for current and future residents. Wabash County has identified the following initiatives.

OUR ASK

We believe the proposed initiatives within this Strategic Investment Plan align well with our regional goals, the goals of the Stellar Pathways program, and the priorities and funding sources provided by the state agency partners.

Our proposed Stellar Pathways initiatives are estimated to invest just over \$12.4M in Wabash County. As a result of our region's responsible fiscal management, preparation for future opportunities, and development of strong regional partnerships, the municipalities and private investors are positioned to provide a match of over \$4.5M from leveraged resources.

The momentum provided as part the Stellar Pathways designation will serve as the needed catalyst to move the projects forward in a timelier manner. The Stellar Pathways program is value-added to the Wabash County region and will serve as a starting point, not an end destination. Each of our participating communities are committed to excellence and elevating the quality of life within our communities. This is evident by the resources we have identified and committed to support the proposed initiatives.

The completion of these projects will continue to leverage additional investment in our region, which will be further enhanced by the marketing and promotion of the projects post-completion.

Wabash County's recent success in pursuing various grant opportunities, the local units of government financial stability, facilitating public-private partnerships, and the enormous level of generosity from the philanthropic community allows Wabash County to make an immediate impact even without the resources from the Stellar Pathways Program. While we are well-positioned to move initiatives through the

implementation process, our region will be much stronger with the state agencies as our partners. Together, we can make a greater impact.

PROCESS ASSESSMENT

By definition, an assessment involves the act of reviewing or judging the amount, value, quality, or importance of something. For Wabash County, the region has already seen the impacts of the Stellar Communities Program and recognizes the pivotal role that the 2014 Stellar Designation played in fostering growth and vitality within the City of Wabash. Because of this, all five incorporated areas were eager to join the county in preparing and submitting the Letter of Intent in early 2024.

This momentum has continued to build over the last several months as the region prepared the Strategic Investment Plan. Through this process, there have been both pivotal moments worth celebrating, and lessons learned worth documenting that have impacted the process, the regional goals and the identified projects. Each of these moments continue to improve the culture of collaboration and sense of ownership in Wabash County.

MOMENTS TO CELEBRATE

Selected as a Stellar Pathways Finalist

In June 2024, our region was designated as one of four Stellar Pathways finalists. This moment solidified all of the hard work our region has done over the last several years. This designation was earned by years of planning and preparing for an opportunity like this one. We wouldn't be where we are today without the leaders, organizations, and residents that have come together to improve quality of life and grow our population.

Established Partnerships

Imagine One 85, the 2021 county-wide comprehensive planning process brought each of our communities to the table, as well as our various community support organizations including Grow Wabash County, Community Foundation of Wabash County, Visit Wabash County, Manchester Alive, and our Main Street organizations. Because of this earlier collaborative process, our region had a development team established and actively working well before the 2024 Stellar Pathways Finalists were announced. This leadership group has been meeting monthly since 2022.

Project Preparedness

The development team came to the first Stellar Pathways meeting with a list of 30 potential projects and programs already identified from past planning and public engagement efforts. The list provided a starting point for the team to begin collecting additional public input and vetting these initial ideas once again. This alone demonstrates that our region possesses the leadership and structure necessary to successfully execute projects that have an immediate and long-lasting impact on the region's future.

Project Fairness and Distribution

Wabash County has cultivated a culture of mutual respect and shared goals, which ensures that every partner in every corner of Wabash County has the opportunity to benefit from the planned growth and investment proposed for the region. Because the City of Wabash has already gone through this process once, they have experienced firsthand the impacts of the program. Through this education and experience, the City of Wabash is advocating for improvements and investment elsewhere. Our communities and regional partners recognize that growth anywhere in the county benefits all of us.

Identification of a Common Theme

Members of our development team attended the Ball State ICI Workshop on August 12, 2024. This workshop encouraged our region to think about projects in terms of community capital and asset mapping. These exercises led to a "light bulb" moment for our team. Through the collaborative activities offered during the Workshop, the development team identified that all of the proposed projects being considered for the Stellar Pathways Program within Wabash County were related to supporting our residents - especially under-served groups. This common theme became the ribbon that tied the story together for Wabash County.

LESSONS LEARNED

Scheduling

Because our development team includes a diverse group of community officials and organizations, finding a convenient time to meet has proven to be difficult. The development team has done three things to combat this challenge. First, meetings are offered in both in-person and virtual formats. Second, all meetings are summarized and distributed to the team. Input did not stop at the end of the meeting; if an individual had additional thoughts to share, the consultant team was always available. Lastly, the development team set up recurring meetings that happened on the same day and time to help make coordination and meetings a bit more predictable.

Importance of Project Champions

A project champion can be anyone who wants to advocate for, and support, the development of an initiative. In most instances, each participating municipality had several project champions which significantly impacted the project's momentum and feasibility. In instances where the project, or community, did not have a strong set of project champions, the region was more apprehensive about its ability to succeed. To combat this challenge, the development team brainstormed potential partnerships for projects that could use additional support. Identifying and engaging project champions is key to successful project implementation.

REGIONAL VISION AND GOALS

In June 2019, a coalition of leaders from all sectors joined in an unprecedented county-wide collaboration called Imagine One 85. This group, and the larger initiative, focuses on Wabash County and includes the City of Wabash and the Towns of North Manchester, Roann, Lagro, and La Fontaine, along with all unincorporated land. Imagine One 85 was a community-driven effort that established a strategic vision for the people of Wabash County and developed a road map for growth and investment for decades to come.

After two years of a rigorous community-wide strategic planning process, Imagine One 85 casts a vision for the future of our entire County and outlines strategies to make our community a more attractive place to live, ultimately reversing our population decline. Through the Imagine One 85 planning process, the region gathered input from over 1,000 community stakeholders across the County that shaped the vision, goals, and action items that work towards Wabash County being the best place to call home. The county-wide vision and four topic area themes identified within the plan serve as the foundation for this strategic investment plan (SIP).

VISION STATEMENT

The following statement outlines the unified aspirations for the quality of life and place across all of the communities:

"We are Mighty Wabash County Rising... We, the communities of Wabash County, are connected, resilient, and growing. We are open, welcoming, and prosperous. Our spirit, like our natural resources, is flourishing and vibrant. Leadership shines bright in our county. We produce and attract energetic and capable young citizens. Wabash County is a great place to live, work, and learn. Residents and visitors thrive here."

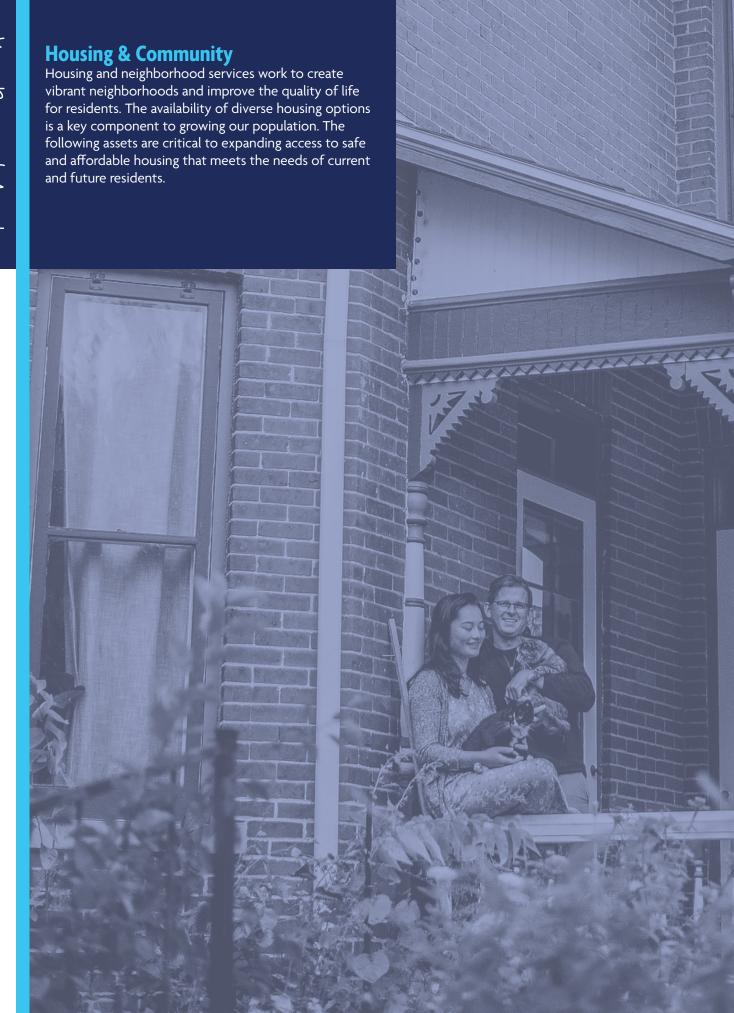

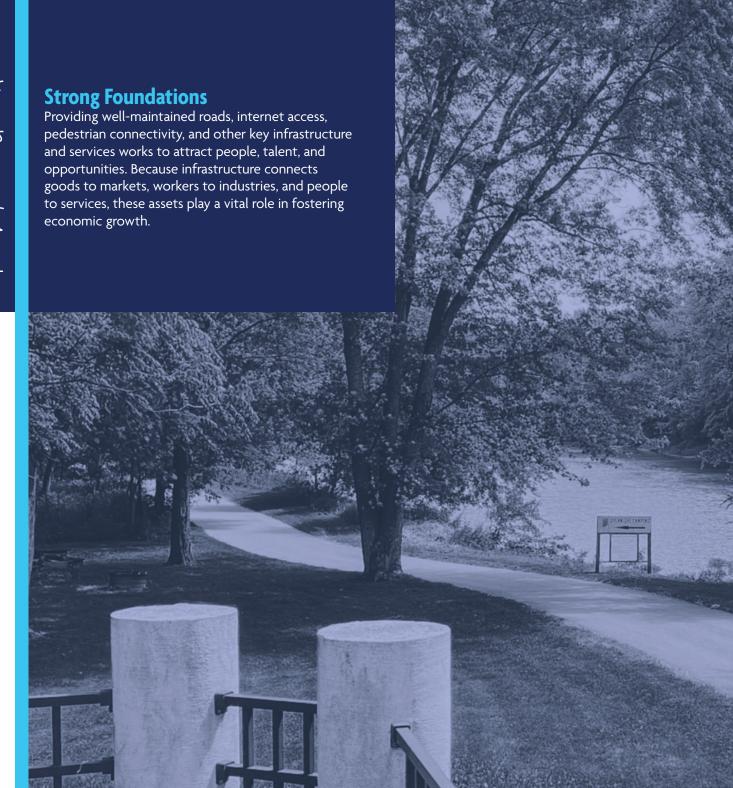

KEY ACCOMPLISHMENTS

As a region, Wabash County intends to use the Stellar Pathways designation to execute projects and programs that improve the quality of life and place as an approach to stabilizing the population. Wabash County has been acutely aware of the dangers of population loss in the region and the many negative effects that it brings.

- Declining school enrollment, which affects funding, programmatic offerings, and the tone amongst the students and staff is a huge threat to the community.
- A shrinking workforce, coupled with macroeconomic shifts from a predominantly manufacturing-centric workforce has stressed our largest employment sector.
- A declining customer base for all of the small businesses that our region has come to enjoy and depend upon are struggling.

Furthermore, increasing taxes and fees burden those still here to pay for the necessary infrastructure, utilities, and services that a community needs. These ill effects of population decline are the biggest threat and challenge to Wabash County's resiliency.

Secondly, Wabash County intends to use the Stellar Pathways designation to execute projects and programs that make this region a welcoming place for all – regardless of demographics, socioeconomic status, and abilities. This designation would support the county's effort to provide more equitable and inclusive opportunities.

While our goals are shared, we recognize that each of our communities plays a unique role in advancing and achieving these accomplishments. Attracting and retaining residents and creating a welcoming place for all doesn't happen in a vacuum. There isn't one thing that will lead to success, but this designation would allow us to continue building momentum and capacity at both individual and county-wide scales. Together, we will use the resources and funding the Stellar Pathways program provides to implement initiatives that move the needle on the **two regional accomplishments** previously identified.

What does each municipality want to achieve?

There are a variety of methods for attracting and retaining residents and businesses. Our region is striving to provide high-quality programs, infrastructure, housing, and quality of life amenities as an approach to growing our population. 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ACHIEVING OUR GOALS

HOW WILL THE STELLAR DESIGNATION ENABLE THE REGION TO FURTHER IMPLEMENT THE REGION'S GOALS?

Since the adoption and early implementation efforts of Imagine One 85 Plan, Wabash County has posted three consecutive years (2021-2023) of positive net migration and demonstrated progress in over 80% of the action agenda items from the comprehensive plan, but there is still more work to do. With the additional support and funding provided by the Stellar Pathways program, the Wabash County region would have the resources to execute several of the projects and ideas that were born out of the Imagine One 85 Plan to make an immediate and long-lasting impact on the future of Wabash County.

REGIONAL GOAL #1 | GREAT PLACES

A range of diverse and beautiful environments – thriving town centers, productive agricultural lands, verdant natural spaces – that, collectively, define Wabash County.

Within the county's comprehensive plan, there are 26 supporting action items identified under this goal. This designation would enable the region to complete, or make progress towards, seven specific action items that work to enhance community character and physical connections. The following action items are directly related to one of the projects or programs identified within this SIP.

Implementable Action Items –

- Support continued reinvestment in Downtown Lagro.
- Pursue the North Manchester Riverfront redevelopment project.
- Continue to build access and use of the Eel and Wabash Rivers.
- Study the impact of tile drainage on local flooding.
- Build a community park in Roann.
- Continue to support the County's commitment to a diverse, equitable, and inclusive community for all.
- Improve connections between the University and Main Street in North Manchester.

REGIONAL GOAL #2 | PEOPLE & PROSPERITY

A strong and growing network of communities built through their commitment to competitive and lifelong education, support for entrepreneurs and local businesses, and investment into bold projects and initiatives

Because of the nature of these topics, the majority of the action items are programs and/or planning related tasks. While the action items aren't directly related to the proposed built projects, each of the Stellar projects strive to address two key objectives that fall under this goal including:

- Elevate an environment to develop, attract, and retain talent.
- Advocate for improving personal prosperity, health, and safety.

REGIONAL GOAL #3 | HOUSING AND COMMUNITY

A healthy housing system with a wide range of options, safe and attractive neighborhoods, and choices for residents of all ages and lifestyles.

Within the county's comprehensive plan, there are 18 supporting action items identified under this goal. This designation would enable the region to complete, or make progress towards, four action items. The following action items are directly related to one of the projects or programs identified within this SIP.

Implementable Action Items –

- Expand housing options for students and workers.
- Align resources and regulations to support infill development.
- Establish a county-wide Community Housing Development Organization (CHDO).
- Identify opportunities for quality affordable housing.

REGIONAL GOAL #4 | FOUNDATIONS

A reliable base of enabling infrastructure helps to connect, grow, and protect our communities, while also supporting logical investments that expand opportunities for residents and businesses

Within the county's comprehensive plan, there are 15 supporting action items identified under this goal. This designation would enable the region to complete, or make progress towards, four action items. The following action items are directly related to one of the projects or programs identified within this SIP.

Implementable Action Items –

- Increase funding for maintenance of local roads and bridges, and continue pursuing matching funds.
- Pursue a phased approach to improving downtown streetscapes in Wabash and North Manchester.
- Increase wastewater capacity and utility access.
- Improve County Road 1200 N (SR-114) in North Manchester to include complete street accommodations.

Our region has demonstrated progress in over **80%** of the action items, but there is still more to do.

This designation would help us implement **15** additional action items from our county-wide comprehensive plan.

Even with the county's declining population trends, the region has a history of generously supporting projects that add value to our local communities. We recognize that achieving our long-term goals will require the creative use of limited public dollars and the willingness to implement new and alternative revenue sources. The Imagine One 85 Plan includes a fiscal review of each municipality and recommendations for how the county can grow its tax base and revenues.

Successful strategic investment plans require an understanding of a community's fiscal capacity to ensure that a realistic action plan is recommended for the future. Highlights from the Imagine One 85 fiscal review are provided below:

Assessed Value

Overall, each municipality (except for Lagro) has seen an increase in the average annual tax base between 2015 and 2022. While the average annual increase ranges from 0.8% to 2.0%, Lagro has experienced a net reduction in tax base since 2016. Slow tax base appreciation limits the town's ability to generate new revenues without increasing property taxes.

Year End Cash

A strong year-end cash balance allows municipalities to meet cash flow needs, complete scheduled projects, and provide resources in the case of an emergency or disruption in revenue. Looking at the past five years, each municipality (except for Roann) has experienced an average increase ranging from 11-16% per year in its year-end cash balance. On average, Roann has experienced a 2% decrease each year since 2018.

Fulfilling Match

All participating communities, The City of Wabash, and towns of North Manchester, Lagro, Roann, and La Fontaine, are aware of the match commitments and understand their requirements to fulfill any funding matches required for their community. Wabash County has demonstrated a strong track record of fulfilling all match requirements in a wide variety of Community initiatives. Within the last 3 years, we have successfully facilitated 29 state and federal grants that have total over \$7.7M in funding. A detailed list of completed projects is provided on page 57.

Funding Sources

Economic pressures and declining population trends cause local community and county budgets to be constricted making it challenging to plan for and incorporate long-term capital improvements and maintenance expenses. To combat these challenges, the leaders of Wabash County and the municipalities are continually seeking traditional and alternative funding and implementation tools. The list below provides a high-level assessment of the types of federal, state, local, and private funding opportunities that have been used to close the gaps in recent years.

- State and Federal Funding and Technical Resources - These tools include but are not limited to tax abatement, tax credits, tax increment financing, and revolving loan funds.
- Local Public Funding and Technical Resources These tools include but are not limited to bonds, capital improvement planning, impact fees, and user rates.
- Local Private and Philanthropic Fundings These tools include but are not limited to public / private partnerships, donations and capital campaigns, and sponsorships.

Wabash County also has two local endowments that provide critical philanthropic funds to our community. The Honeywell Foundation is a nonprofit organization dedicated to bringing arts, education, and entertainment to all. This organization led the rehabilitation of the Eagle's Theater - one of Wabash's 2014 Stellar Projects. The Community Foundation of Wabash County is another foundation with a permanent and accessible endowment for charitable purposes dedicated to the betterment of the community.

LEADERSHIP CAPACITY

Grow Wabash County

Grow Wabash County, the county-wide economic development and chamber of commerce, is serving as the lead entity for the Stellar Pathways Program and will continue to be the thread that pulls all these partners and programs together alongside Imagine One 85 and the development team. Their leadership in staffing and project management will ensure the successful execution of identified projects and programs from the Strategic Investment Plan. With a staff of five individuals and a board of 15 members, Grow Wabash County is committed tackling the bigpicture challenges facing Wabash County. Between 2023 and 2024, this organization secured nearly \$500,000 in private investment.

Imagine One 85 Director

In 2022, the county created a position specifically for community engagement and plan implementation. If selected as a Stellar Pathway designee, the Imagine One 85 Director can take on a similar role for the Stellar process. This type of leadership position is unique to our region and ensures an individual is dedicated to moving projects forward.

Development Team

Serving under Grow Wabash County and Imagine One 85, there is a development team made up of 10 individuals with representation from each participating municipality. This leadership group was tasked with guiding the development of the Strategic Investment Plan and will continue to meet monthly through the five-year designation period. The development team serves as the liaison between the lead entity and the municipalities.

This organizational structure illustrates our region's commitment to maintaining transparency in decision-making, providing opportunities to strengthen our regional participation, and providing equitable opportunities for enhancements across the county.

SUPPORT BEYOND OUR BORDERS

Just as important as our local partners, it is critical to sustain partnerships with neighboring regions and state agencies.

Regional Partnerships

Wabash County has been a regional partner in northeast Indiana for over a decade – this is evident through our participation in the state's Regional Cities Initiative, Regional Economic Acceleration and Development Initiative (READI), READI 2.0, and the Strategic Development Commission.

Northeast Indiana (NEI) is a public-private regional economic development organization representing and serving 11 counties: Adams, Allen, DeKalb, Huntington, Kosciusko, LaGrange, Noble, Steuben, Wabash, Wells and Whitley. Our communities have proudly supported and participated in various efforts with this organization over the last several years.

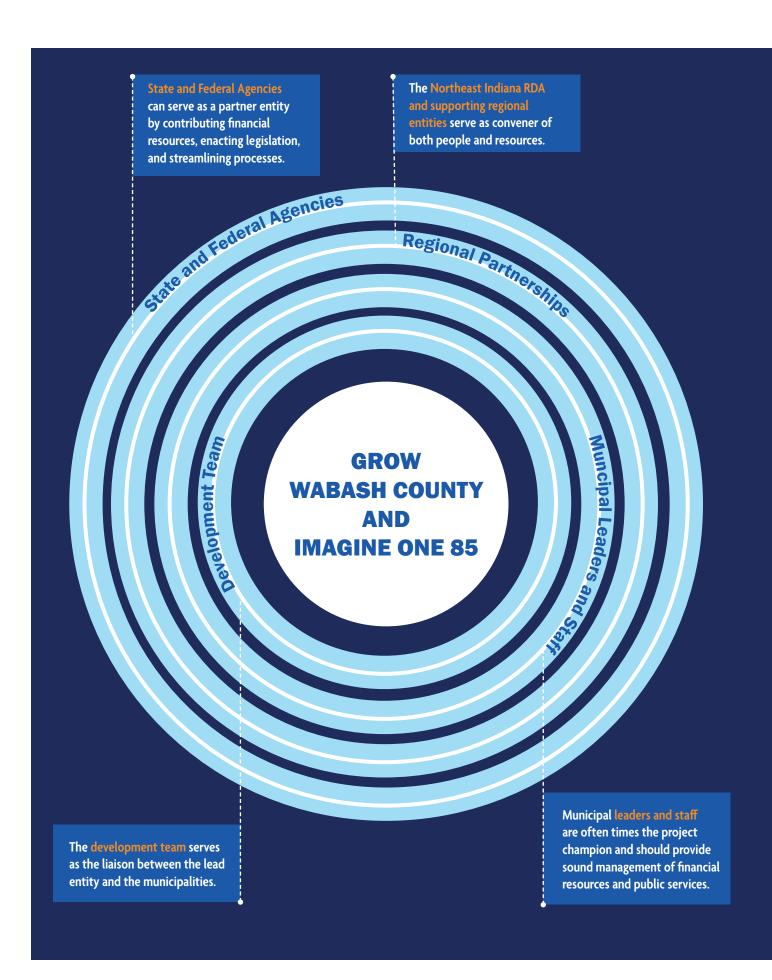
- In 2015, the region came together to create the Northeast Indiana RDA to apply for funds available through the state's Regional Cities Initiative. The result was the Road to One Million (RTOM) plan that emphasized population growth as an economic catalyst. Because of the RTOM plan, Northeast Indiana was awarded \$42 million through the initiative, which aimed to make Indiana a magnet for talent attraction by funding transformative quality-of-place projects.
- In 2021, the Northeast Indiana region came together again to update its regional development plan, Growing with Vision, in response to the state of Indiana's Regional Economic Acceleration and Development Initiative (READI) program. This effort led to \$18M in funding for six specific projects. One of the six projects was located in Wabash – Legacy Heights, a workforce housing development.
- In 2023, READI 2.0 was announced to continue funding economic development projects for regions around the state. The Northeast Indiana region submitted a proposal in early 2024 which led to an additional \$45M in funding.

The Northeast Indiana Strategic Development Commission (NEISDC) was created by the Indiana legislation in 2021 to provide strategic framework for how Northeast Indiana will raise wages, grow the population, and increase the number of residents with college degrees or credentials. It serves as the conduit for \$30 million in state funding to be deployed in the region. While built projects were prioritized using READI funds, these funds are allocated for quality of life programmatic efforts.

State and Federal Agencies

Addressing complex problems requires collaboration across multiple sectors and jurisdictions. Intergovernmental collaboration is vital to maximizing resources, closing gaps, and creating innovative solutions to local challenges. Without the support of State and Federal partnerships, Wabash County would not be where it is today. Our region is committed to nurturing these partnerships and resources to continue meeting the needs of current and future residents and businesses.

Wabash County has a long history of partnering with state and federal agencies to implement initiatives that strive to achieve not only our regional goals, but also statewide goals. This history is documented in the "Record of Completed Projects" list on page 57. Within the last 3 years, we have successfully facilitated 29 state and federal grants totaling over \$7.7M in funding.



HISTORY OF THE DEVELOPMENT TEAM

2019

The kick-off of the county-wide collaboration known as Imagine One 85. Each member of the development team was directly involved in this process.

2020 2021

The development team played a vital role in promoting and assisting in the facilitation of community engagement efforts.

2022

After the Imagine One 85 plan was complete, the development team quickly switched their focus to implementation. This group began meeting monthly to continue the collaboration and hired a Director of Imagine One 85.

2023

The Director of Imagine One 85, tasked with leading the implementation of the strategies outlined in the comprehensive plan, gained momentum. PAST SUCCESSES OF THE DEVELOPMENT TEAM

Our team

The development team is responsible for guiding the development of the Strategic Investment Plan and serves as the liaison between the lead entity and the municipalities. This 10-person committee is represented by each municipality and the three primary economic development agencies in the county – Grow Wabash County, Imagine One 85, and the Community Foundation of Wabash County. Each representative was directly involved in the Imagine One 85 planning process adopted in 2022.

2024

All five incorporated areas were quick to join the county in preparing and submitting the Letter of Intent in early 2024. The development team came to the first SIP meeting with a list of 30 projects and programs already identified.

Our Experience Working Together

As a true testament to the county's commitment to collaboration and the implementation of plans, we can once again look to the county-wide comprehensive plan, Imagine One 85.

After facing 40 years of declining population, Wabash County leaders banded together to organize the Imagine One 85 initiative to arrest population loss and grow Wabash County. Spanning nearly two years of work, during a pandemic, the planning process culminated in the creation of a county-wide comprehensive plan. The plan represents the synthesis of citizen ideas and expert technical analysis for growth in Wabash County. The process was a stimulating exercise that allowed citizens of the county to examine the communities we all live in, the roles we play as residents of these communities, and ultimately what citizens imagine the future of Wabash County to be. This example showcases our success in two areas – public engagement and implementation.

Public Engagement

Even in the depths of the COVID-19 Pandemic, the Imagine One 85 project team found creative ways to engage the public. In the early visioning stages of the plan development, more than 250 people participated in a Focus on the Future discussion and, together, generated thousands of comments and ideas. Later in the process, more than 200 people gathered at the Honeywell Center Plaza to celebrate the communities' strengths and progress, and to provide feedback on the development of the comprehensive plan.

Implementation

Imagine One 85 is more than a planning document that guides the focus of our community. The planning process established a culture of collaboration and built a contagious spirit of ownership in the future of Wabash County. That collaboration and spirit of ownership are what guided the implementation of the plan that established that culture within our community.

Since the Imagine One 85 plan has been adopted in July 2022, Wabash County has continued building momentum by:

- **Hiring a Director** The Imagine One 85 steering committee was determined not to let the plan sit on the shelf. Therefore, a collective decision was made to hire a Director of Imagine One 85, tasked with leading the implementation of the strategies outlined in the comprehensive plan.
- Gathering monthly Each of our communities, county government officials, community support organizations, and private sector partners are around the same table every month working to move projects and programs forward.
- Marking off items on our to-do list We believe that our demonstrated progress in over 80% of our action agenda items is evidence of our unwavering commitment to not only the prior planning work of Imagine One 85 as a foundation for our future and its implementation efforts but the commitment to collaboration and execution on future transformational initiatives, such as the Stellar Pathways Program.
- Achieving positive net migration Since the adoption and early implementation efforts of Imagine One 85, Wabash County has posted three consecutive years (2021-2023) of positive net migration and predicted to grow by 0.1% by 2028.

Another recent example is the Manchester Together Plan, through the College and Community Collaborative (CCC) Initiative. In August 2024, the Lilly Endowment award North Manchester University a \$12.1M grant to improve community assets and amenities. Members from this development team served as advisory committee members and stakeholders in this successful planning process.

COMPLETED PROJECTS

PAST SUCCESSES WITH THE GRANT ADMINISTRATOR

Wabash County has partnered with Kleinpeter Consulting Group to oversee the grant process by providing administrative and technical support from pre-award planning to final reporting. Mike Kleinpeter is an OCRAcertified grant administrator with extensive knowledge of the applicable regulations and policies needed to execute CDBG grants and other awards successfully. Local municipalities are actively working on two planning studies facilitated through Kleinpeter Consulting Group including the North Manchester Downtown Plan and the Lagro Economic Development Plan.

Experience using State and Federal Grant Funds

Wabash County has demonstrated a strong track record of fulfilling all match requirements in a wide variety of community initiatives. It is common practice for Wabash County, and the five other municipalities, to utilize state and federal funds to execute projects, programs, and planning studies. The following table, Record of Completed Project, documents the projects completed in last three years using state and federal grant funds. Within the last 3 years, we have successfully facilitated 29 state and federal grants totaling over \$7.7M in funding.

OUR ENGAGEMENT STRATEGY

Providing frequent and transparent ways to get involved and share input has been one of the primary tools for building our culture of collaboration and a sense of ownership in Wabash County. While our region understands and values the engagement process, the timeline of the 2024 Stellar Pathways program was such that several methods were needed to gather input quickly. Throughout this process, community engagement and outreach were primary goals; however, this strategic plan also relied heavily on past planning efforts.

TRIED AND TRUE METHODS

The development team used the following engagement opportunities and tools to educate, engage, and excite the 31,000 residents of Wabash County.

Mobile Engagement Display

Our region capitalized on the various community events that were occurring throughout September 2024. The benefit of this engagement method was that the development team could meet people where they were instead of asking people to come to a project-specific meeting. The project team created a tabletop display that provided an overview of the Stellar process, defined the region, and outlined ways to stay informed, get involved, and connect with the development team. This mobile engagement tool also included an interactive component that asked people to share their one wish for the region. This mobile display was available at the Grow Wabash County office for people to "check out" for community events. Members of the development team were encouraged to staff the Wabash County: On the Banks of a Stellar Future booth.

The mobile engagement display was present at the following events:

- Roann Festival (September $5^{th} 7^{th}$) It is estimated that 4,000 people attended this community event in the Town of Roann throughout the weekend.
- Hispanic Heritage Festival (September 13th) It is estimated that 1200 people attended this community event on Market Street in North Manchester.
- Founders Day Festival (September 13th -14th) It is estimated that 1,000 people attended this community event at Paradise Spring Historic Park in Wabash.

Project Website & Online Survey

The project website (tswdesigngroup.com/Wabashcounty) served as the home base for the plan so that community members know where to look for project updates and ways to get involved in the process. The website was one of many ways the region promoted the online survey and public events. An online survey was available through most of the SIP planning process. This survey was available in both English and Spanish and received over 300 responses. This survey was promoted via press release, social media campaigns, postcards in local restaurants, and school newsletters.





















Public Open House & Community Event

The project team facilitated two public events on October 10, 2024. The first event was in North Manchester from 12:00 – 2:00pm. Nearly 20 people stopped by The Coop on Main Street to review and share ideas related to the proposed project ideas. On the evening of October 10, 2024, the project team attended the Grow Wabash County Annual Dinner at the Honeywell Center in Wabash. There were nearly 300 people at this event to celebrate the businesses and leaders that help grow our communities every day. Attendees were encouraged to provide input on the proposed project ideas during the cocktail hour.

Members of the development team facilitate monthly meetings with various stakeholders through Wabash County. We used these meetings as an opportunity to inform stakeholders about the Stellar Pathways program, the SIP process, and collect input from these specific representatives. These stakeholders included student focus groups, the Hispanic and Amish population, and community programming partners.

CHALLENGES

The only major challenge related to engagement stemmed from the condensed timeline of the strategic investment plan. The process of scheduling and preparing materials, collecting information, reviewing ideas, and generating a consensus is often lengthy. Replicating these efforts across municipal boundaries and amongst varying stakeholders takes a significant amount of time. Our region is fortunate to have many years of planning processes and community input already collected to build on. These past planning efforts, which include extension public engagement strategies, are outlined on the regional engagement timeline on the following pages.

PARTICIPATION

One of our primary goals for engagement was to reach people of all ages and all areas of the county. We were able to track this effort by asking specific questions about the respondent's age and residence in the online survey. While the majority of the survey participants lived in North Manchester, each community and the unincorporated area of the county were represented. We also received a diverse range of respondents based on age except for youth. While we would have liked to engage this demographic more, youth were heavily involved in previous planning efforts as key stakeholders. We did attempt to reach this demographic more by asking the school to share the survey link in an email blast to encourage students and families to participate.

In terms of in-person events, it is more difficult to track demographics, but our development team made a strong effort to provide engagement opportunities in a variety of locations throughout the region to make it convenient for residents to participate. The development team did a phenomenal job at coordinating attendance at each community event to ensure someone was available to help educate and engage the community.

ACCESSIBILITY

Our region acknowledges that inclusive community engagement creates better outcomes. It is an intentional process about empowering individuals as active participants in shaping the decisions that impact their lives. The success of community engagement hinges on our ability to identify potential barriers and then create a strategy to overcome those barriers. Our efforts to make engagement more accessible and inclusive are highlighted below.

We prioritized meeting people where they were.

As previously mentioned, our development team focused heavily on meeting people where they were by attending community events and providing online engagement opportunities to make it as easy and convenient as possible. Not all community groups have sufficient time, capacity, and resources to attend and respond to all engagement requests. Our community members did not have to seek out an opportunity to provide input. Instead, the development team brought the information to them. This minimizes logistic barriers, such as the location or timing of the engagement opportunity.

We leveraged both digital and traditional media channels to help spread the word. A fundamental obstacle to community engagement is the lack of awareness or understanding of the opportunities available or the importance of involvement. The planning process and engagement opportunities were promoted by press releases in the local newspapers and social media channels.

We explored strategies to overcome language

barriers. It's important to understand that various languages are spoken within a community. Our engagement strategies included multilingual services so that people could engage with materials in their preferred language and a stakeholder meeting with Spanish-speaking individuals. A local Hispanic resident taught members of the development team key phrases in Spanish for the Hispanic Heritage Festival. Our region also provided a Spanish version of the online survey and prepared advertisements in Spanish.

REPORTING

In an effort to be transparent, the online survey and public engagement events were summarized and published on the project website for the region to review throughout the planning process. Furthermore, all raw survey data and summarized data are included in Appendix B: Community Engagement Summary.

PAST PLANNING EFFORTS

The timeline on pages 64-65 illustrates how Wabash County has engaged all four corners of the region over the last 5 years and summarizes the past planning efforts that served as a foundation for this effort.

ENGAGEMENT TIMELINE

COMMUNICATIONS

At the launch of the strategic planning process, the project team crafted a Communications and Engagement Plan centered around three key goals – educate, engage, and excite. This plan outlined specific tools and activities that were deployed throughout the planning process. The communications plan not only became a useful tool for sharing and collecting information, but it also held the development team accountable. Each of the following tools and activities that were originally identified back in July 2024 were implemented.

GOAL #1: EDUCATE

The following efforts aimed to educate the Wabash County residents, businesses, organizations, and leaders of the Stellar Pathways Program and the process for completing the Strategic Investment Plan (SIP).

BRANDING & PROJECT IDENTIFICATION

We created a cohesive visual identity that resonates with the region.

The project team developed a unique identity for the planning process to help community members remember and recognize the project. The team also ensured that all project materials complement each other and consistently used the logo, colors, and fonts.

PROIECT DASHBOARD - WEBSITE LANDING PAGE

We established an online platform that served as the home base for all things related to the SIP process.

A project-specific landing page was developed using Wix to provide an online platform for the Strategic Investment Plan. The website served as the home base for the plan so that community members know where to look for project updates and ways to get involved in the process. A link to the landing page was added to all major websites within the county.

PRINTED MATERIALS

We used printed materials to distribute information and help raise awareness.

A series of promotional materials were created and distributed to help raise awareness of the planning process. These materials include a FAQ sheet, promotional postcards for upcoming engagement opportunities, and other branding materials such as a table cloth with the project logo for events.

GOAL #2: ENGAGE

The following efforts aimed to engage Wabash County residents, businesses, organizations, and leaders in the planning process. Identifying projects and programs with community consensus was critical to creating a successful plan. Due to the condensed nature of the Stellar Pathways timeline, this planning effort depended significantly on past engagement efforts. Additional efforts were focused on vetting the proposed projects that the region hoped to submit within this SIP.

PAST ENGAGEMENT EFFORTS

We carried forward the work that has already been done.

Wabash County has been working together to collect and advance ideas for quite some time. The following efforts served as the foundation for this Strategic Investment Plan.

Imagine One 85

Between November 2020 and July 2021, the Imagine One 85 project team and committee facilitated a series of engagement efforts that were used to outline a county-wide vision and craft a detailed action agenda. The first round of efforts, Focus on the Future, included fourteen stakeholder group interviews, five in-person workshops, and four virtual workshops. More than 250 people participated in the discussion and, together, generated thousands of comments and ideas.

Later in the process, more than 200 people gathered at the Honeywell Center Plaza to celebrate the Communities' strengths and progress, and to provide feedback on the development of the comprehensive plan. More than 400 ideas were shared during the Growth Summit with 42 identified as MIGHTY Ideas by group members.

Manchester Together

In late 2023, the Town of Manchester and Manchester University embarked on a planning process to create the Manchester Together initiative through the College and Community Collaboration Initiative. Over 200 community members participated in this process.

Level up Lagro

In May 2024, the project team facilitated three stakeholder meetings, one in-person public workshop, and an online survey.

DEVELOPMENT TEAM / ADVISORY COMMITTEE

We appointed a diverse group of individuals to guide the development of the SIP.

Even before Wabash County was nominated as a Stellar Finalist, the region had already established a working group of ten individuals that met monthly to collaborate. The project team used this committee to guide the development of the SIP. This development team met bi-weekly throughout the planning process.

INTERACTIVE TOUR WITH PROJECT STAKEHOLDERS

We visited locations in the county that are relevant to the SIP to observe the built environment and have informal conversations with stakeholders.

As an informal approach to engagement, the project team toured the county and was introduced to key stakeholders at each location. This provided stakeholders with an opportunity to meet the project team and share high-level details about the potential project or program.

REGIONAL PRIORITIES - ONLINE SURVEY

We developed and promoted an online survey to confirm the prioritization of key themes.

An online survey was used to confirm the region's top priorities using the key themes or topics that emerged during the first committee meeting. This input was one of the several ways the projects were evaluated to determine which projects move forward as a proposed Stellar project in the SIP. The online survey was live from August 12, 2024 — October 15, 2024 and received over 300 responses.

SOCIAL MEDIA

We utilized existing social media platforms to distribute information.

The development team is made up of ten critical community entities or organizations. Each of these representatives had their own social media platforms with an existing following. The project team developed and distributed a social media campaign for September – November to promote the SIP process and share updates with the general public.

PUBLIC WORKSHOP | COMMUNITY EVENTS

We invited the general public to provide feedback on the draft plan.

The project team facilitated an in-person workshop to vet the county's priorities and project list. This engagement opportunity was used to ensure the county's plan accurately reflected the needs of Wabash County residents, businesses, and organizations. The project team also developed a mobile tabletop display that traveled to various community events.

GOAL #3: EXCITE

The following efforts aimed to build excitement around the Stellar Pathways Program and the process for completing the Strategic Investment Plan (SIP).

MARKETING PACKET

We crafted a creative Wabash County packet to highlight the process and projects identified within the SIP.

Not only does this packet promote the planning process, but it can also be used to market the participating communities and overall county to attract residents and businesses. This packet is envisioned as a 5–10-page brochure that graphically depicts and summarizes key aspects of the process and projects identified.

PRESENTATION MESSAGING

We worked to ensure the message is consistent across all speakers.

While the presentation message and materials were developed by the project team, the team also facilitated practice sessions, and prepared scripts for speakers to ensure a consistent message was conveyed.

STATE PRESENTATION VIDEO

We used a video to tell the story of Wabash County.

The committee worked with a videographer to produce an exciting overview of the Wabash County process and projects. This video will be used during the State Presentation in early December but could also be broken down into smaller clips for social media. The project team facilitated the content development and talking points for the video to ensure consistency in content and messaging.

FUTURE EFFORTS

CONTINUING THE MOMENTUM

Being selected as a Stellar Pathways designee is not the end destination. Rather, our region views this opportunity a catalyst for additional regional investment and collaboration. Project implementation and community engagement is a continuous thread that ties all of our collaborative efforts together. Wabash County recognizes the power of collaborative efforts, guided by leadership and fueled by the collective aspiration of our residents. We will leverage the proven strategies and numerical successes of the Imagine One 85 and other past planning efforts, to continue the momentum for our region. These proven strategies, many of which are outlined in this chapter, pave the way for sustainable development and inclusive growth, enriching the fabric of our community for generations to come.

MARKETING AND PROMOTION

Even after a decade, the City of Wabash is still reaping the benefits of the 2014 Stellar Communities designation. Our region has seen firsthand the unprecedented impacts of the program. While funding is a primary incentive for the program, we cannot deny the impact this program can have on marketing and promotion.

Amplified marketing and promotion started the moment that Lt. Gov. Suzanne Crouch announced that our region was one of four Stellar Pathways finalists. This process signifies to current and future residents, businesses, developers, investors, and state and federal agencies our commitment to improving quality of life, growing our population, and becoming a more inclusive community.

Our region will use three marketing strategies to continue promoting Wabash County, and the five participating communities.

- Grow Wabash County, in partnership with the Imagine One 85 Director and development team, will create and execute a communications plan to showcase our progress, provide updates, and promote existing and future opportunities within each municipality.
- Our region will leverage an existing branding initiative, LiveIN Wabash County, to further promote our region as an attractive place to live, work, or own a business.
- Our region will work with the Indiana Destination Development Corporation (IDDC) to create a distinct marketing campaign as part of the Stellar Pathways designation.

PRIORITIZATION PROCESS

At the kick-off of the strategic planning process, the development team prepared a list of 30 projects and programs. These projects were previously identified through community conversations and local leadership needs. This master project list was organized by each "funding bucket" provided by the six state agencies. It quickly became apparent that the development team needed a methodology for narrowing down and prioritizing the master project list. The process used to prioritize projects is outlined below.

STEP 1: FEASIBILITY MATRIX

The consultants used the first in-person meeting with the development team to start the prioritization process, which included completing a project feasibility matrix for all projects on the master list. This exercise was intended to help the development team understand how far along each project was in the development process.

This matrix included the five topics from OCRA's feasibility matrix and three additional topics that were added by the project team. The five OCRA topics included financing, site control, environmental review, schematic design, and architecture and preliminary engineering documentation. The development team answered complete, in-progress, or not started for each topic.

The development team also considered the impact of the project ranging from neighborhood, community, or regional impact and additional questions such as:

- Does this project have supporting data to illustrate the need?
- Does this project leverage additional resources?
- Can this project be completed in the five-year designation time frame?

This matrix was altered to accommodate both built projects and programming efforts. This initial prioritization method revealed that several projects weren't as far along as the others. The consultant team then used the results of the matrix to create a scoring system for the projects. This scoring system revealed which projects may be most feasible for the Stellar Pathways program.

STEP 2: FUNDING QUALIFICATIONS

The State Agency Day at the end of August was an informative experience and allowed the development team to ask specific questions regarding the qualification of projects related to each funding source. Through these conversations, the development team removed some projects that may not meet the funding requirements and also added a few new ideas to the project list. Following this event, Wabash County was able to solidify which projects would be presented to the public for consideration.

STEP 3: VETTING WITH THE PUBLIC

In addition to the online survey, the development team facilitated two public engagement events in North Manchester and Wabash. Attendees were invited to review the proposed projects and asked to share their feedback. The development team was most interested in how the community would rate the level of impact the projects would have on improving the quality of life and growing the population. Attendees were also encouraged to share general, open-ended comments related to the proposed projects and/or additional ideas to consider moving forward. Through this process, Wabash County was able to vet the projects with the general public.

STEP 4: PROJECT CLASSIFICATION

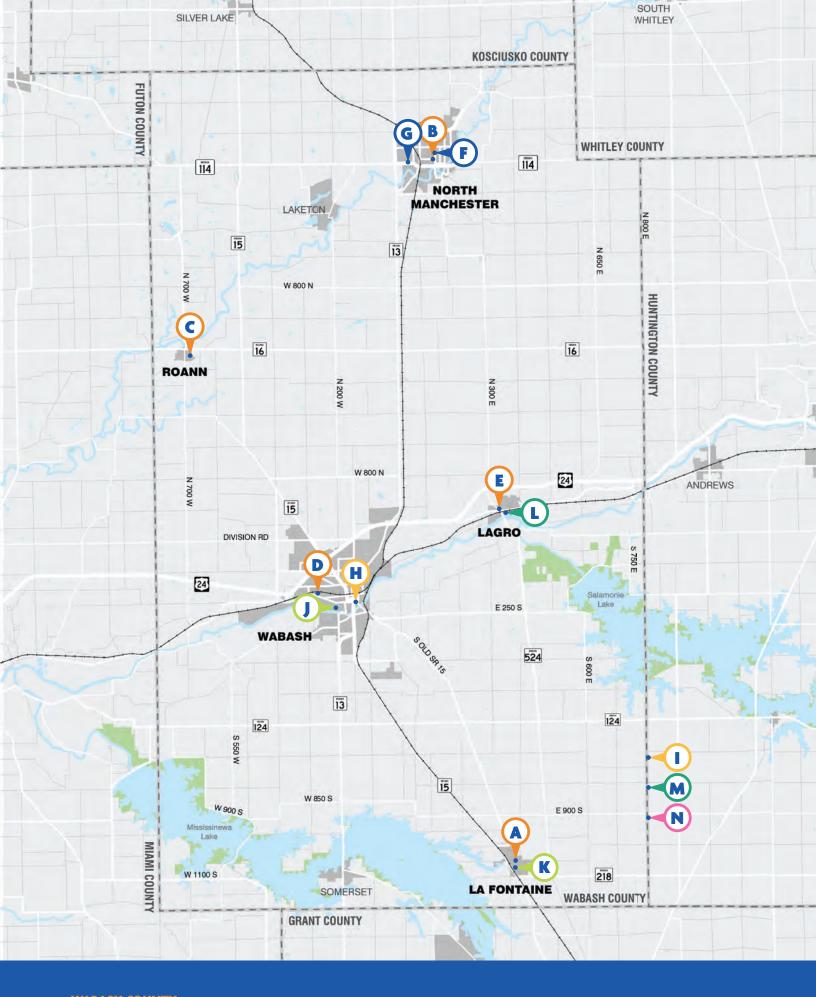
Once the Stellar projects were identified, the development team wanted to find a way to showcase the other 20+ project ideas from the original master project list. It was important to the development team to not lose track of these ideas. With that being said, a classification system was created to organize the projects. This system classifies each project in one of three categories – a Stellar project, a supporting project, or a complementary project.

- **Stellar Projects** These projects are efforts that Wabash County feels are most appropriate and feasible for the region to move forward with in the next five years. These projects closely align with the goals of the Stellar Pathways program and meet the necessary funding requirements.
- **Supporting Projects** These projects and programs are current and/or on-going efforts that illustrate the community's current momentum. Supporting projects are highlighted on the key map for each Stellar project.
- **Complementary Projects** These projects are future efforts that could complement and continue building the momentum following the implementation of the Stellar projects. Complementary projects are also highlighted on the key map for each Stellar project.

Using this prioritization process and classification system, Wabash County has identified 14 Stellar projects, 21 supporting projects, and 8 complementary projects.

DEFINING THE NEED

As described in chapter three (see pages 29), our region intends to use the Stellar Pathways designation to execute projects and programs that improve the quality of life and place as an approach to stabilizing the population; and promotes our region as a welcoming place for all – regardless of demographics, socioeconomic status, and abilities.

Each of our communities has prioritized specific types of projects that not only support the larger regional effort but directly fill a gap or need in their community. These project types include:

- Support Services and Programs
- Utility Services and Infrastructure
- Pedestrian Connectivity
- Access to Healthy Food
- Housing Options
- Parks and Recreation

The following section documents the level of need for these six project types.

Support Services and Programs

Social services are a range of public services intended to provide support and assistance to particular groups. With an aging population, senior adults are at the forefront of our priorities. In 2022, Wabash County's median age was 42.8 which is over 4 years older than the state of Indiana's median age. Other data revealed in a 2023 Wabash County Market Potential Analysis indicates that 50% of households in Wabash County are empty nester's and retirees. Senior Centers provide a welcoming environment for social interaction, offer meal assistance, and help maintain a good quality of life.

Individuals with disabilities, and their caregivers, have also been identified as a top priority for our region as they are often an under-served population. According to the Census Brief on Disability Status, 19% of Indiana residents, 5 years of age and older, experience some level of disability. Considering only self-care statistics, there are over 700 of our neighbors in Wabash County who rely on a caregiver in need of respite. Wabash County has one of only two organizations that provides this type of respite, care that is outside of the home, in a non-institutionalized environment. Because of this, our local facility, Daniel's Place is in high demand.



What did we hear?

Nearly 90% of survey respondents feel it is important for the county, and its partners, to provide facilities for underserved populations such as people with disabilities, lowincome residents, and/or senior citizens.

Utility Services and Infrastructure

Aging Infrastructure is a common challenge for any community, but smaller, rural communities depend on state and federal resources to move the needle on this ongoing battle. Failing infrastructure or insufficient capacity can lead to safety, health, and financial burden on the community. For La Fontaine, the infrastructure dates back to the 1960s when the original sanitary system was installed. The typical life expectancy of stormwater pipes is about 50 years, depending on soil conditions and other factors. During a previous rain event in 2019, two homes were destroyed and approximately \$2,000,000 in damage occurred near the bridge at Parker Street. This level of need is documented further in a Preliminary Engineering Report (PER) completed in June 2024.



What did we hear?

Nearly 93% of survey respondents feel it is important for the county and towns to invest in infrastructure improvements. Participants ranked utility improvements as a top priority for La Fontaine.

Pedestrian Connectivity

Pedestrian connectivity and safety have become a widespread priority for communities across the nation. While sidewalks and trails were once viewed as a luxury amenity, this infrastructure is now a standard. Residents and businesses expect this alternative mode of transportation to be accessible. North Manchester has two major anchors one-mile apart and no obvious, desirable route to move between them. It is believed and confirmed through rigorous stakeholder engagement that students, faculty, and staff would be more likely to spend time in downtown North Manchester if there was a more visible route that was attractive, safe, and authentic. Lagro is also facing similar challenges related to pedestrian connectivity. The town has expressed the desire to connect the new investment downtown with the activity along the riverfront.



What did we hear?

The Manchester Together planning process confirmed that students, faculty, and staff would spend more time downtown if there was a more obvious, safe, and attractive route. Community members have also expressed the desire for better connectivity between downtown North Manchester and the west side of town. A significant amount of comments received from the survey directly reference sidewalk improvements ranging from repairing existing infrastructure to expanding the network.

Access to Healthy Food

One of the challenges that comes with living in rural areas is the lack of access to healthy, affordable food. The USDA provides data related to low-income low access to healthy food and tracks the change in access to unhealthy options such as fast food establishments. In 2015, nearly 3,500 residents had low access to grocery stores which represented a 25% increase since 2010. As of 2016, there were 7 grocery stores but nearly 30 fast food establishments available in the 412 square miles of Wabash County.



What did we hear?

Just over 83% of survey respondents feel the residents of smaller communities would benefit from access to a more convenient grocery store. Furthermore, nearly 70% of survey respondents feel that residents of smaller communities would benefit from a food service program.

Housing Options

Providing diverse, affordable housing options is a critical component to growing our population. In 2023, Wabash County completed a Residential Market Potential Analysis to determine the annual market potential and optimum market position for new affordable, workforce, and market-rate rental and owner-occupied housing units in Wabash County. This analysis indicates an annual average of 1,770 households of all incomes represent the potential market for new and existing housing units within Wabash County each year over the next five years. Housing preferences would primarily be single-family detached units followed by multi-family rental units.



What did we hear?

Public engagement data confirmed that community members feel that providing attainable housing is the number one priority for addressing population decline in Wabash County. When we asked how likely are you to recommend living in Wabash County to a friend or family member, over 70% of respondents answered likely or very likely. Of the participants who answered neutral or unlikely, the primary concern was related to housing. While housing was relatively affordable, demand outweighed supply.

Parks and Recreation

Every five years, the state of Indiana updates it's Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (SCORP). This plan provides quantitative and qualitative analysis of outdoor recreation supply and demand statewide. With a total of 15,899 recreational acres, our region has some room to grow in terms of meeting the statewide recommendations. Wabash County has a total of 549 acres of local park and recreation space. This acreage does not meet the recommended amount of local park acres based on population. In terms of state and federal recreational acres, our region has over 15,300 acres which does meet the recommended amount of state and federal acres. Furthermore, the SCORP summarized the Indiana Visionary Trail System. It is important to note that the Wabash Riverwalk Trail is a key piece of the Indiana Visionary Trail System.



What did we hear?

Over 90% of survey respondents feel the residents of smaller communities would benefit from additional parks and recreational opportunities. The residents of Roann have expressed their strong desire for a new park facility for several years now and have given generously to support this project idea.

Survey data also revealed that people are very proud of the Wabash Riverwalk Trail and other recreational opportunities. "For a small community, we have several things to be proud of, Honeywell Center, State Parks, River Trail, and a vibrant downtown. Citizens seem to get along well and support each other in times of need."

CHAPTER ORGANIZATION

Each of the 14 Stellar projects has a four-page "project dashboard" that communicates key facts with supplemental information in the appendix. In addition to the project information, this chapter strives to demonstrate how the proposed projects align with the fundamental theme of *Wabash County – A place for All* and the pathway goals of the Stellar Pathways program.

Each Stellar Pathways goal has a specific icon representing the goal. If the square surrounding the icon is **BLUE** then we believe the proposed project directly aligns with that goal. If the square is **GRAY**, the proposed project may not have a direct influence on that particular goal.



Enhancing Quality of Place

OUR UNDERSTANDING

It is our understanding that OCRA has set aside \$8,000,000 for the Stellar Pathways Program meaning that each designated region can receive up to \$4,000,000. We understand that funding is from the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), which is federal funding. Through discussions with OCRA during the State Agency Day, our region was informed that Stellar designees did not need a match to receive the CDBG funding.

PROJECT OVERVIEW

The Wabash County region is proposing to use the funding provided by OCRA to implement FIVE strategic initiatives - one in each municipality. These five initiatives total **\$6.4M** in investment and leverage funding from private investment, local dollars, and other grant sources. With support from the Stellar Pathways program, our region can improve stormwater infrastructure, assist a non-profit with expanding respite care services, provide additional recreational opportunities, enhance our senior center, and improve pedestrian connectivity for current and future residents. We invite OCRA and the other six state agency partners to join us in achieving our goals of growing our population and becoming a more welcoming and inclusive community! PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Town of La Fontaine is located in the southeast quadrant of the county with a population of just under 900. With stormwater infrastructure dating back to the 1960's, the town has noted frequent ponding and significant flooding during rain events. In July 2024, a Preliminary Engineering Report (PER) was conducted to evaluate the entire system to identify viable alternatives for addressing the town's needs. This report proposed four key improvements including —

- Increase Basin #2 Storm Sewer Capacity
- Increase Basin #6 Storm Sewer Capacity
- Western Ave Storm Sewer Extension
- New Storm Sewer at Alley between E Grant Street and Meadow Drive

With support from the Stellar Pathways program, the town could address the ongoing safety, health, and financial burden of the inadequate and aging infrastructure.

BUDGET NARRATIVE

According to the PER, Phase 1 of the stormwater improvements would cost \$800,400 for construction and \$245,000 for non-construction-related costs, totaling \$1,045,400. With support from the Stellar Pathways Program, La Fontaine would cover 25% of the cost by issuing a bond with a monthly rate increase. Assuming OCRA could assist with 75% of the total, rates would only increase by \$1.88 per user.

PROIECT SUSTAINABILITY

The Public Works department is responsible for the operations and management of the public stormwater utility. Currently, the town has \$80,000 in the stormwater account that isn't accounted for within the local leverage line item. While this isn't much, the Town of La Fontaine would continue tracking and submitting for state and federal grants for future improvements.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Daniel's Place is a nonprofit organization focused on providing respite care across the lifespan of persons with physical and intellectual disabilities. Daniel's Place gives short-term care to people whose disabilities are such that they need continual assistance. Respite allows for time off from care-giving responsibilities while providing a safe, comfortable place for loved ones. Daniel's Place is one of only two providers in Northern Indiana that offer this type of care.

Daniel's Place operates inside Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church in North Manchester. Although the current location is cost-effective, its location, size, and resources significantly impact the organization's ability to provide the level of care that aligns with its mission and values. The new facility will allow Daniel's Place to serve more clients and expand the services offered. The large fenced-in yard will provide a safe environment for outdoor activities and bedrooms will allow guests to stay overnight. Daniel's Place owns three parcels of land in North Manchester, one of which has an existing structure. This project will consist of demolishing the existing building and constructing a new 5,190-square-foot building for day and overnight care.

BUDGET NARRATIVE

The total project cost includes \$2,053,000 for construction and \$500,000 for an operational endowment. The private investment is committed funds from Daniel's Place that has been raised over the last year or so. In the summer of 2024, Daniel's Place was awarded a \$950,000 grant from Indiana United Way to help construct the facility. With support from the Stellar Pathways program, Daniel's Place would be able to begin construction on its new facility.

PROJECT SUSTAINABILITY

Daniel's Place has been operating from inside the church since 2018 with an annual operating budget of \$211,326. The organization's major sources of revenue include individual construction (18%), special event income (5%), program income (10%), business contributions (27%), and other individual contributions (35%). The organization's financial plan is to have \$180,000 in a property maintenance reserve for future repairs and maintenance. There is also a plan to create an endowment for ongoing maintenance costs.

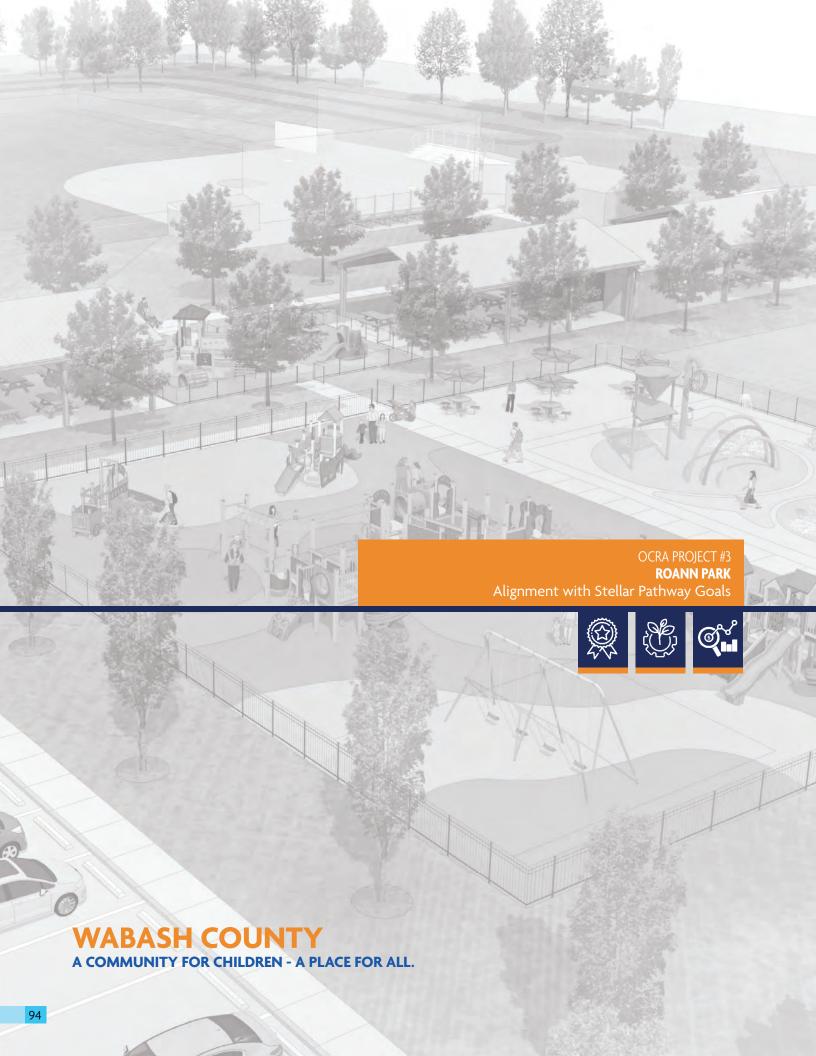

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Town of Roann owns three parcels on the east side of town making up just over 7 acres of land. In 2023, the town worked with an engineer and design consultant to provide conceptual designs and construction documents for the future park. This project builds on an existing baseball field by adding the following amenities:

- Basketball and pickleball courts
- Fitness Stations
- New pavilion and restroom facilities
- Playgrounds
- Splashpad
- Expanded parking lots

With a population of 400, recreational amenities are limited. The town currently offers one small play area near the proposed park with a residential-grade play structure and a metal swing set. This future park will not only serve the residents of Roann, it will become a regional attraction for recreation and better support the downtown businesses in the community.

BUDGET NARRATIVE

The total project costs include \$796,343 for the park improvements and \$15,500 for the land and survey costs. The public investment dollars have been raised through community donations and efforts completed by the Park Committee and dollars spent on the land and survey which has already been incurred. With support from the Stellar Pathways program, the Town of Roann would be ready to begin construction on this 7-acre park.

PROJECT SUSTAINABILITY

The Town of Roann has two full-time maintenance staff and an active volunteer group that will assist the community in the on-going maintenance of the park facility. The Roann Park Committee is committed to continue raising funds for future improvements. This organization, and the community, is very interested in this project and has already raised over \$400,000 over the last year.

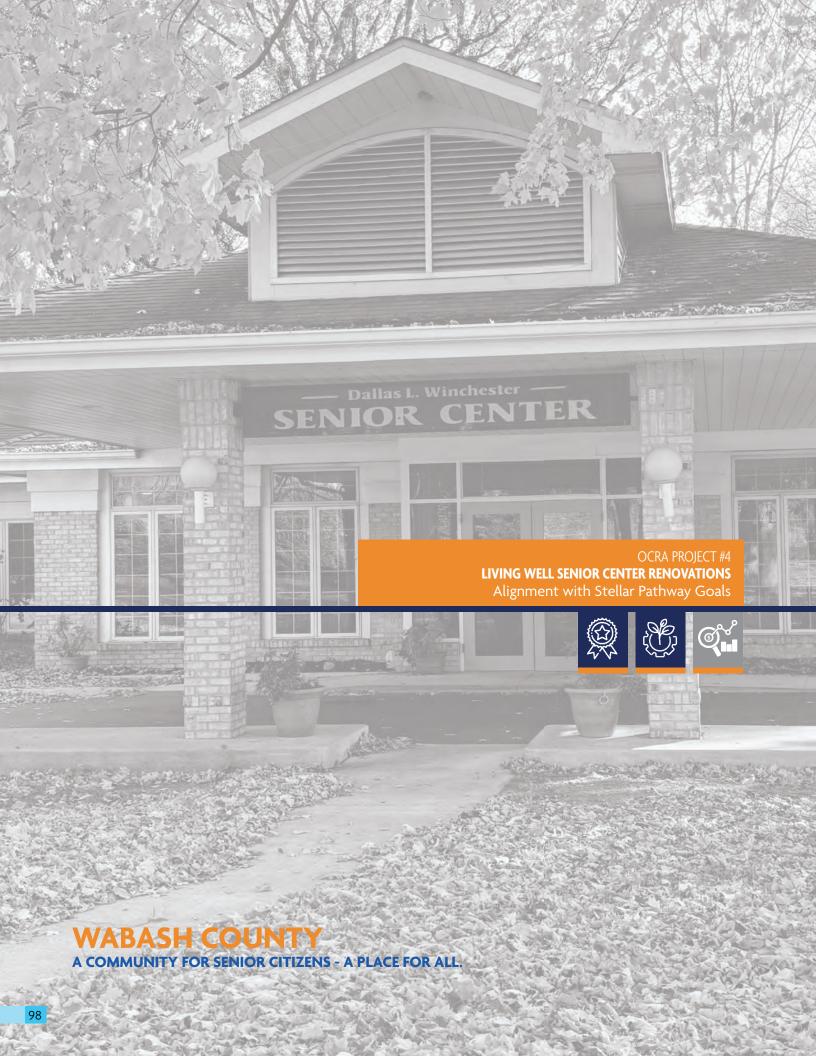

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

In 2010, the Wabash County Council on Aging created a task force to identify the vision and long-term goals of the Living Well Senior Center. Since then, the organization has been working to improve the function and appearance of the building and expand programs. This project includes a total renovation of the existing footprint. The current building footprint is just over 8,200 square feet with several offices, a large multi-purpose room, kitchen, living room, and food pantry. The proposed floor plan reconfigures the existing space to accommodate additional administrative and classroom spaces, new restroom facilities, a larger kitchen with a separate dinning room, and additional storage.

BUDGET NARRATIVE

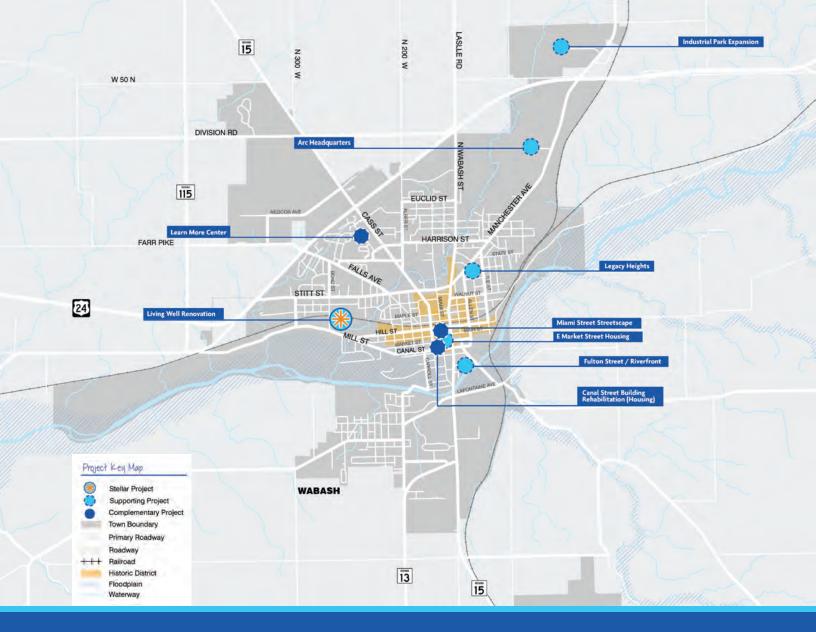
The total project cost includes \$2,000,000 for renovating Wabash County's senior center, known as Living Well. This project total represents a high-level planning cost that would require working with a qualified contractor to finalize the design and cost for construction. This initial cost estimate was created using a cost per square foot based on similar projects. The proposed budget breakdown suggests that the Wabash County Council on Aging would be responsible for \$300,000 identified within the private investment category. The organization is open to phasing the construction of the renovation to meet budgetary and operational goals. With support from the Stellar Pathways program, Living Well could update its facility to accommodate more people and programs.

PROJECT SUSTAINABILITY

Following construction, the Wabash County Council on Aging would be responsible for the on-going maintenance and sustainability of the facility expansion. The Living Well facility as an annual operating budget of \$869,989 with an annual revenue of \$760,000 and other endowments and investments providing an additional \$400,000 that could support the long-term sustainability of this facility expansion.

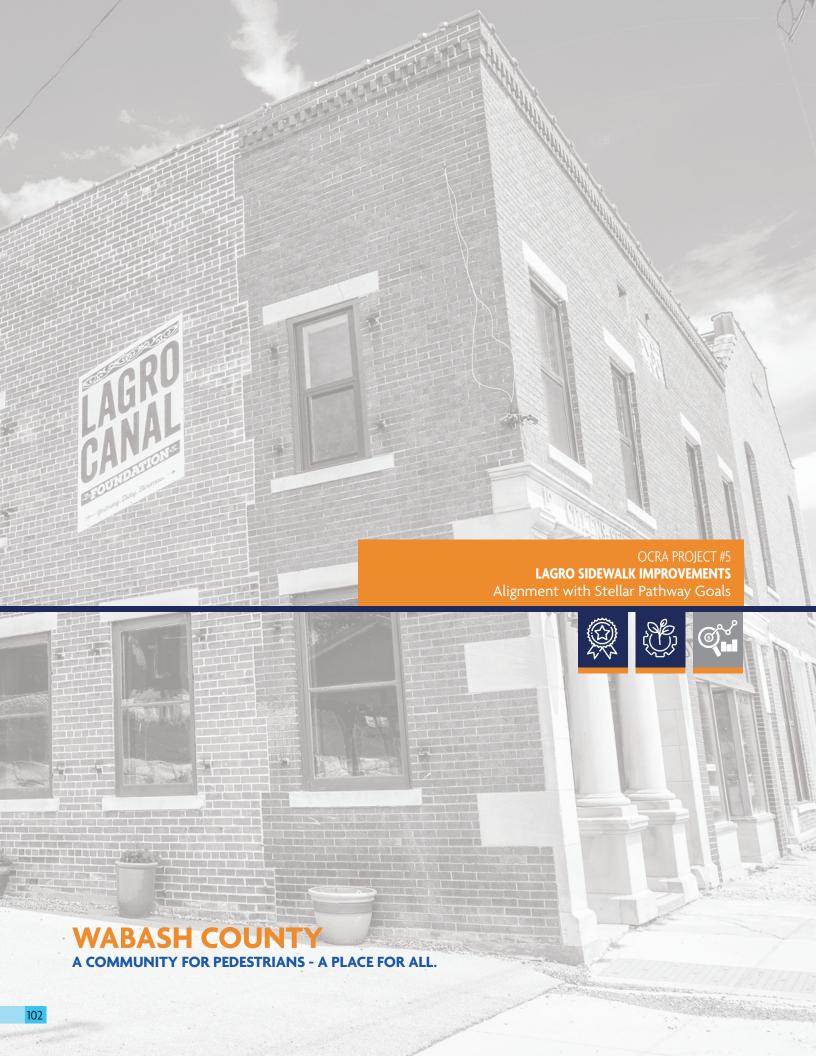

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

This project includes replacing the sidewalk on Davis Street / SR 524 between Main Street and Washington Street. Davis Street is the main thoroughfare through the town connecting two popular Airbnb's, Firehouse Café, 950 Speakeasy, and several other local businesses.

The cost of these improvements includes removing existing sidewalk, pouring new concrete, and installing four new ADA ramps with detectable warnings. The ADA ramps would be installed at each crossing within the study area. These enhancements would improve connectivity and safety for residents and visitors while also linking the new investment in downtown Lagro. Furthermore, this project would improve pedestrian access to another potential Stellar project, the Lagro Grocery Store, located at the intersection of Davis Street and Washington Street.

BUDGET NARRATIVE

The total project cost includes \$49,500 for the installation of one block of sidewalks and four ADA ramps with detectable warnings. The Town of Lagro has committed \$15,000 from its annual CCMG line item to provide local leverage. With support from the Stellar Pathways program, the Town of Lagro would be working to improve pedestrian connectivity and ADA compliance.

PROJECT SUSTAINABILITY

Davis Street is a state road owned and maintained by the Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT). The Town of Lagro will be responsible for future sidewalk maintenance or improvements and will coordinate with INDOT as needed.

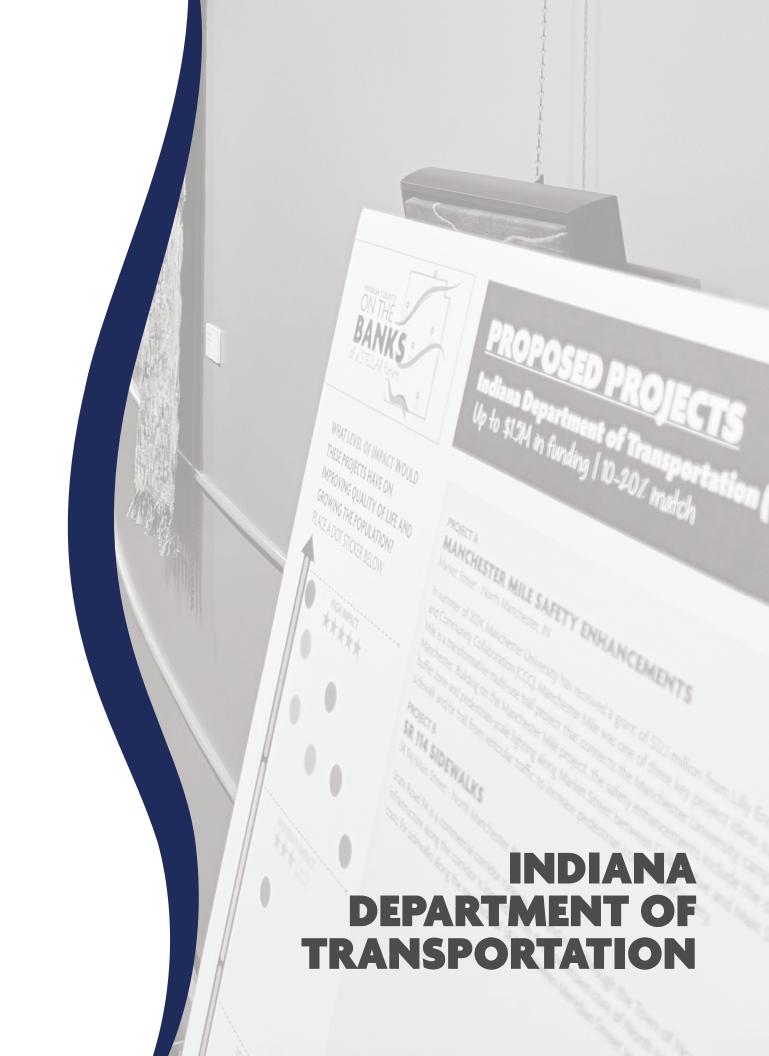

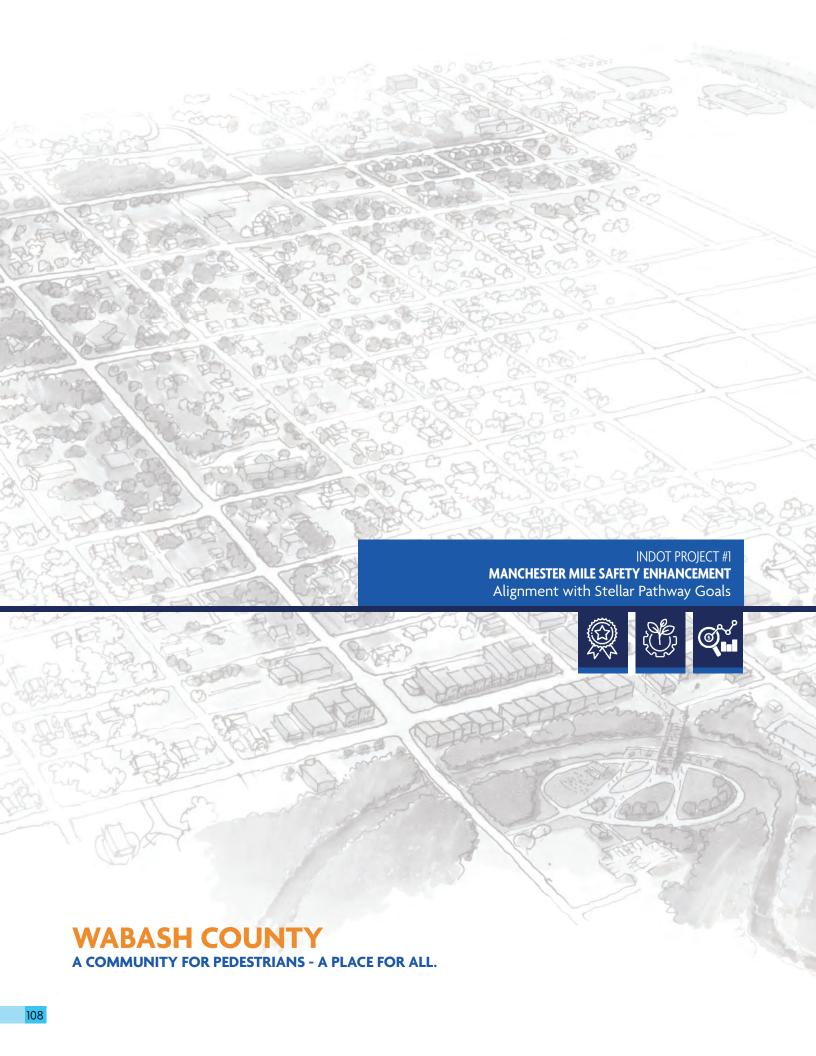
OUR UNDERSTANDING

It is our understanding that INDOT has set aside \$3,000,000 for the Stellar Pathways Program, meaning that each designated region can receive up to \$1,500,000. We understand that funding is from the Rural Federal Aid Program which requires a 20% local match. Funding can be used on trails, roads, sidewalks, safety, and bridge projects. Through discussions with INDOT during the State Agency Day, our region was informed safety enhancement projects could come from a safety program that requires a 10% match. For this reason, our proposed budget tables reflect a 10% match for both projects. We understand that federal aid funding can only be used on a minor collector or higher roadway and our communities must use an INDOT qualified consultant. We also understand that if these projects are funded, the community can't apply for any other federal dollars for the five year Stellar designation period.

PROJECT OVERVIEW

The Wabash County region is proposing to use the funding provided by INDOT to implement TWO strategic initiatives - both located in the Town of Manchester. These two initiatives total \$2.1M in investment and leverage funding from private investment, local dollars, and other grant sources. With support from the Stellar Pathways program, our region can leverage the dollars received from the Lilly Endowment to enhance the Manchester Mile project and improve pedestrian connectivity on the west-side of town. PROJECT DESCRIPTION

In September 2024, Manchester University was award \$12.1M from the Lilly Endowment through the College and Community Collaboration Initiative. Manchester Mile is one of four community initiatives focused on enhancing quality of life for all people. The Manchester Mile is a transformative multi-use trail project that connects the Manchester University campus with Main Street in downtown North Manchester. This multi-use path will be installed along College Avenue and Market Street.

The Manchester Together plan proposes that the Mile be largely be funded by the Town of North Manchester through INDOT Community Crossing grant funding. The University has committed supplemental funding of \$100,000 to the Mile to enhance the quality of life and place, particularly where INDOT Community Crossing funding does not apply. Our hope is that the resources provided by the Stellar Pathways program could be used to enhance the Manchester Mile project by funding the installation of a 2-foot wide pedestrian buffer with barriers.

BUDGET NARRATIVE

The total project costs includes \$1,450,000 for an asphalt pedestrian buffer and bollards to separate and protect bicyclists from the vehicular traffic. The Town of North Manchester has committed \$150,000 for the local match. The town will work with Manchester University to leverage \$380,000 from the Lilly Endowment funding through the College and Community Collaboration Initiative. With the support from the Stellar Pathways program, the Town of North Manchester can strengthen the Manchester Mile project by incorporating pedestrian safety enhancements.

The Town of North Manchester will be responsible for the ongoing maintenance and repairs of the Manchester Mile projects.

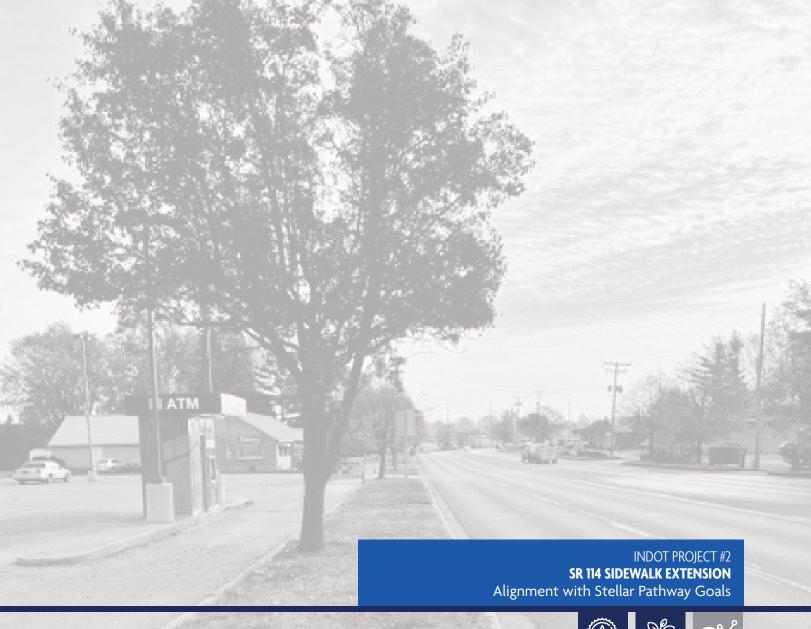

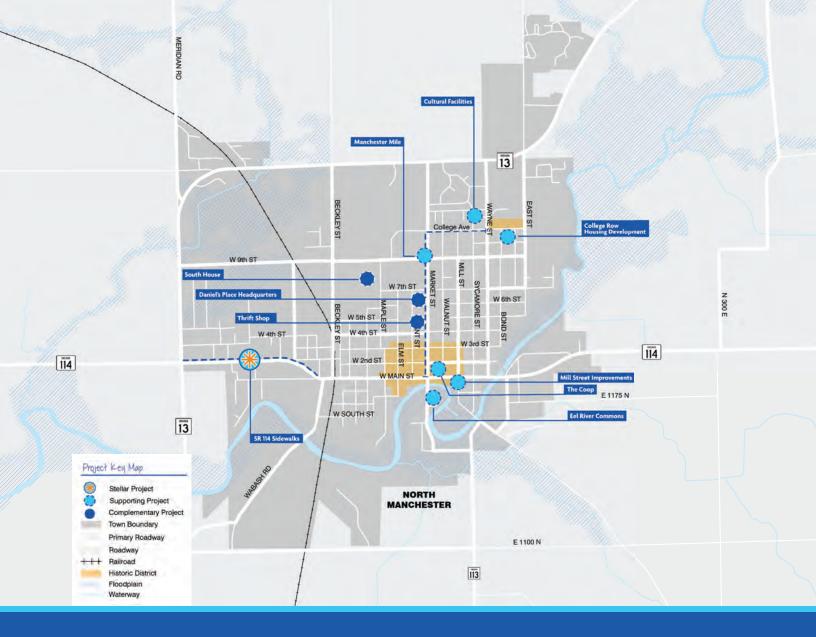
BUDGET NARRATIVE

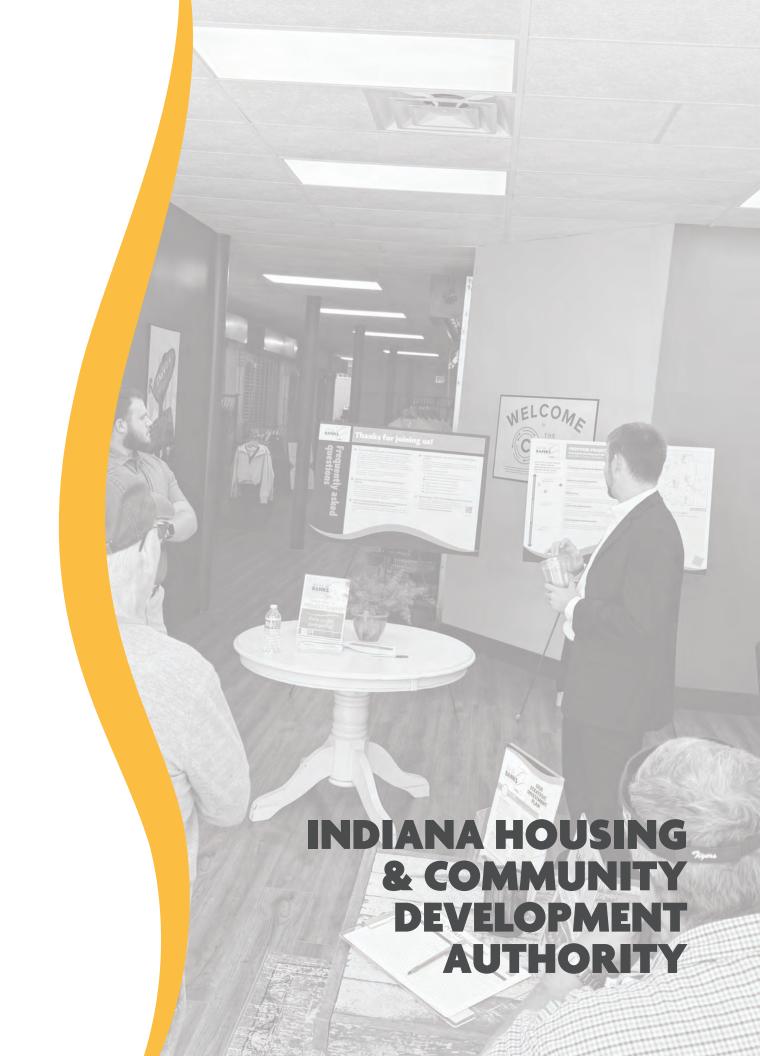

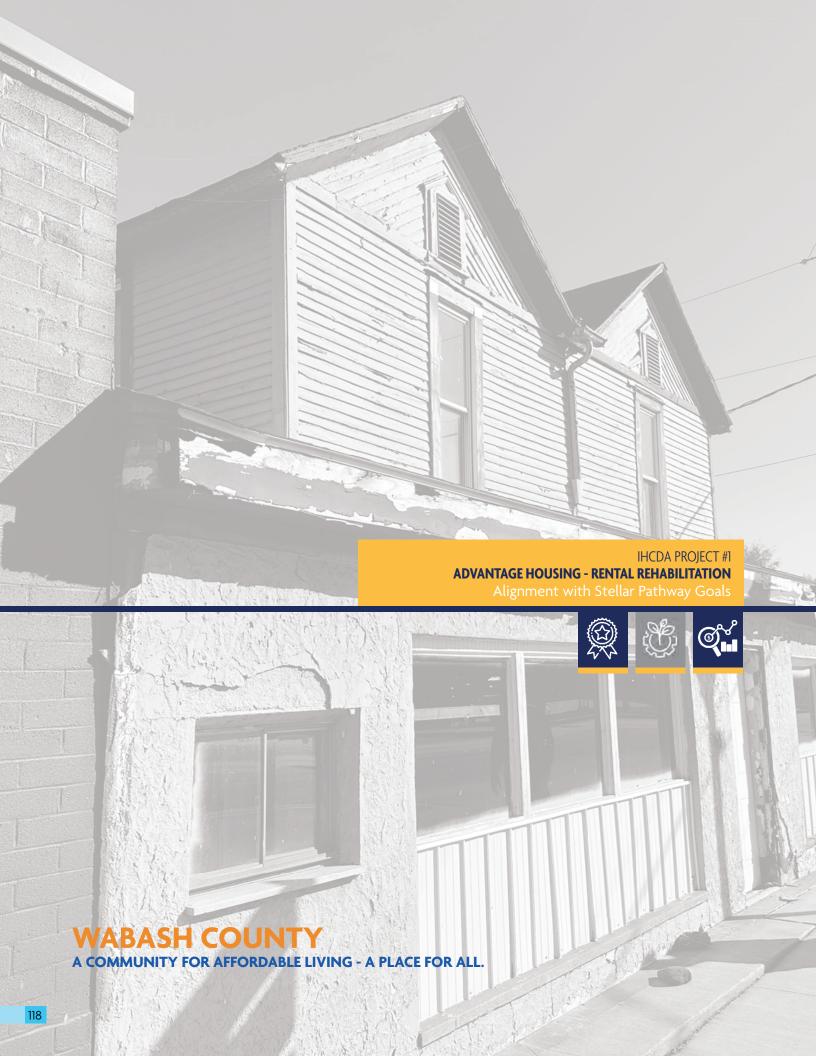
OUR UNDERSTANDING

It is our understanding that IHCDA has set aside \$1,500,000 for each Community Housing Development Organization (CHDO) as part of the Stellar Pathways Program. We understand that funding is from the HOME Investment Partnerships Program which applies to renter-occupied and owner-occupied units. Through discussions with IHCDA during the State Agency Day, our region was told the homeownership program did not require any match but the rental program did require a 25% match. We understand that this funding source comes from federal dollars so we will have to follow HUD requirements. We also understand that this program focuses on providing habitable and affordable housing for low and moderate-income persons.

PROJECT OVERVIEW

The Wabash County region is proposing to use the funding provided by IHCDA to implement TWO strategic initiatives. These two initiatives total \$1.5M in investment and leverage funding from private investment and local dollars. With support from the Stellar Pathways program, our region can move the needle of addressing our housing shortage and increase access to affordable renter and owner-occupied units. PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Advantage Housing is a non-profit organization that focuses on Homeless Prevention by meeting the housing needs of the underserved in North Central Indiana. This organization offers Housing Counseling, short-term housing programs, and other affordable housing programs. This rehabilitation project will restore a dilapidated building to serve as low-income rental housing. The project will reduce the existing structure to a stand-alone property. It will be separated from 571 S. Wabash to the north and from the sidewalk to the west. The space between the buildings will become a lit walkway to the rear parking for both buildings. Once complete, this property will offer two, 2-bedroom townhouse units and one, 1-bedroom handicapped accessible apartment. These units will all be qualified as "Ongoing HOME Rental Housing." The units will have income and rent limits to help battle the lack of quality and affordable housing in Wabash County.

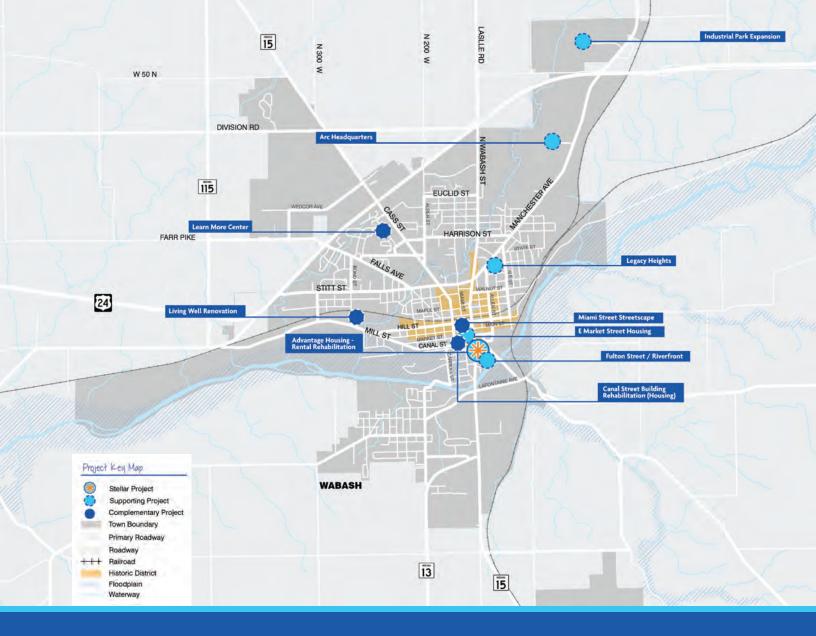
BUDGET NARRATIVE

The total project cost includes \$301,500 for rehabilitation of an existing structure and \$42,210 for administration. The private investment is committed funds from Advantage Housing, a local Community Housing Development Organization (CHDO) in Wabash County. Advantage Housing will provide the 25% match required by IHCDA's HOME Investment Partnership Program. With support from the Stellar Pathways program, Advantage Housing would be able to begin rehabilitating the existing property in Wabash.

PROJECT SUSTAINABILITY

Advantage Housing would be responsible for the long-term sustainability of the housing project. They maintain multiple other properties in Wabash County and have a maintenance and case management support system in place. Advantage Housing's primary sources of revenue come from IHCDA funds, donations, program income, and real estate investments such as rent. This organization has extensive experience working across North Central Indiana with HOME funds through the IHCDA. A list of previous grant awards is provided in Appendix C.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Wabash County has several partners working to provide attainable housing opportunities for current and future residents. This program will encourage multiple agencies to work together to increase the availability of affordable homes for low and moderate-income persons and households. Through this proposed program, the Wabash County Development Corporation (WCDC) would award single-family lots to a qualified developer or non-profit. In return for receiving the lot at no cost, the developer must build and sell the home to an income-eligible home buyer. While specific lots wouldn't be identified until after receiving the Stellar designation, this program is expected to fund 4-6 new single-family units. 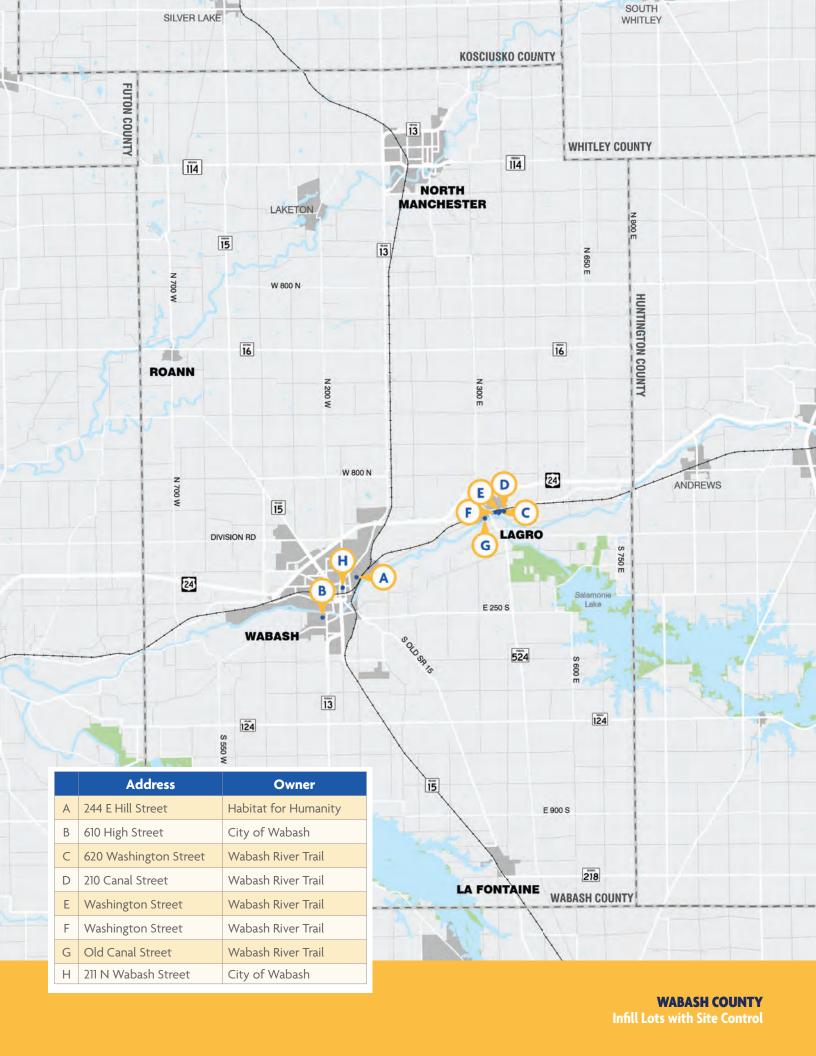
BUDGET NARRATIVE

The total project cost includes \$40,000 for four lots and \$1,200,000 for the construction of the units. The private investment is assuming two lots would come from non-profits such as Habitat for Humanity or Advantage Housing. The local leverage is assuming two additional lots would come from the city and/or towns in Wabash County. With the support of the Stellar Pathways program, Wabash County would be moving the needle on increasing the availability of affordable homes in the county.

PROJECT SUSTAINABILITY

Wabash County Development Corporation is a new 501c3 organization that is in the process of becoming a Community Housing Development Organization (CHDO). This county-wide housing and mixed-use development corporation supports projects and programs that create affordable residential development opportunities. On projects that lack private developer interest, the WCDC will fill the role of developer. The intent would be to use the resources provided by the Stellar Pathways program to create the pilot program and then secure additional grant funding and/or provide low interest, flexible financing after the designation.

It is our understanding that DNR is providing resources and bonus points through three various programs including the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF), Historic Preservation Fund (HPF), and Indiana Trails Program (ITP). PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Wabash Riverwalk Trail Extension project includes the construction of 6,500 feet of additional trail and a bypass (800 feet) for an existing portion of the trail that has to be closed during heavy rain events. The paved, multi-use Wabash Riverwalk Trail currently extends more than seven miles between the Town of Lagro and the City of Wabash. This extension will continue the westerly plans to reach the City of Peru and connect with their riverwalk.

The trail extension will begin at the western terminus at River Street and continue west along the Wabash River and then Charlie Creek. The trail will eventually turn north, cross Edsall Street, and then continue along Market Street. West Market Street will be closed to vehicular traffic and the trail will utilize the existing roadway to cross Charlie Creek and reach Lockerbie Street.

BUDGET NARRATIVE

The total project includes \$96,674 for design and engineering and \$787,950 for construction. The City of Wabash has committed \$484,624 which is payable from the CEDIT Fund and the Rainy-Day Fund. This leaves a gap of \$400,000. With support from the Stellar Pathways Program, the City of Wabash will be able to improve local connectivity and be one step closer to enhancing connectivity westward towards Peru.

PROJECT SUSTAINABILITY

The City of Wabash submitted this project for Indiana Trails Program funding in 2023. While we weren't awarded due to challenges with property owners and land acquisition, this challenge has been resolved. As part of the 2023 application process, a Maintenance and Operation Plan was prepared. This plan indicated that the estimated maintenance and repair costs would be \$3,000 per year. The City of Wabash Parks Department will be given the task of maintaining the trail as directed by the city.

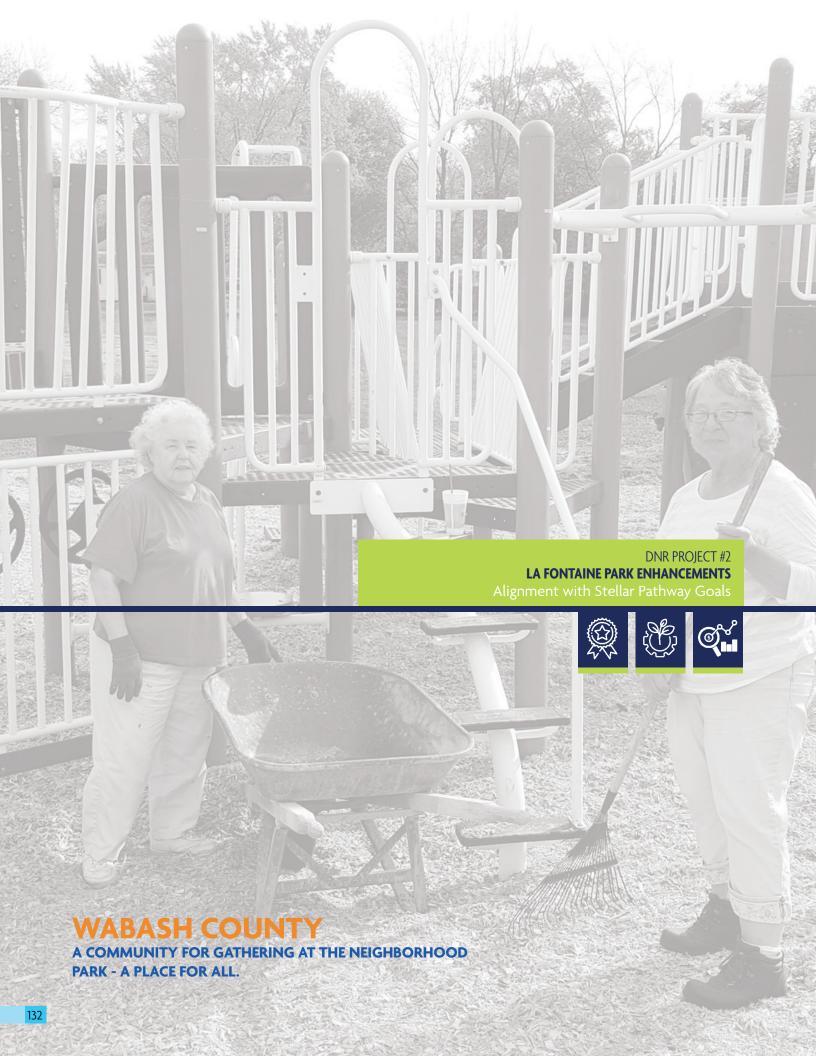

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Cook-Crumley Park is located in the Town of La Fontaine with play equipment, a half court basketball court, and a baseball diamond. The town is in the process of completing a Five-year Parks and Recreation Master Plan and has identified several desirable improvements to this 4.5-acre existing park. The town has worked with Commonwealth Engineering to develop a concept design for the park, which includes phased improvements. Phase 1 includes site preparation, a new pavilion, parking lot, and walking tails.

With a town of fewer than 900 residents, Cook Crumley Park is the only recreational facility within town limits. These enhancements will not only improve park access for residents but also serve as a regional destination.

BUDGET NARRATIVE

The total project cost includes \$460,500 for the construction of the improvements and a 10% contingency. It is anticipated that the local match would come from the Town of La Fontaine and fundraising.

The Town of La Fontaine has two full-time and one part-time grounds workers and an active volunteer that will assist the community in the on-going maintenance and beautification of the park facility. 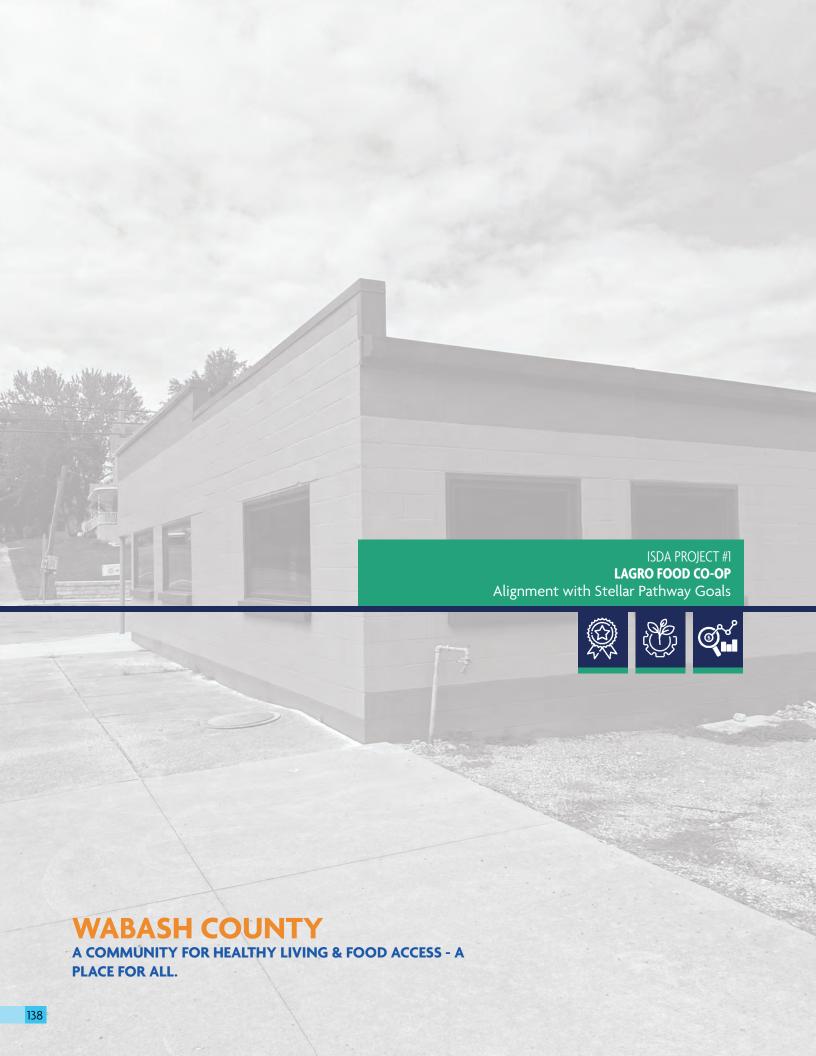
OUR UNDERSTANDING

It is our understanding that ISDA has set aside \$200,000 for the Stellar Pathways Program meaning that each designated region can receive up to \$100,000. We understand this new program was created to empower local communities to address food insecurity and access to healthy food through public and private partnerships. Through discussions with ISDA during the State Agency Day, we understand that this funding is primarily for programs but could also help fund equipment or supplies needed to facilitate a specific program.

PROJECT OVERVIEW

The Wabash County region is proposing to use the funding provided by the ISDA to implement ONE of two strategic initiatives. These two initiatives total \$623,626 in investment and leverage funding from local dollars. The first project idea has an overwhelming amount of community of support and would not only result in a built project but would also open the door for countless programs related to healthy food access and preparation. A local foundation is working hard to get the interior renovations completed with hopes of using the resources provided by ISDA to buy equipment or supplies to help facilitate programs once the co-op becomes operational. In an instance where timelines and resources don't align, we wanted to identify an alternative initiative that could be implemented. This alternative program is working to break the food access and nutrition barriers that many Wabash County residents face. With support from the Stellar Pathways program, our region can improve access to food for rural residents and people who may not know where their next meal is coming from. We invite the ISDA and the other six state agency partners to join us in achieving our goals of growing our population and becoming a more welcoming and inclusive community! The following pages provide an overview of the proposed project and alternative program.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Lagro Canal Foundation has taken strides to renovate the old cafe building at 870 Washington Street with hopes of developing a Food Co-op. The foundation has begun drafting the Co-op bylaws to provide local growers, producers, and consumers a way to become a shareholder. The Lagro Food Co-op would be a community-owned grocery store and cafe that contributes to the economic growth, sustainability, and prosperity of Wabash County.

While exterior improvements such as painting, windows, and roofing have already occurred, there is still a significant amount of construction left to do inside. Not only would this development provide goods, services, and healthy food choices at a fair value, the idea is to also provide programming related to healthy eating, farm-to-table initiatives, and community cooking classes.

This project funding would assist the Lagro Canal Foundation / The Co-op in acquiring equipment and supplies for future, complementary programs. One potential program would be to use the café to facilitate a monthly demonstration series to bring people into the Co-op and educate participants on how to prepare healthy meals with ingredients available at the Co-op.

BUDGET NARRATIVE

The total project cost includes \$117,865 for the materials and labor to finish the interior renovations, \$208,434 for equipment and supplies, and \$212,327 already spent for exterior improvements. The Lagro Canal Foundation successfully funded the \$212,327 through donations. This leaves a gap of \$326,299. With support from the Stellar Pathways Program, the Lagro Canal Foundation could fund a significant portion of the equipment necessary for the café kitchen.

PROJECT SUSTAINABILITY

The Food Co-op would be financially sustained and operated by the Co-op Board of Directors and members. It is anticipated that the Co-op would offer two classes of memberships and three levels of support classes. In addition to membership fees and revenue, it is anticipated that the Co-op will seek other local grants, subsidies, and funding programs that support sustainable agriculture, food security, and/or community development.

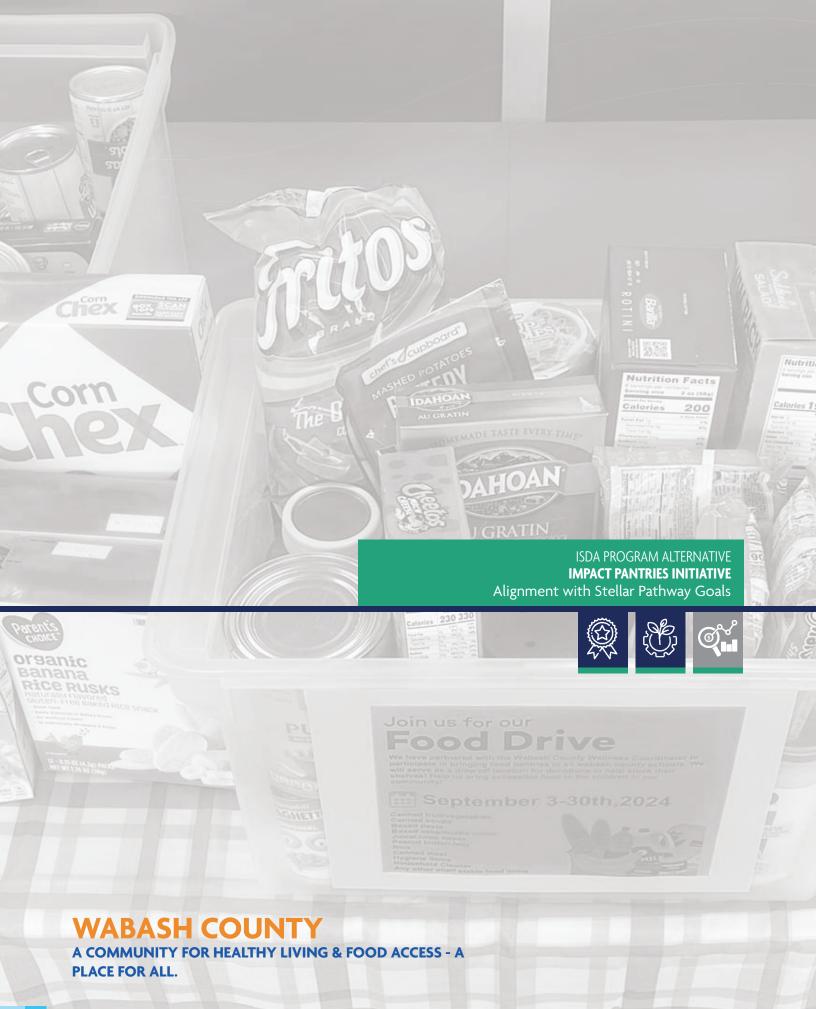

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Through this program, all schools throughout Wabash County will be able to house a food and wellness pantry including a refrigerator/freezer allowing us to meet families where they are. Having pantries equipped with refrigeration/freezer units will allow us to provide not only shelf-stable food items, and wellness/hygiene items, but also fresh produce, protein, and dairy items as well. Many families struggle with transportation, days, and hours of operation as it relates to the local pantries (which are now far and few between) and alternate distribution sites. Providing residents with the ease to ask their child to bring items home or the convenience of picking up necessary items when they are picking up or dropping off their child will be life-changing for many families.

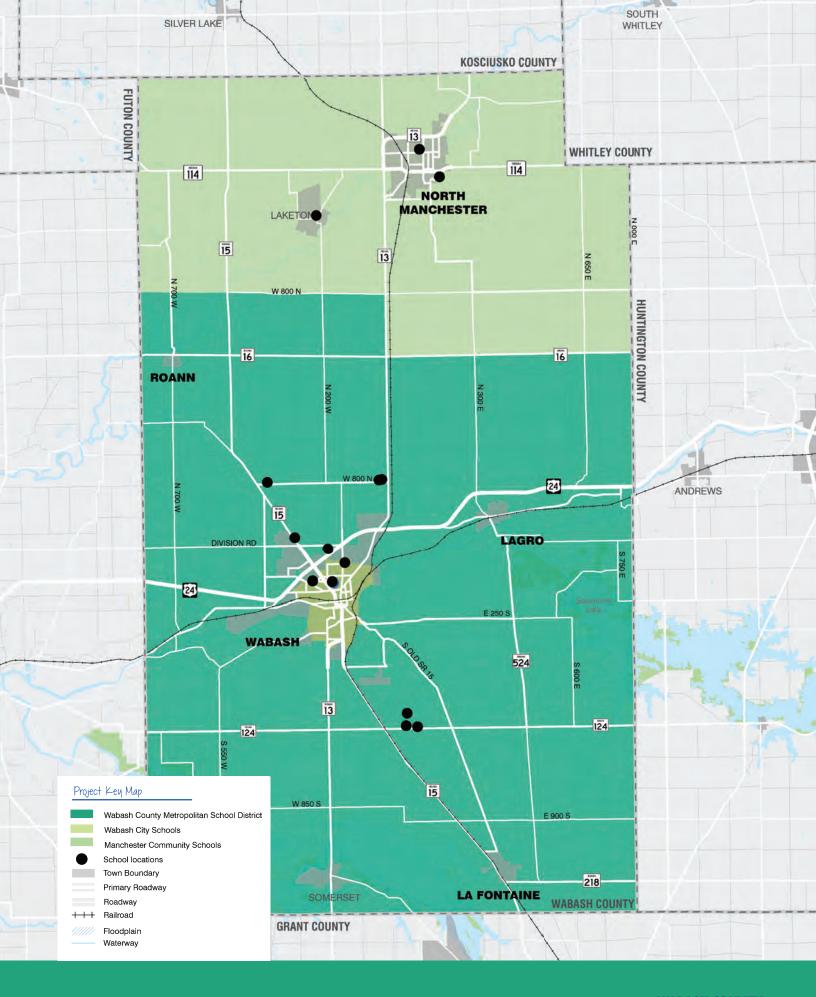
BUDGET NARRATIVE

The total project cost is \$85,000 for start up expenses including refrigerator units, pantry units, inventory, and other supplies such as signage and training materials. This start up cost covers the expense related to providing a pantry at each school throughout the three districts. The local leverage came from a grant provided by Health First Indiana and the other source is funds raised through donations. With the support of the Stellar Pathways program, we will be removing some of the food access and nutrition barriers that many Wabash County residents face.

PROJECT SUSTAINABILITY

This project is currently being rolled out as a pilot program in one school per district with the plan to expand to additional schools in waves as we identify the areas of greatest need. The pilot program is being funded by money provided by Health First Indiana (HFI). The local Community Wellness Coordinator is currently forming a Wabash County Food Security Alliance that will help fight against food insecurity in Wabash County. This alliance would assist in the long-term sustainability of the program by assisting in operating and securing additional funding. The lead entity feels confident in long-term sustainability based on the strong partnerships that have been secured behind this initiative.

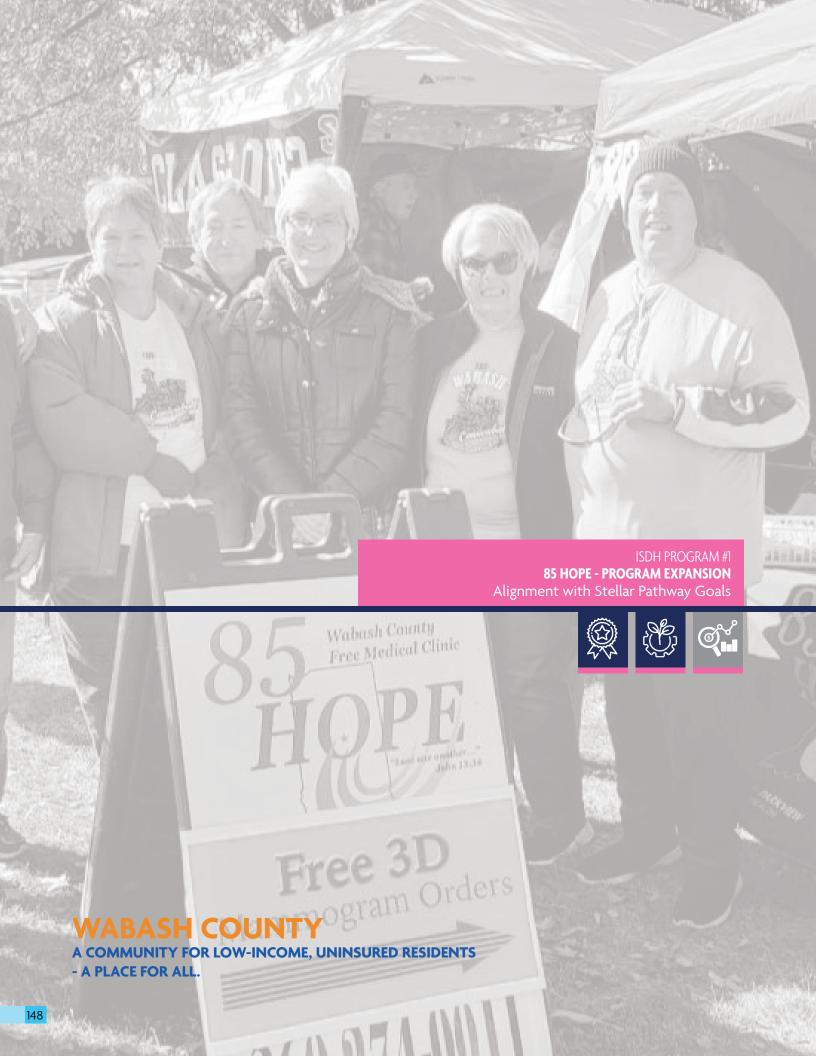
OUR UNDERSTANDING

We understand this funding could be used for a wide range of health-related programs ranging from food access and child obesity to mental and physical health. We understand that the Rural Health and Wellness Grant can be used to fund new programs or enhance existing programs.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

85 HOPE is a free medical clinic that serves low-income adult residents who are uninsured or under-insured. This organization operates two clinics in Wabash and North Manchester. Residents of Wabash County can visit the clinic for a variety of free services ranging from medical exams and physical therapy to lab and radiology resting at Parkview Wabash Hospital, annual mammograms, and health screenings.

Currently, the clinical hours at both locations are very limited. 85 HOPE Wabash is open 5:00-8:00PM every Thursday. 85 HOPE Manchester is open on the first and third Wednesday of each month from 5:00-8:00PM. Because of this limited availability, visitors are required to schedule an appointment. There is a growing demand for the services offered by 85 HOPE. With the resources provided by the Stellar Pathways program, 85 HOPE intends to hire two additional part-time nurse practitioners to serve more people and offer more clinic hours.

BUDGET NARRATIVE

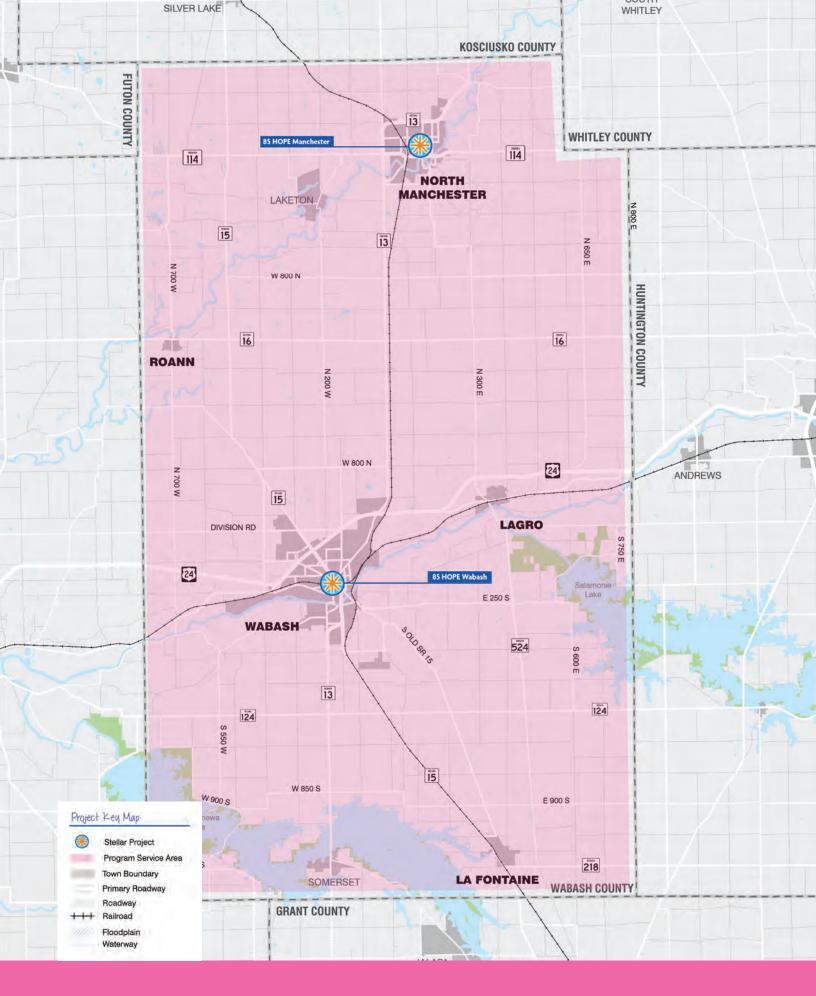
The total project costs includes an estimated \$207,000 for the organizations annual operating expenses and an additional \$75,000 to fund two additional part-time nurse practitioners. The organization relies solely on grants and donations from local churches and community members.

PROJECT SUSTAINABILITY

85 HOPE is generously funded by the Wabash County United Fund, the Community Foundation of Wabash County, Parkview Wabash Hospital, multiple grants, and individual and corporate donations. This organization does not receive any form of federal funding. Since opening its doors in 2011, the clinic has been blessed by the generous hands and hearts of the people of Wabash County.

KEY PERFORMANCE INDICATORS

Performance measurement is a systematic approach used to assess the efficiency and effectiveness of projects and programs. These measurements can be used to monitor whether you are "on-track" to achieve the desired outcomes and to clearly demonstrate the value of the initiative.

Our region's desired accomplishments were identified in Chapter Three: Current Momentum. These achievements included improving the quality of life and place as an approach to stabilizing the population and becoming a more welcoming place for all – regardless of demographics, socioeconomic status, and abilities. Building on these two desired accomplishments, we have identified three key performance indicators (KPI's) that are directly related. The following KPI's will be used to judge progress and achievements based on a series of benchmarks. Each KPI has an "implementation plan" in place that outlines the rationale, responsible party, methodology, audience, reporting frequency, and baseline data. It is anticipated that each of these KPI's would be monitored and reported through the five-year Stellar Pathways designation.

Measurable Outcomes

Maintain a positive annual net migration rate.

Aspirational Goal

Demonstrate positive growth in our total population change by 2030.

Rationale

While Wabash County has posted three consecutive years of positive net migration growth, our overall population continues to decline with an aging population and a birth rate totaling around half of our death rate annually. Wabash County believes that our ability to arrest and reverse population decline is focusing on increasing our positive net migration rate, which measures our ability to attract and retain residents.

Responsibility

Grow Wabash County will be responsible for ensuring accurate and timely data is collected, tracked and analyzed, and reported on an annual basis.

Methodology

We will use Population Change published by Stats Indiana on an annual basis and then confirm this data as the American Community Survey 5-year Estimates are published by the US Census Bureau.

Audience

This KPI data will be reported and published on the Grow Wabash County website. It is anticipated that our website will have a Stellar Dashboard intended to display updates and information related to the program.

• Reporting Frequency

Population statistics will be reported annually.

• Baseline Data

The data shown above has been documented to not only show the 2023 population statistics but also the past three years. The 2023 data should be used as the starting point for this KPI. Furthermore, data from the Indiana Business Research Center projects Wabash County's population total to be at 29,641 by 2030². While we hope this to not be true, we want to document this projection for comparison purposes in the future.

Measurable Outcome

Surpass the average private investment of \$38 million per year.

Aspirational Goal

Secure over \$40M of private investment for three consecutive years.

Rationale

To catalyze increased private investment in Wabash County, our baseline goal is to surpass the average private investment of \$38 million per year, excluding anomalies such as the record-breaking year in 2023 and the impacts of 2020. By implementing targeted strategies, we aim to enhance economic development while ensuring equitable access to opportunities and resources.

• Responsibility

As the leading economic development entity in Wabash County, Grow Wabash County will be responsible for ensuring accurate and timely data is collected, tracked and analyzed, and reported on an annual basis.

Methodology

Grow Wabash County has tracked the private investment projects within the county since 2012. While it is not an exhaustive list, they have a process in place to track this data on an annual basis.

Audience

This KPI data will be reported and published on the Grow Wabash County website. It is anticipated that our website will have a Stellar Dashboard intended to display updates and information related to the program.

• Reporting Frequency

Investment statistics will be reported annually.

• Baseline Data

Aspirational Goal

Increase the total number of housing units by 1200 by 2030.

Rationale

A 2023 county-wide housing market potential analysis concluded that in the next five years, Wabash County could absorb between 1,050 and 1,305 new affordable, workforce, and market-rate housing units. With fewer than 40 homes on the market and scarce rental inventory at any given time, Wabash County's ability to attract and retain residents is hamstrung. Housing development in rural communities can prove to be challenging, oftentimes resulting in slow or stagnant residential inventory growth.

Responsibility

The Wabash County Development Corporation will work with Grow Wabash County to ensure accurate and timely data is collected, tracked and analyzed, and reported on an annual basis.

Methodology

We provide each municipality a template for recording residential development permits and tracking the sale/rent of new units. This data will be combined at the end of each year. We will assess our data source against other popular real estate and housing data sources including Zillow, the US Census Bureau, and the Indiana Housing Dashboard.

• Audience

This KPI data will be reported and published on the Grow Wabash County website. It is anticipated that our website will have a Stellar Dashboard intended to display updates and information related to the program.

• Reporting Frequency

Housing and residential construction statistics will be reported annually.

• Baseline Data

The data shown above indicates the 2023 housing statistics, which should be used as the starting point for this KPI.

PROGRESS REPORT

Following the designation as a Stellar Pathways designee, Wabash County is committed to maintaining and advancing our stakeholder engagement and progress reporting in the following ways:

One Consistent Author - Grow Wabash County will be the primary author of program updates throughout the implementation process. It is anticipated that Grow Wabash County staff will work with Kleinpeter Consulting, our grant administrator, and appropriate project partners to collect qualitative and quantitative data as projects progress. With Grow Wabash County being the primary author of project and program reports, we can ensure that all organizations and stakeholders are receiving the same information in tandem.

Frequent Updates - Throughout the program's implementation, we are prepared to provide reports monthly, quarterly and annually, with data and metrics shifting based on the type of report. By providing consistent communication opportunities throughout the program's implementation, Grow Wabash County can provide updates in real time and in manageable amounts. This approach will provide real-time and meaningful communication over the course of the five-year period. Our reports would include the following:

- Monthly- General project advancement and key milestones met.
- Quarterly- Financial match commitments and draw down requests.
- Annually- Phased project completion and key performance indicator measurements.

Transparent Processes - The development team will continue to meet monthly to report on program activities, opportunities and the advancement of specific initiatives. Regional stakeholders may request to attend and address the development team during their monthly meetings. Upon request, meeting agendas, and summaries can also be provided.

LONG-TERM EXECUTION

Should Wabash County not be granted the Stellar Pathways Program designation, the Strategic Investment Plan (SIP) will still be spearheaded by Grow Wabash County and Imagine One 85. Their leadership in staffing and project management will ensure the successful execution of identified projects and programs moving forward. With Wabash County's established track record of success including demonstrated progress in over 80% of our county-wide action agenda items, our implementation momentum is poised for long-term sustainability.

Moving forward, Wabash County will continue to work together to pursue various funding opportunities that will lead to the implementation of initiatives that are outlined within our SIP. We are actively working to pursue future funding opportunities with Next Level Trails, IHCDA funding programs, the Northeast Indiana Strategic Development Commission, READI 2.0, USDA's Rural Business Development Grant, federal BEAD funding for broadband deployment, Indiana FSSA funding for early childhood education, the Lilly Endowment's Gift VIII Initiative, and Next Level Connections Round 4 and other state, federal, and private grant opportunities.

Additionally, Wabash County will continue to work closely with our economic development partners, private sector, and local philanthropic communities to support the implementation of the SIP through the use of tax abatements, TIF agreements, revolving loan funds, and other available community grant programs.

The Wabash County Community has a proven track record of supporting local initiatives dating back to the implementation of the Stellar Communities' projects, Imagine One 85, and most recently raising over \$500,000 in just over two weeks time to support a large community project through the Manchester Together initiative.

Wabash County's recent success in pursuing various grant opportunities, the local units of government financial stability, facilitating public-private partnerships, and the enormous level of generosity from the philanthropic community allows Wabash County to make an immediate impact even without the resources from the Stellar Pathways Program. While we are well-positioned to move initiatives through the implementation process, our region will be much stronger with the state agencies as our partners. Together, we can make a greater impact.

ORGANIZATIONAL SUSTAINABILITY

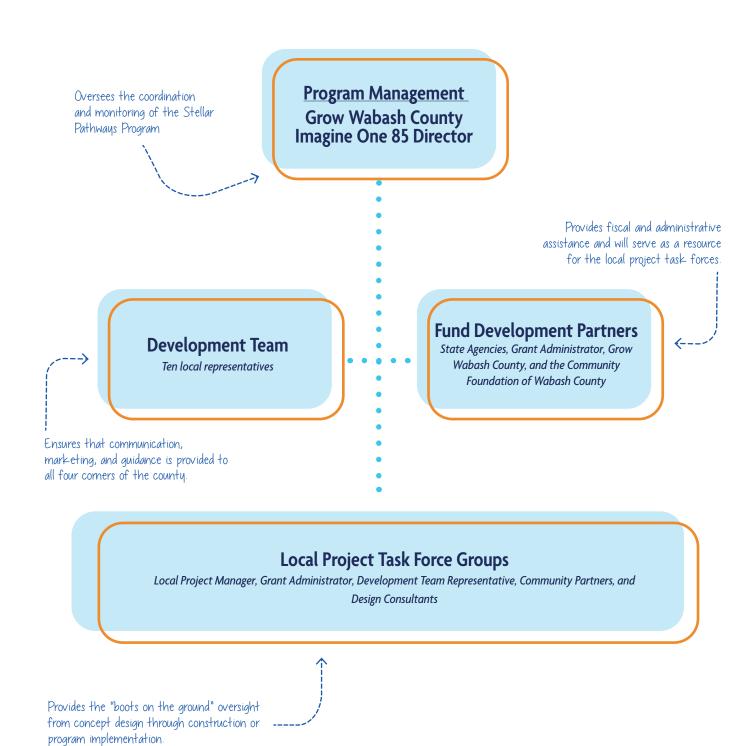
The following section provides a general overview of how our various leaders, partners, and supporters will work together and continue not only during the five-year Stellar Pathways designation period, but also well into the future.

Stellar Pathways Program Management

Grow Wabash County and Imagine One 85 will retain the ultimate responsibility for the implementation of our Stellar Pathways initiatives from a program management perspective. As program managers, we will oversee the coordination and monitoring of the Stellar Pathways projects and programs over the five-year period.

As the lead agency, Grow Wabash County is an organization that strategically combines the county-wide economic development organization and Chamber of Commerce. Grow Wabash County is committed to leveraging its resources, connections, and influence to ensure the long-term viability and success of the Stellar Pathways designation. This organization has been around since 2017 and has played a significant role in securing over \$300 million in private investment county-wide in 2023. Tenille Zartman, President and CEO of Grow Wabash County, will be the primary point of contact. This organization also has marketing staff available to assist with communication and promotion of the Stellar Pathways program designation.

A Director position was created within Grow Wabash County as a result of the Imagine One 85 comprehensive planning effort with the mission of adding capacity to oversee and guide projects through to implementation. Alex Downard, Imagine One 85 Director, will continue to serve as the coordinator and liaison between Grow Wabash County and the local project task forces. Alex has served as the Director since 2022 providing oversight on the implementation of the comprehensive plan. Alex has a diverse network of regional stakeholders and has his hand in nearly all of the community development efforts occurring in Wabash County. As such, our region is ready to "hit the ground running" on ensuring our proposed initiatives have a dedicated point person to facilitate project coordination needs.



Development Team

No structural changes are anticipated in order to facilitate the Stellar Pathways designation. An existing development team comprised of 10 individuals has been meeting since 2022. This group will continue to meet regularly to guide the program development. Their role will continue to serve as a representative group of all the participating municipalities as well as Wabash County to ensure that communication, marketing, and guidance is provided to all four corners of the county. It is anticipated that at least one representative from this development team will be assigned to each local project task force.

Fund Development and Financial Sustainability Partners

This team of program supporters will focus solely on fund development and financial sustainability. These individuals, made up of local and state partners, will provide fiscal and administrative assistance and will serve as a resource for the local project task forces. Key members of this group include an OCRA-certified grant administrator, a representative from each state agency partner, and representation from Grow Wabash County and the Community Foundation of Wabash County. These two local organizations were selected based on their familiarity with specific tasks or processes.

Grow Wabash County staff is familiar with the development process and can provide guidance related to getting built projects across the finish line. The Community Foundation of Wabash County is familiar with implementing quality of life initiatives and administering grants, endowment, and non-permanent funds that support a variety of community needs.

The local grant administrator will act as the liaison between the local project task forces and the state agency partners as they fulfill the various technical grant requirements for each of the appropriate project and funding entities.

We view both the grant administrator, and the state agencies, as implementation partners that provide technical assistance and collaboration with our local representatives to advance the proposed initiatives.

Local Project Task Force Group

A local task force group shall be established for each of the respective projects with a member from the development team serving as a liaison between the task force, larger community, and program managers. This task force group will also have a designated project manager from the entity (public or private sector) leading the construction project or program. This project manager will provide the "boots on the ground" oversight from concept design through construction or program implementation. Ultimately, the task force group will be responsible for the local project communication and delivery, coordinating with the Imagine One 85 Director and grant administrator on project delivery.

FINANCIAL SUSTAINABILITY

The following section provides a general overview of how our region plans to continue building on the momentum of the Stellar Pathways program not only during the five-year Stellar designation period but also well into the future.

The momentum provided as part of the Stellar Pathways designation will serve as the needed catalyst to move the projects forward in a timelier manner. The Stellar Pathways program is value-added to the Wabash County region and will serve as a starting point, not an end destination. Each of our participating communities are committed to excellence and elevating the quality of life within our communities. This is evident by the resources we have identified and committed to support the proposed initiatives.

The completion of these projects will continue to leverage additional investment in our region, which will be further enhanced by the marketing and promotion of the projects post-completion.

Each of the proposed projects and programs have cost estimates and letters of support from various funding sources. This type of supplementation information can be found with Appendices C and D starting on page 267. Wabash County feels confident in our ability to fulfill required grant matches and secure financial contributions from our partners. In a situation where we may fall short, our region has passionate philanthropic partners that will band together in times of need. We have several examples of this happening in the recent past including:

- The Lilly Endowment's College and Community Collaboration Initiative required a 70% local match for the requested grant funding. The University and Community were able to identify and secure over \$30M in match sources including raising over \$500,000 in private donations in less than two weeks to support the initiative.
- The Community Foundation has successfully launched a \$4M campaign to raise money to support the Imagine Early and early childhood education initiatives in Wabash County.
- Wabash County is an extremely philanthropic community and is home to three major anchor institutions each with endowments of over \$80M respectively.

Once the Stellar Pathways resources have been depleted, we will continue to pursue and utilize both traditional and nontraditional funding and implementation tools – many of which were referenced throughout the SIP. Project and program sustainability was a highly valued consideration throughout the development of the Strategic Investment Plan.

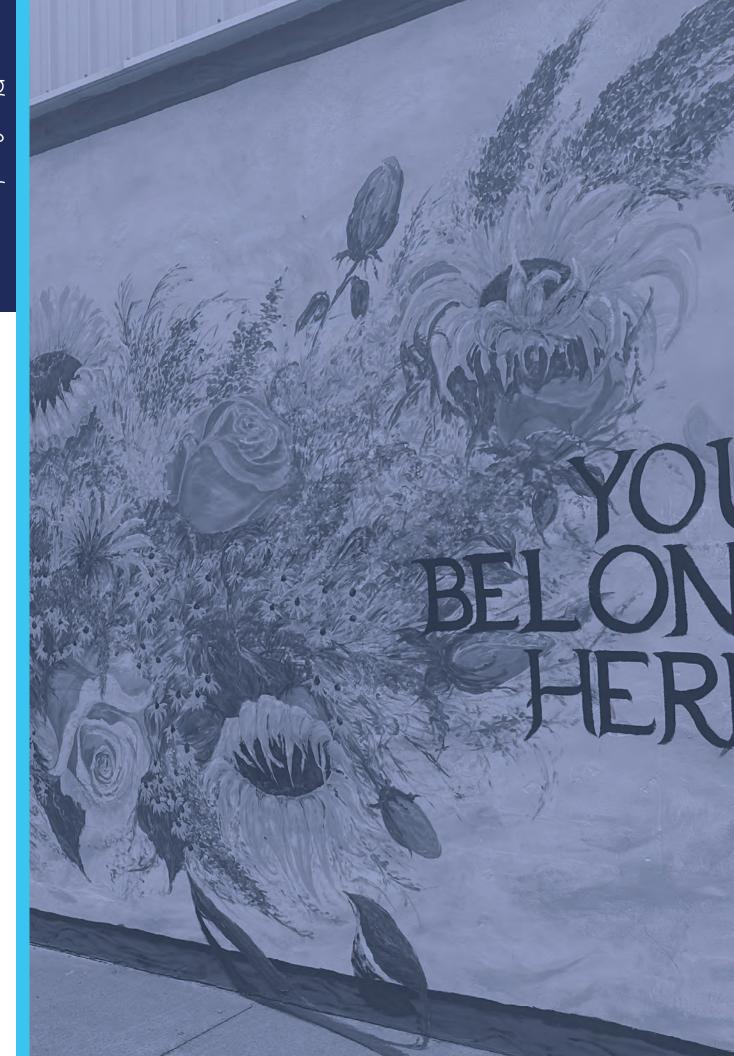
The development team worked closely with our stakeholders and consulting team members to adequately plan for necessary resources to execute on the projects, but also make an intentional effort to plan for the various long-term maintenance and staffing needs for each project. By prioritizing future project needs in the planning process, Wabash County ensures ownership in the implementation and sustainability of the Strategic Investment Plan.

COMMUNITY SUSTAINABILITY

The following section provides a general overview of how our region intends to maintain our culture of collaboration and sense of ownership during and postimplementation.

Our plan for community sustainability is directly related to our process for progress reporting outlined on page 158. Wabash County is committed to deploying the following strategies to continue informing and engaging the community.

- One Consistent Author With Grow Wabash
 County being the primary author of project
 and program reports, we can ensure that all
 organizations and stakeholders are receiving the
 same information in tandem.
- Frequent Updates We are prepared to provide reports monthly, quarterly and annually, with data and metrics shifting based on the type of report.
- Transparent Processes The Development
 Team will continue to meet monthly to report
 on program activities, opportunities and
 the advancement of specific initiatives. The
 community can request to attend and address
 this group at any time.





UPDATING OUR PLANS & PROJECTS

A common challenge with any long-term planning effort is ensuring the regional goals, priorities, and projects stay aligned as the community adapts to changing circumstances, identifies new opportunities, addresses unexpected challenges or risks, and positions itself for continued growth and success.

As new or updated project opportunities are presented, the development team will serve as a convener of resources to help move additional projects forward. While we don't anticipate any major changes to the proposed Stellar Pathways initiatives, our region is committed to maintaining and updating our county-wide plans. As our region works through the Stellar Pathways designation and its proposed projects, we fully anticipate that new opportunities and stakeholders will join us at the table.

This Stellar Pathways process, in combination with the previous Imagine One 85 planning initiative, has brought together the communities and county in a way that is unprecedented. Each of the participating municipalities are supportive of the collective goals that have been established as part of the Stellar Pathways program, and have been, and are continuing to work together to advance those collective goals. As a region, there is an understanding that we are stronger together and can accomplish a broader range of impactful initiatives that increase economic vitality and quality of life. In the long run, all of these initiatives and planning processes will aid in our endeavor to reverse the population trends in the county and set up the county for positive growth.

This process has brought new participants to the table as each community has a local representative on the development team. While each community and the county may face independent challenges, collectively there is a recognition and willingness to expand capacity through the identification of realistic projects that build off extensive public engagement and outreach. By executing projects rooted at the local ground level, our culture of collaboration and sense of ownership will remain strong as we move forward.

INTRODUCTION

Understanding the current conditions of a region is the first step to planning for the future. These conditions, including demographics and economic data, define where a community is today and should be used to inform decisions related to where the community wants to be tomorrow. The following summary provides a snapshot of the region's existing conditions and provides an inventory of key anchor institutions. This analysis is intended to identify regional assets, opportunities for growth, and challenges that the region is or may be facing in the future. These opportunities and challenges were used to inform the identification of the projects and programs identified within Wabash County's Strategic Investment Plan.

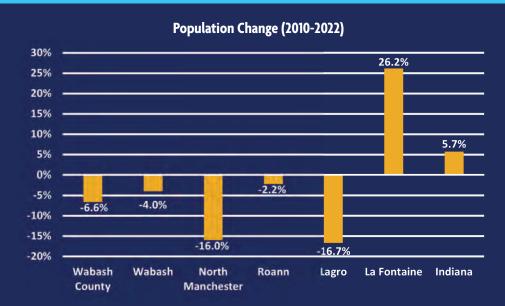
POPULATION CHANGE

Wabash County's population has been decreasing since 1980.

Wabash County's population peaked in 1980 at 36,500 residents. Since then, between 50 – 100 households have left each year. Fast forward several decades, Wabash County was home to 33,225 people in 2010 which means the region had lost nearly 9% of its total population over the course of 30 years.

According to the most recent American Community Survey (2022), Wabash County has lost an additional 6.6% of its population since 2010. This data confirms that the County has continued to follow an overall trend of population decline that has impacted the county for almost 40 years. A shrinking population can have several effects on a community or region. For example, a municipality with a declining population may experience reduced tax revenues or a struggling housing market. Such issues can affect both the municipality and its residents as resources become strained.

AGE STRUCTURE

The median age of county residents is rapidly increasing.

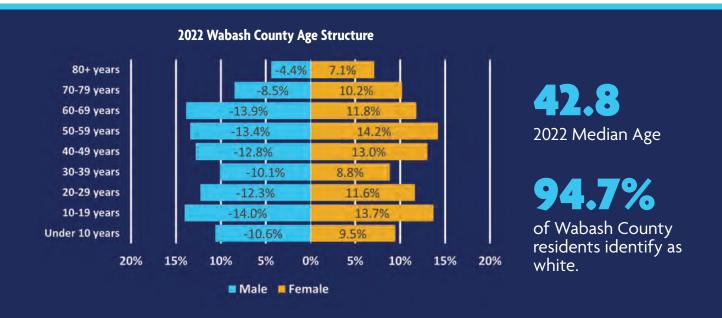
The county's median age refers to the middle age of the population, or the age of which half of residents are older and half are younger. Since 2010, the median age among Wabash County's residents has increased from 40.8 years in 2010 to 42.8 years in 2022. This increase implies the population under 40 years old is shrinking. If younger populations are not retained as older populations retire, the county's workforce would shrink. This would lead to a decline in the availability of labor which may negatively impact local businesses and industry. An aging population could also impact housing, social programs, and health-related services. As residents age, their needs for different types of housing and services becomes greater. This would eventually result in a greater strain on resources that support senior programs and healthcare.

RACE/ETHNICITY

Race and ethnicity demographics have changed only slightly since 2010.

The US Census Bureau considers race and ethnicity as two distinct topics with different categorizations. There are several race categories referring to broad racial groups that can be made up of a mix of sociocultural groups, national origins, and other racial groups. In contrast, there is one ethnicity category that specifically refers to whether a person identifies as Hispanic or Latino. This information is self-reported by each individual that responds to the US Census, meaning they can identify themselves as any mix of races and ethnicity as they see fit.

Overall, Wabash County's population has become marginally more diverse since 2010. By 2022, the share of the population identifying as White has decreased by about 2% while the share of nearly every other racial category has increased.



The greatest increase was recorded in the population identifying as Two or More Races which grew from 0.6% of the county's population to over 2%. A small increase was also recorded among the population identifying as Black or African American. In 2010, this group accounted for 0.7% of the county but, as of 2022, it has grown to accommodate over 1% of the population.

HOUSEHOLDS

In Wabash County, it is becoming more common for people to live alone or with roommates than with families.

The US Census defines a household as a group of individuals living within a single housing unit. There are two types of households, family households and non-family households. A family household is a household in which the members are directly related to one another. In contrast, a non-family household consists of either individuals that are not related to one another or a single individual.

Like the population, the overall number of households in Wabash County is in decline. Since 2010, the county has experienced a more than 4% decrease in the number of households and has seen a shift in the household composition. In 2022, Wabash County was made up of 66% family households and 34% nonfamily households which means there are now more non-family household than before. The increase in non-family households is aligned with a slight decrease in the average household size. Average household size refers to the average number of individuals living within each household.

In 2010, Wabash County's average household size was 2.38 people per household. In 2022, it is 2.34 people per household.

HOUSING UNITS / OCCUPANCY

Vacancy rate is increasing as the overall number of housing units continues to decrease.

The US Census has three classifications for housing including owner-occupied housing, renter-occupied housing, and vacant housing. Owner-occupied housing accounts for housing units in which the occupant is also the homeowner whereas renter-occupied housing refers to housing units the occupant is renting. Vacant housing is made up of unoccupied housing units.

In Wabash County, the percentage of housing units that are owner-occupied, renter-occupied, or vacant has experienced some change. In 2010, there were 14,238 housing units in the county. Of these units, over 71% were owner-occupied, 20% were renter occupied, and more than 8% were vacant. As of 2022, there are 14,053 housing units, of which over 70% are owner-occupied, roughly 18% are renter-occupied, and 11% are vacant.

While increasing vacancy rates are typical in communities with decreasing populations, this data point alone doesn't paint an accurate story of housing in Wabash County. With limited inventory and very few new builds, competition among buyers is fierce. If a unit is vacant, it is likely because of challenging property owner, or the unit is dilapidated beyond repair.





HOUSING TYPES

Housing in the county is primarily made up of single-family homes.

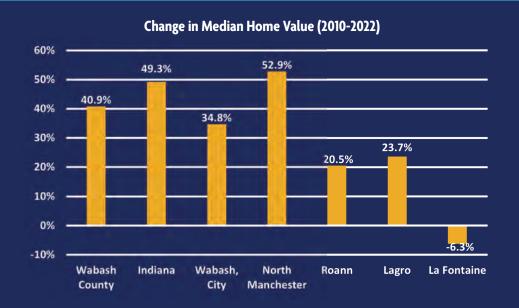
In both 2010 and 2022, the housing stock in Wabash County was primarily made up of single-family homes. In 2010, over 78% of housing units were in single-family detached structures and just over 1% were single-family attached structures. Additionally, almost 13% of housing units were in multi-family structures and nearly 8% were in mobile homes. By 2022, the percentage of units that were in multi-family structures or mobile homes decreased while the percentage of single-family units increased. In 2022, over 83% of units were in single-family detached structures and almost 2% were in single-family attached structures.

HOME VALUES

Generally, home values are rapidly increasing in Wabash County.

A significant measure of local home values is the median home value in an area. The median home value is the middle home value, or amount at which half of owner-occupied housing is valued at a higher amount and half is valued at a lower amount. In 2010, the median home value of owner-occupied housing in Wabash County was \$96,400. By 2022, it had increased by over 40% to \$135,800. Additionally, in 2010, over 50% of owner-occupied housing was valued under \$100,000. In 2022, less than 32% is valued under \$100,000.

This rapid increase in home values has occurred while the total number of housing units has decreased. This drives home values, sales prices, and rents upward and indicates that the housing market is competitive. In economic terms, the supply of housing is shrinking while the demand is growing. Over the last ten years, the county has outpaced the state in median sales price growth (85% increase in the county compared to 70% in Indiana) while losing more than 1,000 residents.

ECONOMIC BASE

MEDIAN HOUSEHOLD INCOME

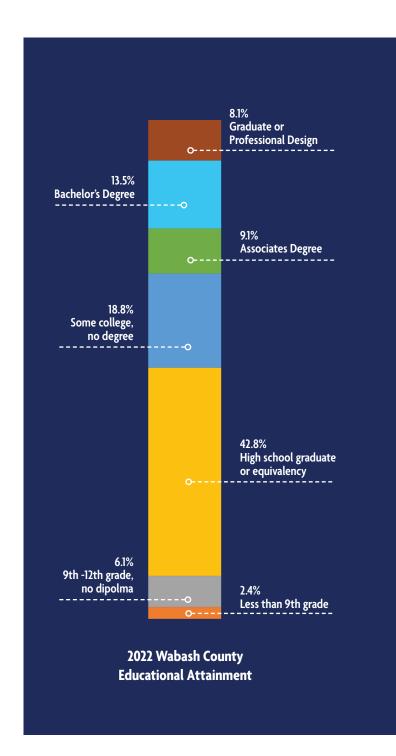
Generally, household incomes are growing faster in Wabash County than in Indiana.

In 2010, Wabash County had a median household income of \$43,157. As of 2022, the median household income has increased by over 53% to \$66,194. This rate of growth has outpaced Indiana's, which, from 2010 to 2022, experienced a nearly 41% increase in median household income. This increase in household income could be related to a shift in industries. Within the same time period, Wabash County experienced the greatest change in the transportation, logistics, and warehousing industry (22%) and the finance and Insurance industry (17%).

EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT

Postsecondary levels of educational attainment are increasing in Wabash County.

The US Census Bureau records different levels of educational attainment for individuals over 25 years old. In 2010, 22,172 residents of Wabash County were aged 25 years and over. Of this population, nearly 45% graduated high school but did not receive a postsecondary education, and only 16% of the population over 25 years old received a bachelor's degree or higher. While the county's total population over 25 years old decreased to 21,621 by 2022, nearly 22% received a bachelor's degree or higher.

LABOR FORCE

As the county's population decreases, so does its labor force.

A community's labor force is its population that is both older than 16 years and is working or actively looking for work. In 2010, Wabash County had a population of 26.710 residents that were older than 16 years. Of this population, roughly 62% were participating in the labor force, meaning 16,477 residents of Wabash County were working or looking for work. Each of these statistics experienced a decline over the last twelve years. As of 2022, Wabash County has 25,227 residents over 16 years old. An estimated 14,946 of these residents are working or looking for work giving the county a roughly 59% labor force participation rate.

As the local population and labor force continue to decrease, businesses and industry in the county may struggle to find local workers. This challenge is amplified when considering the housing market. Even if a business could recruit workers from outside of the county, the potential worker may struggle to find an available housing unit nearby.

MAJOR EMPLOYERS/INDUSTRIES

Wabash County's major employers have been significant employers for more than ten years.

In both 2010 and 2022, the manufacturing industry employed the largest percentage of Wabash County's labor force than any other industry. This industry includes employers involved in the production of goods and materials. In 2010, over 26% of the labor force was employed in manufacturing. By 2022, this had grown to over 28% of the labor force. Similarly, the educational services, healthcare, and social assistance industry employed the second largest percentage of the county's labor force in both 2010 and 2022. This includes employers like schools, universities, and hospitals. The industry employed almost 24% in 2010 and nearly 26% in 2022.

Other industries, including the retail trade which is the third largest employer, experienced declines since 2010.

The retail trade industry includes shops or stores that sell goods. This industry went from employing almost 11% of the labor force in 2010 to just over 10% in 2022.

The three industries mentioned above have been major employers in Wabash County for at least a decade. If one of these industries were to struggle, or a large facility or company were to shut down, Wabash County and its residents would be impacted. A significant population would be left without employment, meaning it would leave the county or place strain on local unemployment resources.

OCCUPATIONAL

The percentages of the working population employed in different occupations have experienced little change since 2010.

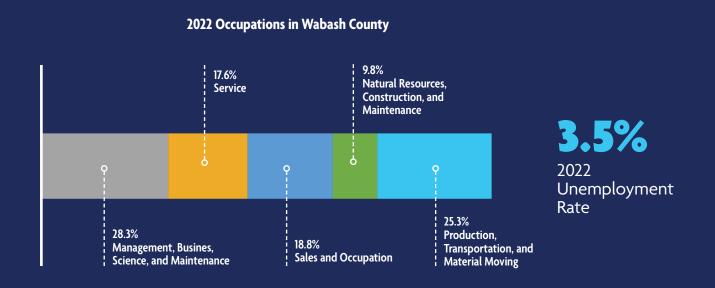
The US Census Bureau records the fields in which people work. These fields are divided into five categories of occupations. Since 2010, the percentage of Wabash County's employed population working within each of these occupations has slightly changed. The only occupations categories to experience growth in employment were service occupations and production, transportation, and material moving occupations. From 2010 to 2022, the percentage of the working population employed in service occupations grew from nearly 16% in 2010 to almost 18% in 2022. Comparatively, the percentage of the working population employed in production, transportation, and material moving occupations increased from over 24% of the working population in 2010 to more than 25% in 2022.

In contrast, the management, business, science, and arts occupations saw no change in that it employed 28% of the working population in both 2010 and 2022. Every other occupational group experienced slight decreases in employment.

UNEMPLOYMENT RATE

The county's overall unemployment rate has declined over the past decade.

Unemployment rates have greatly declined following the economic recession of the late 2000s. In 2010, Wabash County had an unemployment rate of roughly 8.5%. This was larger than Indiana's rate of 8.4%. As of 2022, the county's unemployment rate (3.5%) is lower than the state's (4.5%). Wabash County's employment recovery was both greater and faster than Indiana's statewide recovery.



ANCHOR INSTITUTIONS

PUBLIC LIBRARIES

There are four libraries in Wabash County. These include the Wabash Carnegie Public Library, North Manchester Public Library, Roann-Paw Paw Township Public Library, and Troyer Memorial Library in La Fontaine. Each of these facilities offers different events for various age groups like children's summer reading programs, computer classes, Lego clubs, teen and adult book clubs, or arts and crafts programs.

HOSPITAL/CLINICS

Parkview Health, founded in Fort Wayne, Indiana, is the largest healthcare provider in Wabash County. It operates one hospital and several clinics throughout the county. The hospital, Parkview Wabash Hospital, is located along US Hwy 24 on the north side of Wabash. In connection with this hospital, there are multiple Parkview outpatient and other clinics in Wabash and North Manchester. Other clinics in Wabash County, also located in Wabash or North Manchester, are within the Lutheran Health, NuStart, or American Health networks.

In addition, there is a free healthcare clinic in Wabash County. This clinic, 85 Hope, offers free healthcare to uninsured individuals in need of medical care.

COMMUNITY CENTERS

A community center is a building or place that acts as a defined gathering place for hosting events or bringing the surrounding community together. Often, community centers offer residents or organizations one or more rooms to rent for public or private events. Several such facilities operate within Wabash County. However, community centers can also provide other services to the community depending on their facilities. The following outline lists and describes the many community centers in Wabash County.

Honeywell Arts and Entertainment is a nonprofit organization that promotes fine arts throughout the county. This organization owns the Honeywell Center

located in downtown Wabash. The Honeywell Center acts partly as a community center in that it has several facilities that can host both public and private events. These facilities include a theater, performance halls, dining halls, conference rooms, and more.

The Dallas L. Winchester Senior Center is another community center in Wabash. However, this facility caters itself to local seniors through focused gatherings and events. The Winchester Senior Center, managed by Living Well in Wabash County, offers opportunities for seniors to gather and take part in special programs designed to help them socialize and maintain their health.

In North Manchester, there are two community centers that fulfill different local needs. The first center, the Town Life Center, offers a gymnasium, a large activity or conference room, and a smaller meeting room for residents or local organizations to host events. The Town Life Center also features a coworking space that is currently occupied by six local businesses and nonprofit organizations. The second community center, the Strauss-Peabody Aquatic and Fitness Center, provides residents with a community gym and indoor pools. The pools, and an additional community room, are available for residents to rent by the hour.

In addition to the facilities in Wabash and North Manchester, there are smaller community centers in Roann, La Fontaine, and the unincorporated community of Richvalley. In Roann, the Roann Community Center offers a space for residents or organizations to rent and host events. The La Fontaine Community Center, in La Fontaine, also provides a space to rent and host events. Additionally, the facility is owned and operated by the local branch of the Lion's Club. Similarly, the Richvalley Community Center, located in an unincorporated community west of Wabash, is also managed by the Lions Club. The facility offers a space for local events and gatherings and is regularly used by the Lions Club to serve meals.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS

There are three school districts in Wabash County: Manchester Community Schools, Metropolitan School District of Wabash County, and Wabash City Schools. The following outline describes the school districts, their service areas, and their facilities.

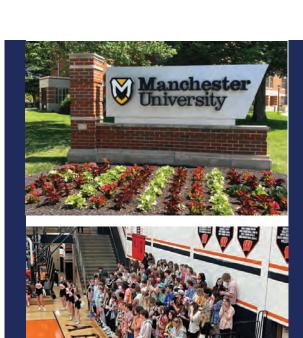
Manchester Community Schools provides a K-12 education to students in northern Wabash County. This includes the Town of North Manchester and any unincorporated areas north of SR 16 and Reahard Road. There are three schools in the district, Manchester Elementary School, Manchester Intermediate School, and Manchester Jr-Sr High School.

The Metropolitan School District of Wabash County provides a K-12 education for students in Roann, Lagro, La Fontaine, the outermost limits of Wabash, and all unincorporated areas of the county south of SR 16. The district has six school facilities spread throughout the county. These include Metro North Elementary School, Sharp Creek Elementary School, Northfield Jr-Sr High School, Southwood Elementary School, Southwood Jr-Sr High School, and White's Jr-Sr High School.

Wabash City Schools services most of the City of Wabash by providing a K-12 education to students in the city. There are four schools in the district: LH Carpenter Early Learning Center, O J Neighbors Elementary School, Wabash Middle School, and Wabash High School.

HIGHER EDUCATION

Within Wabash County, there is only one higher education institution. Manchester University, located in North Manchester, is a private university associated with the Church of the Brethren. The university also has a secondary location in Fort Wayne. Approximately 1,300 students are enrolled at Manchester University with nearly 1,000 living on the campus in North Manchester. The university offers roughly 80 academic programs, including four master's programs, a doctorate program in pharmacy, and more than 70 undergraduate majors.

Wabash County – Strategic Investment Plan Public Meeting Summary October 10, 2024

Meeting Summary

The project team facilitated two public meetings for the development of the Wabash County Stellar Pathways plan on October 10, 2024. The first meeting occurred in the early afternoon from 12:00 to 2:00 pm at The Coop in North Manchester. The second meeting occurred in the evening from 5:00 to 8:30 pm at the Honeywell Center in Wabash. The purpose of both meetings was to gather input on the proposed Stellar Pathways projects and allow community members to select which projects they believe would have the greatest impact in Wabash County.

Overview and Discussion

The project team prepared eight boards that describe each proposed Stellar project and the potential source of funding it could receive through the Stellar Pathways Program. Attendees at each meeting were encouraged to interact with the boards and leave feedback with stickers, sticky notes, or feedback forms. Attendees were also encouraged to take, and share, an online survey that would collect additional feedback from residents. This feedback will be used to determine which projects are favorable for Wabash County and will have the greatest potential impact in the community.

The following summary outlines the feedback received on each board.

1. Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Board

- a. This board listed five potential projects and asked meeting attendees if they believe the projects will have a high, moderate, or low impact in Wabash County. The projects are
 - i. La Fontaine Stormwater Improvements
 - ii. Daniels Place Headquarters
 - iii. Roann Park
 - iv. Living Well Renovation
 - v. Lagro Sidewalk Improvements
- b. Throughout both meetings, 14 total people considered these projects to be high impact for the county. No attendees identified these projects as moderate or low impact.
- c. Of the five additional comments left on this board, four mentioned Daniel's Place and stated that it is an important project for Wabash County. The fifth comment stated each project has been planned and will have a significant impact, but they are waiting for funding opportunities.

2. Indiana Housing and Community Development Authority (IHCDA) Board

- a. This board listed two potential projects and asked meeting attendees if they believe the projects will have a high, moderate, or low impact in Wabash County. The projects are
 - i. Advantage Housing Rental Rehabilitation
 - ii. County-Wide Owner-Occupied Infill Program
- b. Throughout both meetings, 15 total attendees identified these projects as high impact. No attendees considered them to be moderate or low impact.
- c. Of the four additional comments on this board, three addressed the County-Wide Owner-Occupied Infill Program. They suggested it should also consider infill opportunities at sites in North Manchester. The fourth stated much of the county's housing stock is old and these projects will help improve the overall quality of housing.

3. Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) Board

- a. This board listed two potential projects and asked meeting attendees if they believe the projects will have a high, moderate, or low impact in Wabash County. The projects are
 - i. Manchester Mile Safety Enhancements
 - ii. State Road 114 Sidewalks
- b. Throughout both meetings, eight total attendees identified these projects as high impact and two attendees identified them as moderate impact. No attendees considered them to be low impact.
- c. Of the four additional comments on the board, two specified that sidewalks should be extended to the Chester Heights neighborhood in North Manchester. One of these comments highlighted the importance of connecting Chester Heights to Manchester University.
 - i. Another comment suggested implementing native plantings for pollinators along the road.
 - ii. The fourth comment stated that they have seen residents walking in the road on State Road 114 due to the lack of sidewalks.

4. Indiana Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Board

- a. This board listed two potential projects and asked meeting attendees if they believe the projects will have a high, moderate, or low impact in Wabash County. The projects are
 - i. Wabash Riverwalk Extension
 - ii. La Fontaine Park Project
- b. Throughout both meetings, eight total attendees identified these projects as high impact and two attendees identified them as moderate impact. No attendees considered them to be low impact.
- c. This board received three additional comments.
 - i. One suggested constructing a riverwalk in North Manchester.
 - ii. Another stated the La Fontaine Park would be a great addition and add much needed public space to the community.
 - iii. Another stated that, though these projects would improve quality of life, housing is more important to increasing population.

5. Indiana Department of Agriculture Board

- a. This board listed one potential project and asked meeting attendees if they believe it will have a high, moderate, or low impact in Wabash County.
 - i. Lagro Grocery Store
- b. Throughout both meetings, nine total attendees identified the project as high impact, one attendee identified it as moderate impact, and one identified it as low impact.
- c. This board received two additional comments.
 - i. One comment asked who will manage the grocery store and if it will be managed by a private or non-profit organization.
 - ii. The other comment mentioned Purdue Extension's food programs designed to mitigate food insecurity. It may be able to use additional funding.

6. Indiana Department of Health Board

- a. This board listed four potential projects that could be included in the Stellar Pathways plan. It asked meeting attendees to vote for the project they think would have the greatest impact in Wabash County. The vote is as follows:
 - i. 85 Hope 11 votes
 - ii. Art Therapy in Local Hospitals 0 votes
 - iii. Bashbags 0 votes
 - iv. Maternal Infant Outreach Program 0 votes
- b. Of the four additional comments on this board, three mentioned local schools. Two of those comments suggested expanding mental health resources in the county's high schools and hiring social workers to counsel students.
 - i. Another comment emphasized the significance of 85 Hope in Wabash County.

Additionally, one attendee at the first meeting in North Manchester left a feedback form with several comments.

- The County-Wide Owner-Occupied Infill Program on the IHCDA board should address infill and redevelopment opportunities in North Manchester.
- Regarding the projects on the INDOT board, the attendee said sidewalks should extend from Chester Heights to Manchester University at 9th Street.
- Regarding the Lagro Grocery Store Project on the Indiana Department of Agriculture board, the attendee stated they are against public funding for a private business.
- The attendee suggested a project for the Indiana Department of Health board: Hire social workers to act as life coaches and counsel for students at local high schools.

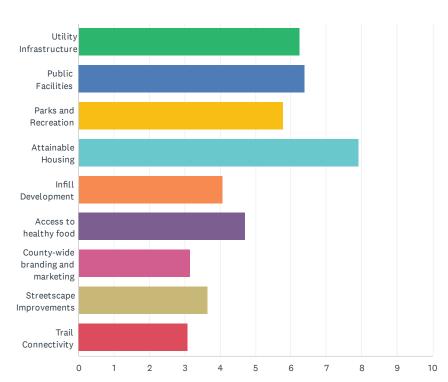

Q3 What would have the most impact on addressing population decline? Please rank the following priorities from most important to least important.

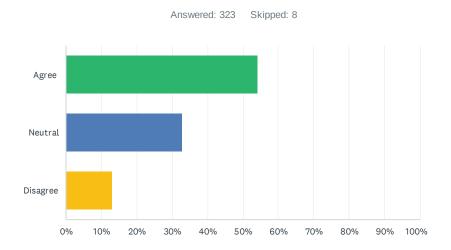

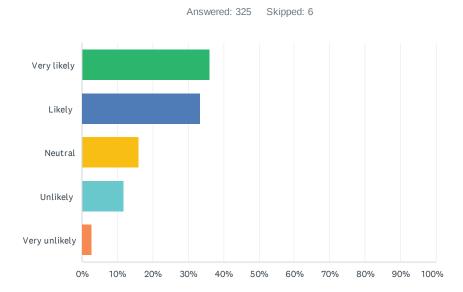

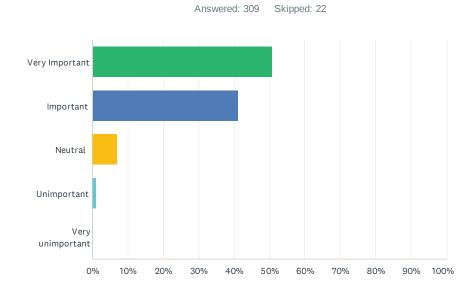

Q8 How important is it for the county and towns to invest in infrastructure improvements such as water, sewer, and/or stormwater?

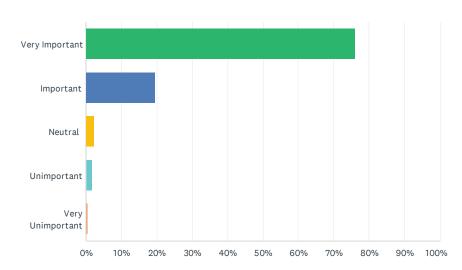

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Q9 How important is it for the county, and its partners, to create and preserve affordable housing options?

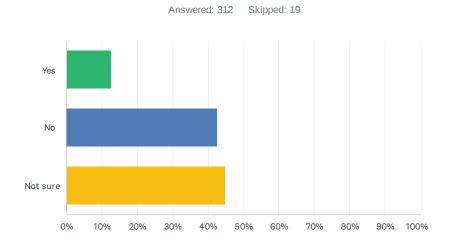

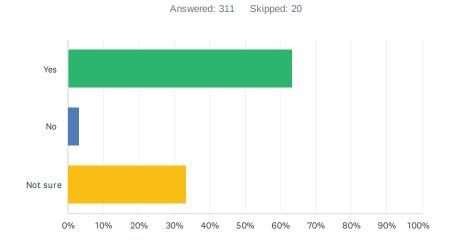
Q10 Do you feel the county has the appropriate programs in place to assist low to moderate-income individuals in obtaining housing?

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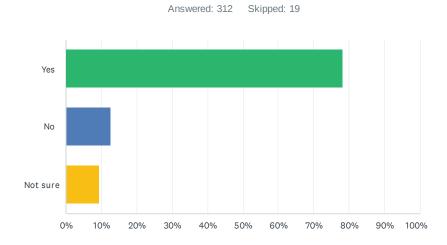
Q11 Do you feel a housing infill program would positively impact the communities in Wabash County?

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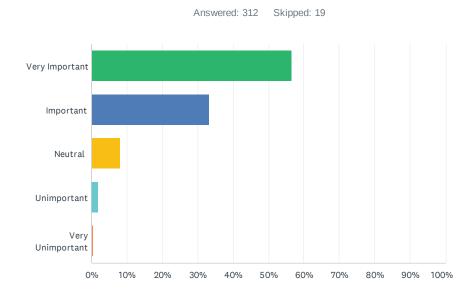
Q12 Do you feel the residents of the smaller communities would benefit from additional park and recreational opportunities?

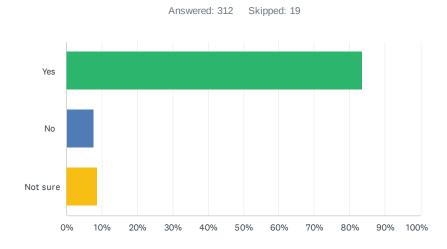
Q13 How important is it for the county, and its partners, to provide facilities for underserved populations such as people with disabilities, low-income residents, and/or senior citizens?

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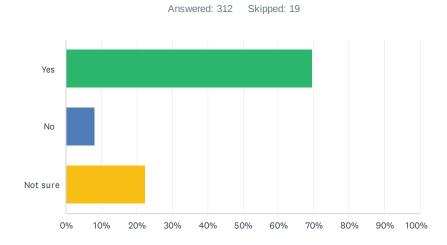
Q14 Do you feel the residents of the smaller communities would benefit from access to a more convenient grocery store?

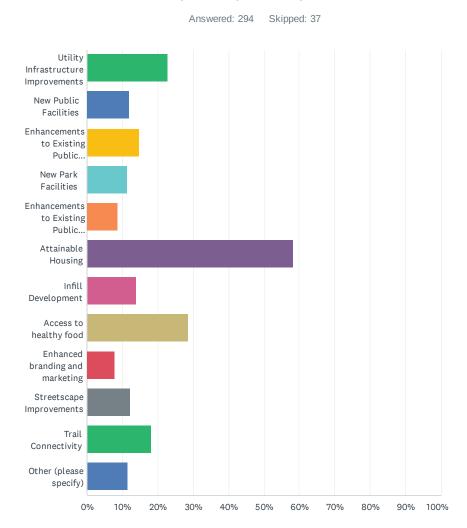

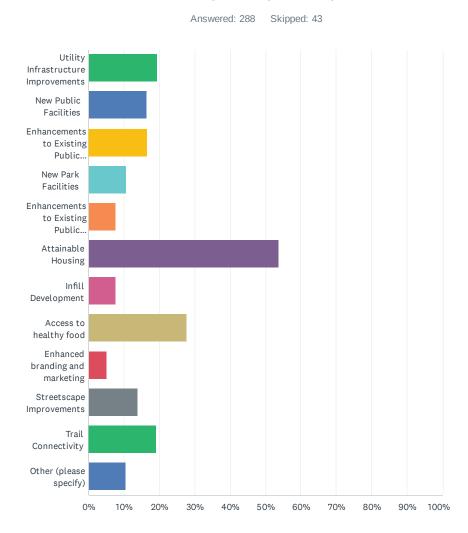

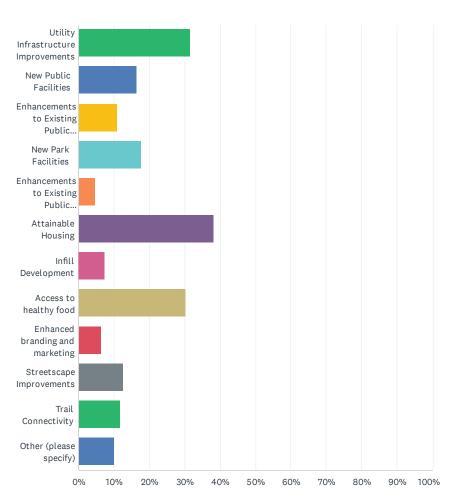

Q19 What types of projects would you like to see in La Fontaine? Please select your top TWO priorities.



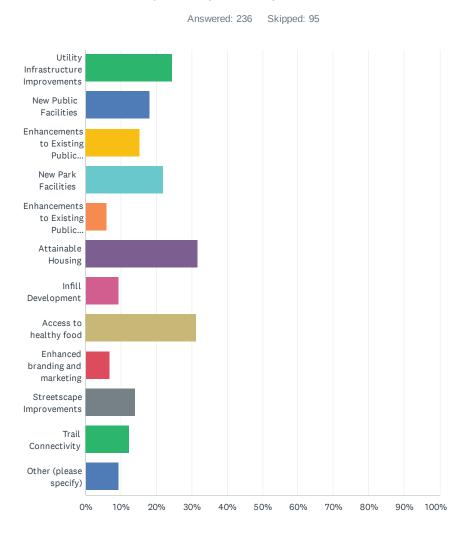

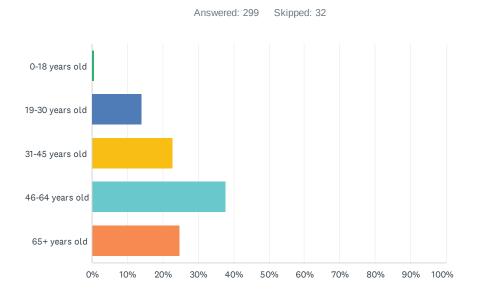
Q23 Where do you live?

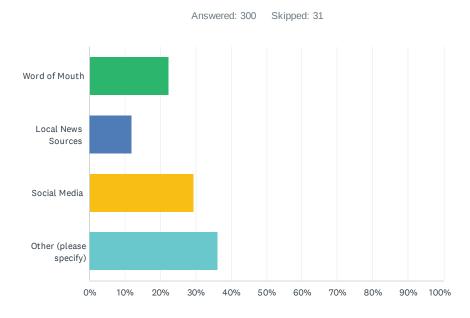
Q24 How old are you?

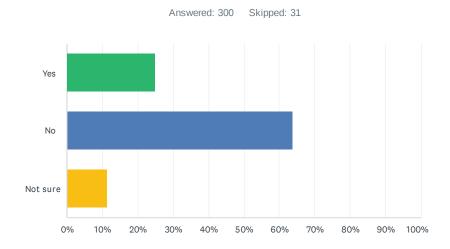

Executive Summary

Commonwealth Engineers, Inc. (Commonwealth) has prepared this Preliminary Engineering Report (PER) to evaluate the present conditions and future needs for the Town of La Fontaine.

ES.1 Project Planning

This Section defines the proposed Planning Area and Planning Period, as well as current characteristics of the Planning Area, for the Town of La Fontaine proposed Stormwater Utility Improvements Project. This information is important to the engineering analyses and the decision-making processes discussed in subsequent Sections. The Planning Period for this study is 20 years.

The Town of La Fontaine is located in Wabash County, Indiana, approximately nine (9) miles northwest of the City of Marion. The stormwater from the Town is primarily directed into Grant Creek which flows approximately 3.5 miles into the Mississinewa Reservoir. The Planning Area is defined as the existing service area for the Town of La Fontaine.

ES.2 Existing Facilities

Stormwater within the Town of La Fontaine is collected by a network of catch basins, inlets, and storm sewers which discharge into either North Branch Grant Creek, Grant Creek, Badger Creek, or an unnamed tributary to Grant Creek. These receiving streams ultimately flow into Grant Creek.

The history of the Town's stormwater infrastructure is largely unknown. A survey was performed in support of the PER to develop an Asset Inventory. The total length of pipe within the entire system is approximately 18,432 LF. There are also approximately 112 stormwater inlets within the system. The oldest pipes within the system are unknown but are assumed to have been installed in the 1960s, around the time the original sanitary sewer was installed. The typical life expectancy of stormwater pipes is approximately 50 years, depending on soil condition, water chemistry, etc. The oldest stormwater pipes and infrastructure in the system are assumed to be beyond their useful life.

The Town has noted frequent ponding and flooding during rain events. The creeks within the Town have been known to flood and overtop bridges and nearby streets, which has negatively impacted local traffic due to periodical road closures. During a previous rain event in 2019, two homes were destroyed and approximately \$2,000,000 in damage occurred near the bridge at Parker St.

ES.3 Need for Project

A. Areas of Concern

The Town has identified areas which have historically experienced frequent flooding. These areas include the area north of the bridge that crosses Grant Creek on Willow St., the area around the bridge which crosses the unnamed tributary on Parker St., and the areas surrounding the unnamed tributary on W Kendall St. The flooding from these areas results from the nearby streams overtopping, and in the past the flooding has also spread to several streets. The Town has additionally

indicated several areas where ponding frequently occurs due to lack of existing infrastructure.

B. Health, Sanitation, and Security

Flooding within the Town represents an ongoing safety, health, and financial burden on the Community. Insufficient capacity within the receiving streams and inadequately sized, lack of, or failing stormwater facilities have contributed to flooding, property damage, surface erosion, road overtopping, ponding water for significant periods of time, and created roadside and pedestrian traffic hazards. Stagnant ponding water are ideal breeding grounds for insects such as mosquitos that can carry diseases such as Malaria.

A stormwater improvements project is recommended to address the aforementioned conditions. Even small rainfall events can produce enough runoff to create concentrated areas of ponding and flooding. Temporary flooding can reduce vehicle braking distance and increase the likelihood for hydroplaning. During the winter season, these conditions create an increased amount of ice formation on roads and sidewalks. Existing facilities were also found to be undersized such that storm flows are unable to be adequately conveyed. Failed piping can cause sinkholes to develop and roadway infrastructure to collapse. These flooding events do not merely provide temporary inconveniences to traffic but have the potential to cause significant property damage.

C. Aging Infrastructure

Failing pipes and structures are attributed to aging infrastructure that has reached the end of its useful life. These facilities should be replaced once maintenance becomes too costly and the intended conveyance is no longer being achieved. There are also existing facilities that appear to have been abandoned and no longer convey stormwater as originally intended.

D. Population Trends

As discussed in **Section 1**, the population for the Town of La Fontaine has historically been decreasing, but for the purposes of the PER is assumed to have an annual increase in population of 0.10%. Despite the projected decrease in population for Wabash County, it is not prudent to decrease the capacity of stormwater infrastructure. Increases in population can result in establishing more development within the Town and increasing surface runoff. The standards and regulations surrounding stormwater best management practices today are much more complex and comprehensive than when the system was originally constructed.

E. Storm Sewer Capacity Analysis

Results of the required capacity calculations from the rational method for the Town's storm sewer sections were compared to the existing capacity of each pipe section, as calculated from the Manning's Equation. Pipe sections with capacities less than the required capacity are identified in **Table ES-1**. Values for all the sections are included in **Appendix C**.

The analysis shown above indicates that there are sections of the Town's storm sewer system that are under capacity. While there is the possibility that the assumed slopes for certain sections may be less than actual conditions, there are sections which are significantly below capacity or have larger diameter pipes flowing toward smaller diameter pipes. The analysis indicates that there are pipe sections that should be upsized to allow for adequate flow.

F. Capacity Analysis of Surrounding Streams

The Town has indicated that certain sections of streams have been known to overflow and cause flooding within the Town. The majority of pipe sections within the Town are within capacity, and many of the Town's issues have resulted from the surrounding streams flooding certain areas within the Town. Since improving the capacity of the pipe sections will not solve capacity issues with the surrounding streams, the capacity of the surrounding streams will need to be analyzed to determine the extent of the issue.

From speaking with the Town Operator and analyzing the provided photos that are included in Section 3, Grant Creek is shown to be above capacity. Before the unnamed tributary meets with Grant Creek, the tributary has neared full capacity with other locations likely exceeding capacity. Specifically, the culvert the tributary flows through under S Old State Rd was noted as not being able to handle the flow from a previous storm event and flooded the surrounding streets. Further modeling of the tributary and stream is necessary to determine the extent to which an

overflowing Grant Creek may be causing issues with the unnamed tributary and to determine possible solutions for each of the streams.

DNR and FEMA provide Flood Hazard Maps of Grant Creek, but the unnamed tributary only has a drainage area of 0.6 mi2 and does not meet the 1.0 mi2 drainage area requirement to be modeled. Historical flooding along Grant Creek, however, has significantly exceeded the flood zones boundaries of the Flood Hazard Maps. The Flood Hazard Maps show the Grant Creek Flood Zone largely staying in close proximity to the creek itself, but historical flooding shows two to three feet of water reaching close to the end of Walnut St and W Kendall St and overtopping of the S Main St and Walnut Street bridges. Because of this, these models are likely based on outdated or inaccurate data and need to be updated. The flood zone boundaries likely exceed what is currently marked, but the extent of this is not able to be determined without further modeling. The DNR and FEMA Flood Hazard Maps are included in **Appendix D**.

ES.4 Recommended Project

The existing stormwater facilities were evaluated in order to identify viable alternatives for addressing the Town's needs. Alternatives were compared using a life cycle cost analysis, the results of which were presented in **Section 5**. The Proposed Phase 1 Improvements Project is shown in **Figure ES-1**.

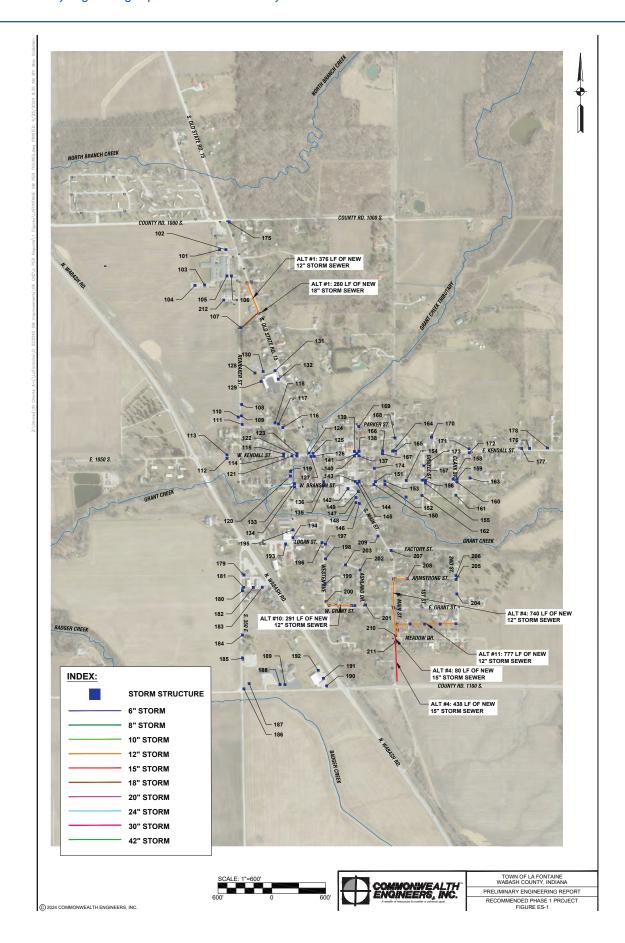
A. Phase 1 Project

1. Alternative No. 1 – Increase Basin #2 Storm Sewer Capacity

Approximately 280 LF of 18" storm sewer would be installed to replace the existing undersized storm sewer sections and approximately 376 LF of 12" storm sewer, two (2) storm sewer manholes, and one (1) inlet would be installed to extend the storm sewer. This location consists of the existing storm sewer sections that cross S. Old State Rd 15 and Rennaker St. and an extension of the storm sewer northwest along S. Old State Rd 15.

2. Alternative No. 4 – Increase Basin #6 Storm Sewer Capacity

Approximately 438 LF of 15" storm sewer would be installed to replace the existing undersized storm sewer sections and 740 LF of 12" storm sewer, 80 LF of 15" storm sewer, one (1) inlet, and four (4) storm sewer manholes would be installed to extend the existing storm sewer. As a part of the extension segment, one (1) inlet would be installed to replace STR #208 which is in poor condition, two (2) storm sewer manholes would replace STR #210 and STR #211, and 80 LF of 15" storm sewer extension would replace the storm sewer segment between STR #210 and STR #211 to ensure that the grade is acceptable. This location consists of replacing the storm sewer section that follows south down S Main St. from Meadow Dr. to County Rd. 1100 S and extending the storm sewer north along S. Main St. from Meadow Dr. to Armstrong St.



3. Alternative No. 10 – Western Ave Storm Sewer Extension

Approximately 291 LF of 12" storm sewer, one (1) inlet, and two (2) manholes to extend the storm sewer. Approximately 438 LF of 15" storm sewer would be installed to replace the existing undersized sections within Basin #6 of the storm sewer system. This location consists of extending the Western Ave storm sewer from STR #200 to between the entrances of Ashland Dr

4. Alternative No. 11 – New Storm Sewer at Alley between E Grant St. and Meadow Dr.

Approximately 777 LF of 12" storm sewer, four (4) inlets, and two (2) manholes would be installed to cover the flooding prone area. This location includes adding an additional storm sewer section to address the flooding which occurs at the alley between E. Grant Street and Meadow Dr.

B. Phase 2 Project

1. Study & Modeling of Surrounding Streams

Addressing stormwater infrastructure deficiencies within the Town of La Fontaine, while helpful, will not solve flooding within the Town caused by the surrounding streams. Because of this, it is recommended that a study and additional modeling be performed on Grant Creek and the unnamed tributary to identify potential solutions to the streams being overcapacity.

C. Project Schedule

Each section of the project should be constructed in a timely fashion. **Table ES-2** shows the proposed schedules for the Stormwater Utility Improvements Project.

E. Annual Operating Budget

1. Operation and Maintenance Expenses

Phase 1 is not projected to have any additional O&M&R costs as it relates to storm sewer replacement.

F. Debt Repayments

The proposed project will require financing either fully or partially with a loan. The Rural Utilities Service (RUS) guidance documents for Preliminary Engineering Reports direct that the report be based on loans, not grants from RUS. RUS will then evaluate the proposed project for possible RUS grant funding.

Estimated monthly user rate increases for the proposed project will be calculated for different funding scenarios. These rates are preliminary in nature and are presented only to provide the Town with estimate user rate following the completion of the proposed project. Additional rate studies would be completed by the Utility's financial consultant to determine a more accurate user rate.

The annual debt repayment for the Town associated with this project for a 100% loan scenario for Phase 1 is \$67,059, as shown in **Table ES-4**. Considering the annual O&M, as well as the SLA reserve, the annual cost of the Phase 1 project is \$73,765. Based on the annual cost, a preliminary rate schedule was determined and is presented below in **Table ES-4**.

While making our home in Wabash County, we do serve individuals from surrounding counties as well. We accept guests from birth to the end of life, provided they are not medically fragile.

Over the past few years, Daniel's Place has continued to move this project forward through the purchase of the property where the new facility will be located, completing all necessary facility design and engineering, and pursuing various funding sources to make this project a reality. We have successfully raised over \$500,000 in private donations and were awarded a \$950,000 grant from the United Way. With

Agency Demographics & Service Area:

Daniel's Place provides respite care for individuals (guests) with mental and physical disabilities. We accept guests from birth to the end of life, there is no age limit. We do not accept guests who are medically fragile. Most of our guests and their families come to us from a 50-mile radius of Wabash County, but we do have guests from as far away as Florida. They utilize our services when they are in the area visiting family.

Program Description:

Daniel's Place is a nonprofit organization focused on providing respite care across the lifespan of persons with physical and intellectual disabilities. We care for guests of any age.

Daniel's Place gives short-term care to people whose disabilities are such that they need continual assistance. Respite allows for time off from caregiving responsibilities while providing a safe, comfortable place for loved ones. As little as 4 hours of respite per week has been shown to make significant differences in caregiver lives.

Both our guests and their families will benefit from respite care. After taking a break, caregivers can give more and enjoy doing it! Individuals who stay at Daniel's Place have an opportunity to learn that they can count on others for help. They can also form new friendships, experience new environments, and have fun!

Daniel's Place supports our guests with trained Direct Support Professionals (DSP). Those DSP's tailor each visit to the specific needs of the guests.

Where does the agency fit into the marketplace of providers providing similar programs:

Unfortunately, in Northern Indiana, there are very few options for short-term respite. Daniel's Place is one of only two organizations that provides this type of respite care that is outside of the home, in a non- institutionalized environment. The Arc of Wabash County offers respite care, but only at the care-givers home. At Daniel's Place, we believe that in-home care does not afford the individuals with disabilities the opportunity to socialize, learn from a new environment, and simply make friends. The Arc also offers residential living options, but this necessitates moving a loved one out of their home to a new facility. Daniel's Place supports families that want to keep their loved one at home. Pathfinder Services offers Day Services that promote community integration such as visits to the park and community celebrations, but they only offer their services Monday through Friday from 8am-3pm. Daniel's Place currently offers services from 7am-11pm, seven

days a week. With our new facility, we will expand our service hours to include overnight stays.

Collaborative Partners & Relationships (3 of the most significant for this program):

Daniel's Place works closely with other organizations on various community events. In April of this year, Daniel's Place will work with Wabash County Leadership Development on the Thrive 85 event. Thrive 85 is a free community event designed to help connect individuals and families in need to resources in the community. Daniel's Place will provide a sensory friendly area for this event.

Daniel's Place works with MyTeam Triumph and The Arc to connect guests of Daniel's Place with the opportunity to participate in unforgettable race experiences.

Daniel's Place also maintains a relationship with **Manchester University**. Daniel's Place offers an internship opportunity for students in many disciplines including education, sociology, business and marketing.

Explain why your current facility(s) is/are inadequate to serve the agency's current needs.

Currently, Daniel's Place, a respite care center, is operating inside Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church in North Manchester, Indiana. While we appreciate the space donated to us, we realize that a dedicated Respite Care home is necessary to serve the guests and families of North Manchester and the surrounding counties more effectively. Although our current location is cost-effective, its location, size, and resources significantly impact Daniel's Place's ability to provide the level of care that aligns with our mission and values.

Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church, the location of Daniel's Place, is situated on the Main Street of North Manchester. Although it is at the heart of the city, it is only a few feet away from a busy state highway, which poses a potential hazard to young guests and elopement-risk individuals. While our guests are never alone, we enjoy spending time with them outdoors when the weather permits. However, the absence of fencing, coupled with the busy road conditions and the hazardous drop down to the river, makes it unsafe to interact with our guests outdoors. Consequently, we are forced to keep our guests indoors to ensure their safety, which limits their interaction with the community.

Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church is a relatively large building, whereas Daniel's Place has only two small, dedicated rooms each measuring fourteen feet by fourteen feet, available for accommodating guests. We have observed that these two rooms tend to fill up quickly with guests and staff members, which creates issues with the comfort and safety of both guests and staff. While we want to care for as many guests as possible, we must limit the number of guests we can accommodate at any given time to ensure their safety and comfort during their stay.

Explain how the proposed project, (purchase, addition, renovation, and/or new construction, etc.) will improve the agency's ability to serve the community.

The new facility will allow Daniel's Place to serve more clients and expand the services offered. The large fenced in yard will provide a safe environment for outdoor activities. Bedrooms in the facility will allow for Daniel' Place to provide overnight stays for guests. The larger footprint will also allow for more guests in a building simultaneously. Unlike the small divided rooms at Zion, the open concept care area gives Direct Support Professionals (DSP) a constant line of site to all guests, adding to their safety. Additionally, we do have potential families that are concerned with the public space we occupy at Zion and have let it be known that they will utilize our services when we are in a private, more secure location.

List the other agencies in the area that provide similar services to your agency and address existing or potential overlaps of service.

As stated earlier, there are no other organizations in the area that provide the type of respite care offered by Daniel's Place. Agape Respite Care in Berne, IN is the closest, similar facility. They do provide overnight stays but are often completely booked months in advance. Agape does refer families to Daniel's Place.

How did you determine that the proposed project was needed? What metrics will be tracked and measured for community impact, and how often will these metrics be collected and reported?

As Daniel's Place has continued to grow its client base, the need for a dedicated facility was clear. With the current facility at capacity, the need to turn away families because of the lack of overnight stays, and the absence of a private environment, the directors of Daniel's Place recognize that this new facility will allow the organization to provide a level of care that better aligns with its mission.

Daniel's Place will measure success of the project and community impact in the following ways:

- 1. Number of Clients Served: This metric quantifies the reach of the facility and provides insight into the demand for respite care services in the community. It will be measured monthly.
- 2. Client Satisfaction Surveys: Regular surveys will assess clients' satisfaction with the services provided, helping to identify areas for improvement. Surveys will be conducted twice a year.
- 3. Caregiver Support and Satisfaction: Measure the level of support provided to caregivers and their satisfaction with our services. This will be done through caregiver surveys and interviews, conducted biannually.
- 4. Community Engagement: Monitor the level of engagement with the local community through events, partnerships, and outreach efforts. This will be assessed quarterly.
- 5. Referral Sources: Track where clients are coming from (e.g., hospitals, community organizations, word of mouth) to understand referral patterns and sources of community need. This will be done quarterly.
- 6. Community Partnerships and Collaborations: Keep track of partnerships with other community organizations, healthcare providers, and government agencies to assess the breadth and depth of collaboration. Review these partnerships annually or biannually.

Regular reporting of these metrics, along with analysis and interpretation of the data, will provide valuable insights into the impact of the facility on the community we serve. Reports will be shared with stakeholders such as funders, community partners, and the public to demonstrate accountability and transparency.

How does this project support the strategic goals of the agency?

The construction of a new facility is part of the organization's long-term strategic plan. The facility will address threats identified, such a loss of guests due to lack of overnight stays and perceived lack of professionalism for being housed in a local church. Additionally, the facility addresses opportunities for further outreach and increased service hours.

Alternatives Explored: (Please indicate what, if any, alternatives were explored and why each was rejected or accepted.)

- 1. Purchasing the Zion Lutheran Church Facility Although this would allow for the availability of overnight stays in the very near future, the facility will require extensive remodeling. This facility will also not address the issue of safe outdoor space. The age of the facility also causes concern for the costs of ongoing maintenance.
- 2. Unutilized space at Peabody Retirement Community This space is not ideal for Daniel's Place. Rooms are on different floors, increasing the staff to guest ratio. General review of the property showed the need for extensive maintenance.

SECTION 5 PROJECT NARRATIVE



a) Project Description

The City of Wabash desires to expand upon the success of the Wabash Riverwalk and construct an extension that will connect to the Wabash City Park. The trail extension will continue the existing riverwalk cross section with an 8-foot wide, paved, multiuse path.

The City also intends to improve access of the existing Riverwalk trail between SR 15 and S. Huntington Street. During flood events, the portion directly adjacent to the Wabash River must be closed due to flooding. The new trail section would provide a bypass that could be utilized during periods of flooding when the lower section is closed. The City recently gained control of property along the south side of Fulton Street and intends to construct market rate apartments that overlook the river. This trail bypass would also provide direct access to the proposed apartments along the scenic riverwalk.

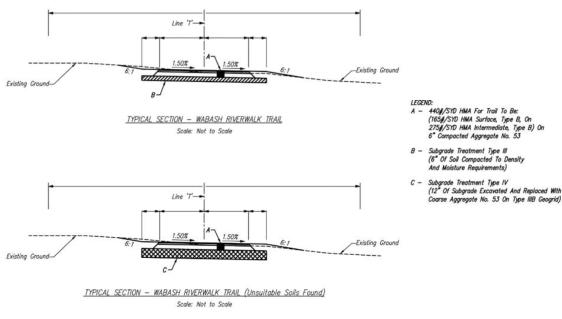


Figure 1: Typical Cross Section

The Wabash Riverwalk extension will be approximately 6,500 feet of additional trail and the 'bypass' between SR 15 and S. Huntington Street will be 800 feet. The trail will generally consist of 6" of stone, 4" of intermediate binder and 2" of HMA surface. There will also be 2' gravel shoulders on either side as shown in Figure 1. The Wabash River Trail is part of the State Visionary Trail and is the next phase of extending the trail to the west towards Peru. Alternative

The trail extension will begin at the western terminus at River Street and continue west along the utility lines for nearly 2,000 feet. The trail will continue along the Wabash River to the wood lawn along Charlie Creek where it will turn north and cross the unimproved Edsall Street. Edsall Street is a gravel roadway with no outlet only utilized to access farm property west of Charlie Creek. The trail will continue along Charlie Creek to W. Market Street. W. Market Street will be closed to vehicular traffic and the trail will utilize the existing roadway bed and structure to cross Charlie Creek and reach Lockerbie Street. W. Market is not utilized by vehicular traffic and the City will formally close the roadway for the purposes of the trail connection. A cul-de-sac, east of Charlie Creek, will be provided to allow city access for the CSO Scata Monitoring Equipment on W. Market Street.

This section of the trail extension will utilize 1800' of the existing Duke Energy easement (See Section 12: Current Easements) and then properties as shown in Section 13: Property Deeds. Letters of intent from each property was secured and is included in Section 14: Letters of Intent to sell/donate. At the time of the application, all property owners were willing to donate as included in those letters. A total of 5.06 acres will be acquired for this project.

The Wabash Riverwalk 'bypass' will connect to the existing Riverwalk trail approximately 150' west of S. Huntington Road. The trail will utilize the higher ground between E. Fulton Street and the existing Riverwalk to provide a route that will not be prone to flooding. The trail will then connect at Race Street just south of The Alley Cat Outfitters (coming in 2023) and the existing trail. The City currently owns all property in this location.

 - The extension of the Wabash Riverwalk will connect the current western terminus of the Wabash Riverwalk to the 35-acre Wabash City Park. The fully paved, multi-use, Wabash River Trail currently extends more than seven miles between the Town of Lagro and the City of Wabash. This extension will continue the westerly plans to reach the City of Peru and connect with their riverwalk.
 - 2. The extension project follows along the scenic Wabash River and then along the banks of Charlie Creek before reaching the City Park. Users will likely spot bald eagles nesting in the trees or river otters playing along the banks of the Wabash River. This trail allows users a different view of the great Wabash River and local fauna than one could ever see from a vehicle.

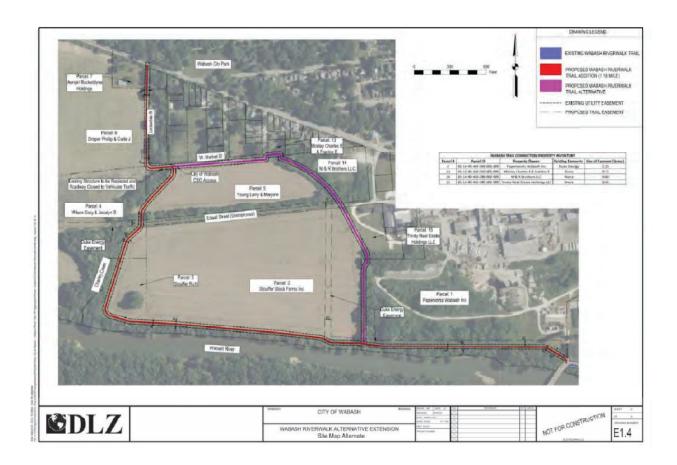
The Wabash River Trail extension will be designed and constructed in accordance with the 2010 American with Disabilities Act Standards for Accessible Design guidelines. The project will consider needs of persons with disabilities including curb cuts, surfaces, slopes, and other accepted standards. The project will meet the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways (MUTCD) where applicable as well as with conformance with the Architectural Barriers Act of 1968. The project will be designed to meet Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990.

d) Life of Facility

The Wabash River Trail extension has a minimum life expectancy of 25 years. Land acquisition will include a perpetual easement with Duke Energy and fee simple title for other properties providing the ability for the City of Wabash to properly maintain the trail. A Maintenance and Operation Plan is included in Appendix A for reference and project agreement with DNR detailing operation, maintenance, and public use will be completed as part of the design process.

Alternative Route

During the development of this application, the City of Wabash began considering an alternative route for the trail extension to avoid disruption to certain properties. This alternative route would continue along unimproved Market Street, east to the end of the existing right-of-way. The trail would then traverse the back of two properties turning south to the western edge of the Paperworks property and reconnecting with the primary route along the utility easement to the south. This alternative route is included in the Wabash Trail System Masterplan as indicated in Section 6: Public Participation. Both routes are nearly comparable in cost and do not noticeably affect the included cost estimate in Section 3: Cost Breakdown.

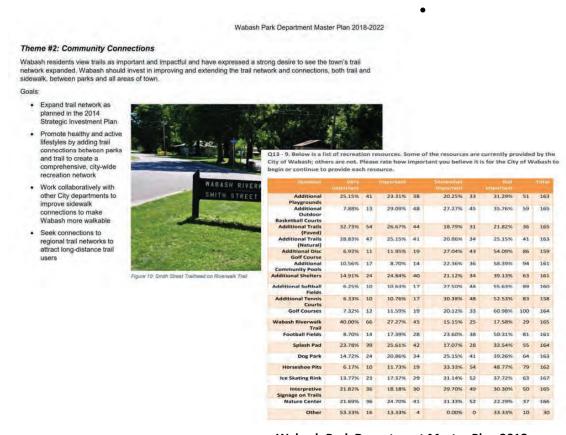

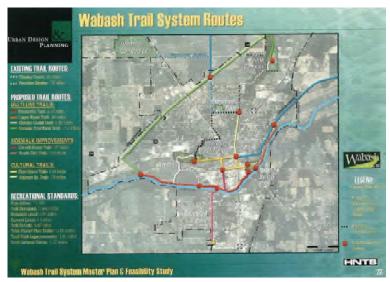


Figure 2: Wabash Trail System Routes, Wabash Trail Master Plan, 2005

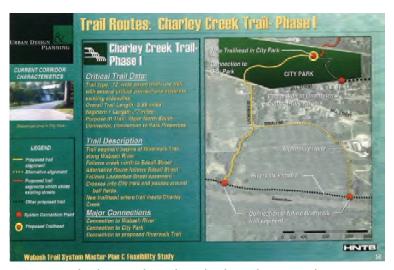


Figure 4: Charley Creek Trail, Wabash Trail Master Plan, 2005

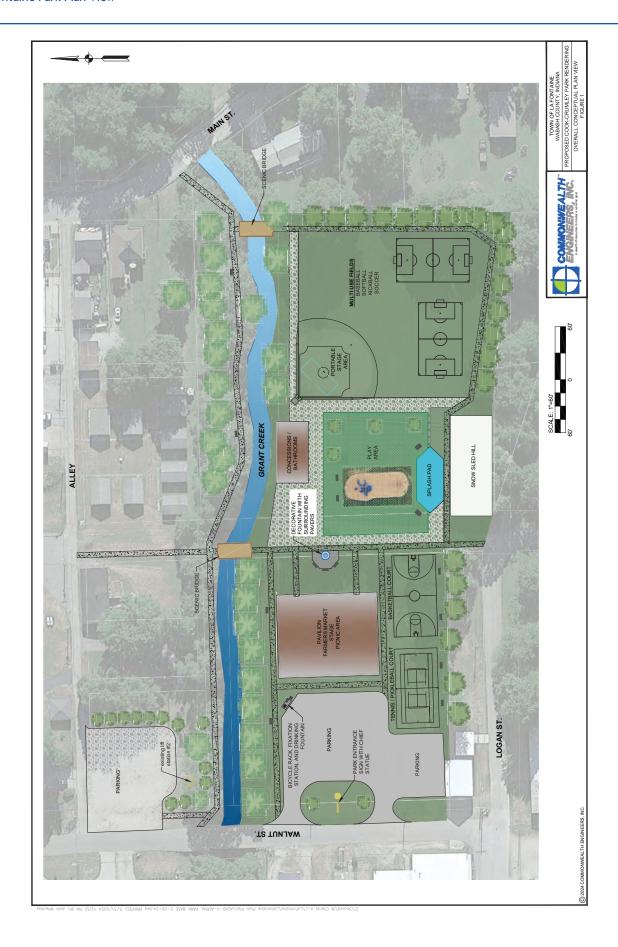

BYLAWS OF The Lagro Food Co-op

ARTICLE I - NAME

Section 1.1 – Name:

The name of this nonprofit corporation shall be the Lagro Food Coop hereinafter referred to as the "Co-op."

ARTICLE II – PURPOSES

Section 2.1 – Purpose:

The Co-op's purposes are to promote and support the development of member-owned Co-op businesses and services, especially in Wabash County Indiana.

Section 2.2 – Mission:

The Co-op is a member-owned nonprofit corporation dedicated to serving the needs of local growers, producers and consumers by providing goods, services and healthy food choices at fair value. The Co-op will promote community well-being, economic prosperity and self-reliance through cooperation.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

Section 3.11 – Admission as Members:

Membership in the Co-op shall be voluntary and open to all who support the mission and goals of the coop as purchasers of goods and services from the Co-op and who are legally qualified. Applicants shall be admitted to membership upon submitting the required application, fulfilling the terms of the membership agreement and paying the refundable membership fee established by the bylaws, subject to Board approval. Each new member shall receive a copy of these bylaws and a copy of their signed membership agreement.

Section 3.12 – Discrimination:

The Co-op shall not discriminate on the basis of race, creed, age, gender, handicap, sexual orientation, marital status or other arbitrary basis.

Section 3.2 Membership Classes:

There shall be two classes of membership. Members of the "primary class" shall have the same rights and responsibilities. Members of the primary class may subscribe to one of three levels of the "supporting class," which is renewable annually. The three tiers of benefits for "supporting members" are outlined in the "supporting member" application.

Section 3.3 – Transfer of membership:

Members in good standing cannot transfer that membership to another eligible person without the consent of the Board of Directors.

Section 3.4 – Termination of Membership:

Membership may be terminated voluntarily by a member upon notice to the Co-op. Membership may be terminated by the Board for cause. Upon the voluntary termination of a membership, the member may redeem the value of the original fee paid for membership; subject to such limitations as shall be determined by the Board.

Section 3.5 – Settlement of Disputes:

In any dispute that involves normal membership transactions and that cannot be resolved through informal negotiation, it shall be the policy of the Co-op to use mediation whereby an impartial mediator may facilitate negotiations between the parties and assist them in developing a mutually acceptable settlement.

ARTICLE IV - MEMBERSHIP MEETINGS

Section 4.1 – Annual Member Meeting:

The Board of Directors shall organize an annual meeting of members within the first four months of each fiscal year. All member meetings shall be held in Lagro, Indiana

Section 4.2 – Special Member Meetings:

A special members' meeting shall be called if warranted by special circumstances as determined by the Board of Directors, including a petition signed by not less than 10% of the membership.

Section 4.3 – Quorum: Unless a larger quorum is required by law, 40 members or 5% whichever is less of the votes entitled to be cast on a matter constitutes a quorum for action on that matter. Unless at least one-third (1/3) of the voting power is present in person the only matters that may be voted upon at a meeting of the members are those matters that are described in the meeting notice.

Section 4.4 – Notice of Member Meetings:

Notice of members' meetings shall be provided to each member in a fair and reasonable manner pursuant to any method authorized by Ind. Code 23-17-10-5 as it may exist from time to time and shall include, at a minimum, the time, date, location and purpose of the meeting. Notification will be in writing and may include but is not limited to US mail, fax, electronic mail and any other legal method. Members will be notified not less than 10 days or moar than 60 days.

Section 4.5 - Voting Rights:

The record date, not more than seventy (70) days before the annual meeting, shall be established by the Board not less than thirty days prior to the meeting. The Board shall establish a list of members in good standing as of the record date. Only members in good standing as of the record date shall receive the notice and be eligible to vote at that meeting. A list of members in good standing on the record

date and entitled to notice shall be prepared and available to members not less than five (5) days before the date of the meeting. Proxy voting is not permitted.

Section 4.9 – Voting eligibility.

Members shall vote on the basis of one-member, one vote. If a membership is held by a household or business entity, one person shall be designated as the voting member. This shall be the person designated on the original or amended membership agreement.

Article V - Board of Directors

Section 5.1 – General Powers of Board of Directors.

The business and affairs of the Co-op shall be managed under the direction of the Board of Directors (sometimes referred to in these Bylaws as the "Board."). In the conduct of its affairs, the Board shall strive to represent the interests of the membership, to advance the purpose and mission of the Co-op and to ensure the successful functioning of the Co-op's businesses subject to the provisions of these Bylaws and all applicable laws and regulations.

Section 5.2 – Number of Directors and Vacancies.

The Board shall consist of seven to fifteen directors elected by the members. All directors shall be members and shall not have any overriding conflicts of interest. Any director who wishes to resign his or her office may do so, giving the Board thirty days prior notice whenever possible. The Board for cause may remove a director from office. Vacancies shall be filled by a vote of remaining Board members for the remainder of the term.

Section 5.31 – Meetings of the Board of Directors.

The Board shall meet on a regularly scheduled and publicized basis, usually once a month at a location to be determined by the Board. The regular meeting date for the Board shall be set by resolution of the Board from time to time.

Section 5.32 – Board Decisions:

Whenever possible Board decisions shall be made by consensus. When consensus is not possible, two-thirds (2/3rd) vote of the Board shall be required.

Section 5.4 – Open Meetings.

All meetings of the Board shall be open to all members of the Co-op and all guests of the Board. The Board may meet in executive session to conduct business concerning legal, financial or personnel matters of a sensitive nature, or other similar situations. These executive sessions shall be called by the Board and shall be open only to Directors and such other persons as the Board may expressly allow.

Section 5.5 – Election of Directors.

Subject to the provision for staggered terms, Directors shall be elected annually by the membership at large. Directors shall serve a maximum of three (3 year) consecutive terms and must sit out a full term before being eligible for re-election. The board shall have the authority to waive these term limits as needed to ensure operational efficiency and organizational continuity. Election of directors shall be staggered such that no more than one-third (1/3) plus one are elected in any year.

Section 5.6 – Quorum at Board Meetings.

A quorum shall consist of a minimum of half plus one (1/2+1) current Board members rounded up to the next whole number when the number of Board members is an uneven number. Unless otherwise required by law or these bylaws, action may be taken by a majority vote of the directors present representing the quorum.

Section 5.7 – Executive Committee.

The Board of Directors shall appoint the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall be comprised of at least three officers of the Board and any other such members as shall be determined by the Board. The Executive Committee shall be empowered to act on behalf of the Board and make ad hoc decisions **only** when necessary, subject to Board approval at the next scheduled or special meeting

Section 5.8 – Committees.

The Board shall establish such committees as needed for the successful function of the Co-op.

Section 5.9 – Conflict of Interest

Potential Board members shall sign a letter declaring any potential conflicts of interest with the organization and recuse themselves from votes on issues that may present a potential conflict of interest. Board members shall further sign a confidentiality statement.

Section 5.10 – Authorization of Contracts.

The Board of Directors shall have the sole authority to approve and sign contracts, or to delegate such authority as the Board shall at its sole discretion determine from time to time.

ARTICLES VI - OFFICERS

Section 6.1 – Board Officers.

The Board of Directors shall elect a Chair, Vice-Chair, Secretary and Treasurer and any other such officers as may be deemed desirable by the Board of Directors. All officers are required to be elected Directors of the Board.

Section 6.2 – Election of Officers.

The officers of the Co-op shall be elected annually from among and by the Board of Directors at the first meeting of the new Board of Directors

Section 6.3 – Board Chair

The Chair shall coordinate the activities of the Board, preside over meetings of the Board and members, sign formal documents on behalf of the Co-op, and as appropriate, represent the Co-op in dealings with the community and the media.

Section .6.4 - Vice-Chair

The Vice-Chair shall have primary responsibility for familiarity with the provisions of the Co-op Policy Manual, and shall perform the duties specified in Section 6.3 as needed.

Section 6.5 – Treasurer.

The Treasurer shall oversee the maintenance of financial records, the reporting of financial information and the filing of required reports and returns.

Section 6.6 – Secretary.

The Secretary shall have responsibility for compiling and distributing the official Board meeting minutes and maintaining and updating official records including the Bylaws and Policy Manual of the organization.

Section 6.7 – Historian

The Historian shall develop an accessible archiving system for Co-op records, official documents and public relation activities, and be responsible for populating and maintaining the Co-op's records, documents and community activities in such system.

Section 6.8 – Officer Vacancies.

If an office becomes vacant it shall be filled by appointment by the Board of Directors, and the officer so chosen shall hold office until his or her successor is elected. Further, the Board of Directors may delegate all or a portion of the powers and duties of any officer to any other officer or director, but no officer or director shall execute, acknowledge or verify any instrument or document in more than one capacity.

ARTICLE VII - BOOKS AND RECORDS

Section 7.1 – Open Books and Record

The Co-op shall maintain such books and records as are required by law. Members shall be provided access to Co-op records to the greatest extent practical, by means to be determined by the Board, subject to applicable law and privacy considerations.

ARTICLE VIII – FISCAL YEAR

Section 8.1 – Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Co-op shall begin on the first day of January in each year and end on the last day of December of the same year.

ARTICLE IX - MEMBERSHIP FEES

Statement of Intention:

The Co-op members shall pay a refundable membership fee as determined from time to time by the Board. The membership fee shall be refunded to the member, subject to board approval, when the membership is terminated by the member or the Co-op in accordance with these bylaws.

ARTICLE X – PATRONAGE REBATES

The Co-op's operations shall be so conducted that all patrons will, through their patronage, furnish capital for the Co-op. In order to induce patronage and to assure that the Co-op will operate on a nonprofit basis, the Co-op is obligated to account on a patronage basis to its patrons for all amounts received and receivable from the furnishing of goods and services in excess of operating costs and expenses properly chargeable against the furnishing of goods and services. All amounts in excess of operating costs and expenses at the moment of receipt by the Co-op are received with the understanding that they are furnished by the patrons as capital. The Co-op is obligated to pay by credits to a capital account for each patron all amounts in excess of operating costs and expenses. The books and records of the Co-op shall be set up and kept in such a manner that at the end of each calendar year the amount of capital, if any, so furnished by each patron is clearly reflected and credited in an appropriate record to the capital account of each patron. The Co-op shall within a reasonable time after the close of the calendar year notify each patron of the amount of capital so credited to the patron's account. All amounts credited to the capital account of any patron shall have the same status as though they had been paid to the patron in cash in pursuance of a legal obligation to do so and the patron had then furnished the Co-op corresponding amounts for capital.

All other amounts received by the Co-op from its operations in excess of costs and expenses shall, insofar as permitted by law, be:

- a. used to offset any losses incurred during the current or any prior fiscal year, and
- b. to the extent not needed for that purpose, allocated to its patrons on a patronage basis, and any amount so allocated shall be included as a part of the capital credited to the accounts of patrons, as herein provided.

If, at any time prior to dissolution or liquidation, the Board of Directors shall determine that the financial condition of the Co-op will not be impaired thereby, the capital then credited to patrons' accounts may be retired in full or in part. The Board shall determine the method, basis, priority and other of retirement, if any, for all amounts heretofore and hereafter furnished as capital.

Capital credited to the account of each patron shall be assignable only on the books of the Co-op pursuant to written instructions from the assignor and only to the extent the Board, acting under policies of general application, shall determine appropriate.

The Co-op, before retiring any capital credit to any patron's account, shall deduct there from any amount owed by the patron to the Co-op.

ARTICLE XI – INDEMNIFICATION

Section 11.1- Indemnification of Directors.

The Co-op shall, subject to the limitations in this Article, indemnify its current and former directors and officers against all liabilities and expenses to which they may actually and reasonably become subject by reason of their positions with the Co-op or their service in its behalf to the fullest extent of the law.

Section 11.2 – Limitations of Indemnification.

No indemnification shall be made unless the person to be indemnified is successful on the merits in defense of the action or is determined to have met the applicable standard of conduct in the manner required by law. Indemnification payments and advances of expenses shall be made only in such increments and at such times as will not jeopardize the ability of the Co-op to pay its other obligations as they become due.

ARTICLE XII - DISSOLUTION

Section 12.1 – Dissolution of the Co-op:

Upon dissolution of the Co-op, its assets shall be distributed in the following manner and order: (i) by paying or making provision for payment of all liabilities and expenses of liquidation; (ii) by redeeming any revolving capital accounts which, if they cannot be paid in full, shall be paid in the order of the oldest outstanding amounts; (iii) by redeeming capital certificates which, if they cannot be paid in full, shall be paid on a pro rata basis among all outstanding amounts; and (iv) by distributing any remaining assets, unless otherwise determined by the membership of the Co-op, to one or more legally entitled organizations affiliated with the Co-op movement and recognized as tax exempt under Code Section 501(c)(12) of the Internal Revenue Code.

ARTICLE XIII – INTERPRETATION AND AMENDMENT OF BYLAWS

Section 13.1 – Severability:

In the event that any provision of these Bylaws is determined to be invalid or unenforceable under any statute or rule of law, then such provision shall be deemed inoperative to such extent and shall be deemed modified to conform with such statute or rule of law without affecting the validity or enforceability of any other provision of these Bylaws.

Section 13.2 – Bylaw Amendments.

The Board of Directors shall have the power to amend the Bylaws. Notice of the proposed amendment shall be provided to the Board of Directors prior to the meeting at which the amendment shall be considered.

ARTICLE X1V - POLICY MANUAL

Section 14.1 Policy Manual

All matters not addressed in these Bylaws and the interpretation of the provisions of these Bylaws shall be addressed in the Co-op Policy Manual. In all questions of intent, interpretation and implementation of these Bylaws, the Co-op shall be guided by the Policy Manual, subject to applicable State, and Federal law, ordinance or regulation.

Section 14.2 Maintenance of Policy Manual

The Board Secretary shall be responsible for maintaining and updating the Policy Manual at the direction of the Board of Directors. All Board members are expected to be familiar with the provisions of the Policy Manual.

An Analysis of Residential Market Potential

COUNTY-WIDE ANNUAL AVERAGE MARKET POTENTIAL

Where are the potential renters and buyers of new and existing housing units in Wabash County likely to move from?

The most recent Wabash County migration and mobility data—as derived from taxpayer records compiled by the Internal Revenue Service from 2016 through 2020 and from the most recent American Community Survey for Wabash County—shows that the draw areas for new and existing housing units located in Wabash County include the following:

- The <u>local</u> draw area, covering households with the potential to move within Wabash County.
- The <u>regional</u> draw area, covering households with the potential to move to Wabash County from Kosciusko, Huntington, Miami, and Grant counties, in Indiana.

1. Background

This needs analysis began after a group of individuals from Wabash County who were interested in providing support to refugees and immigrants in Wabash Couty, met during the spring of 2023. At the initial meetings of this group, it was discussed that there was a need for increased support for refugees and immigrants arriving in Wabash County as well as support for individuals from other countries already in Wabash County. Additionally, Alex Downard of Imagine One 85 and other persons at the meeting mentioned that making Wabash County a more welcoming place could help to attract individuals from other countries and help combat population decline. Furthermore, Julie Garber of the Community Foundation mentioned the need to support current Spanish speakers in Wabash County. After much discussion and three more meetings of this group, it was stated by several group members that a position should be developed to help address diversity projects and needs in Wabash County. Mackenzie Coulter-Kern was hired to conduct a needs analysis to examine the needs of people from other countries and minorities in Wabash County. She was also charged with putting together a position description and work plan that would address both current and future diversity needs in Wabash County. In June 2023 a description of the position was brought to the diversity coalition and a motion was passed to create the position.

For the needs analysis, Mackenzie Coulter-Kern identified key stakeholders in the county to solicit feedback and other key information for the needs analysis. Additionally, Mackenzie contacted individuals and businesses including people from other countries (especially Spanish speaking individuals) for interviews and focus groups to better understand the obstacles to living in Wabash County. Mackenzie also collected survey data from local businesses, institutions, schools, and other community members. On the survey she received feedback from 50 English speaking stakeholders comprising 28 different industries in Wabash County. Later, during focus groups she interviewed 20 additional individuals from other countries (19 of whom were native Spanish speakers). In total, 70 people (50 English speaking stakeholders and 20 Spanish speaking stakeholders) participated in this needs analysis.

The following report includes an analysis of the quantitative and qualitative data that was collected through surveys and focus groups in Wabash County that will provide useful information for the creation of the position of Diversity Projects Director for Wabash County and a two-year work plan for that position.

2. Stakeholder Feedback on the Survey and Interviews with Spanish Speakers

2a. Survey Feedback from Businesses and Individuals in Wabash County

To inform the Wabash County diversity needs analysis via a survey, Mackenzie identified several stakeholders to solicit feedback from: employers, early care and education programs, healthcare workers, a local university, community partners, and individuals interested in diversity in Wabash County. Through the survey, Mackenzie received feedback from 50 individuals¹. All individuals consented to their data being used for research purposes in the future.

Demographics

Individuals ranging from 22 to 72 years old completed the survey. The average age of the individuals that completed the survey was 47 years old.



English speaking stakeholders who completed the survey reported their race/ethnicity:

- 46 white/Caucasian
- 3 multiple ethnicities
- 1 Hispanic/Latinx

Quantitative Responses in Survey: Obstacles to Daily Life that Individuals from other Countries Face

Stakeholders were asked about potential obstacles that individuals from other countries face. Participants were able to select multiple responses for this question. The quantitative results indicated that stakeholders in Wabash County believe that the barriers to daily living are the following: healthcare (45), language (44), transportation (40), finding housing (39), access to education (38), finding work (32), and other (29).

The quantitative data in Table 1 indicates that stakeholders more frequently selected health care as an obstacle to daily life for individuals from other countries followed by language barriers and transportation.

WABASH, Ind. - In 2014, the city of Wabash was named a Stellar Community designee by the Indiana Office of Community and Rural Affairs.

A decade later, the program has been rebranded to Stellar Pathways, and Wabash County is one of four finalists vying for a share of \$13 million to fund a variety of community development projects.

Grow Wabash County President and CEO Tenille Zartman says the county wants to build on the success of the Stellar win 10 years ago.

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said is one of the region's greatest threats: population decline.

"Our first-ever countywide [Imagine One 85] comprehensive plan got adopted a couple years ago. That identified a lot of really great projects that we think will be pivotal in helping us grow our populations," she said. "I think being a Stellar winner will give us the resources and the credibility to continue to move that forward so we can no longer say we're in decline but that we're actually on that upward growth momentum."

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picture projects," she said. "So when the Stellar Pathways program was presented and we asked, 'Okay, do we want to go after this as a region?' All hands went up, and it took five seconds to get everyone on board; we were already in that collaborative spirit. So I think that really shone through on our application."

The Stellar finalists are each receiving \$50,000 to develop their final strategic investment plans. Zartman said while specific projects haven't been nailed down just yet, they could involve infrastructure, downtown development, riverfront and park development, and streetscapes, among others.

"The Stellar Strategic Investment Plan will allow us to advance projects and programs, founded through the work of Imagine One 85, and prepare a compelling case for why Wabash County should be awarded the Stellar Pathways Designation and receive the resources that accompany it to implement large scale initiatives moving our community forward," Imagine One 85 Director Alex Downard said in written remarks

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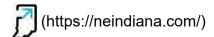

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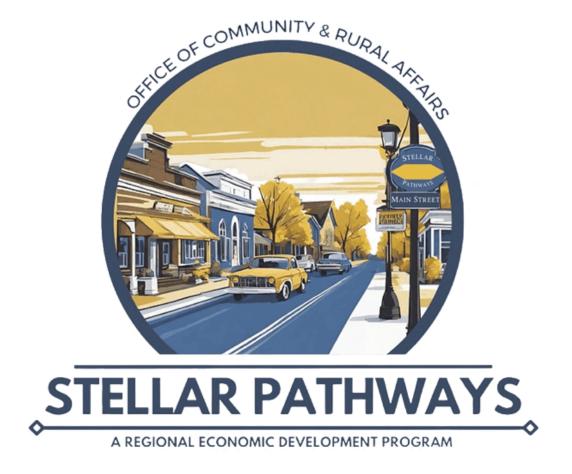

Two Fort Wayne-area counties, Wabash and LaGrange, are among four regional finalists for Indiana's Stellar Pathways program, the state announced Tuesday.

Wabash County and Connect LaGrange County were among 19 letters of interest for the program.

Each regional finalist will receive \$50,000 to help complete a strategic investment plan, according to Lt. Gov. Suzanne Crouch and the Indiana Office of Community and Rural Affairs, who made the joint announcement.

The Wabash County application includes the county, the city of Wabash, North Manchester, Roann, LaFontaine and Lagro.

The Connect LaGrange County application includes the LaGrange County Economic Development Corporation, LaGrange County, town of LaGrange, Shipshewana and Topeka, according to the state's news release.

Other finalists are:

- One Dearborn County: Stellar Pathways for Indiana Gateways, including Dearborn County Economic Development Corporation, Dearborn County, Dillsboro and Greendale.
- Warren County Region, including Warren County and Williamsport.

Relaunched earlier this year, the Stellar Pathways program is a multi-year, multi-million-dollar initiative that the Office of Community and Rural Affairs oversees.

When the state offered Stellar Communities, the New Allen Alliance was a designated winner in December 2018 of about \$5.8 million toward \$17 million in identified projects. That alliance included Leo-Cedarville, Grabill, Harlan, Woodburn, New Haven, Monroeville and Hoagland.

The Stellar Pathways program works with communities in self-determined regions to support a shared vision for community and economic development. Local and regional partnerships are encouraged to develop and implement "sustainable solutions to challenges Indiana's rural communities face," the state said in its news release.

In an email response, the Office of Community and Rural Affairs on Tuesday declined to immediately disclose – without a public records request – the list of 19 regions to apply.

Grow Wabash County said it pointed out to state officials that its application was signed and supported by all of its incorporated communities.

"We are excited to continue to bring our partners together to enhance the quality of life in Wabash County through this transformative initiative," Tenille Zartman, Grow Wabash County's president and CEO, said in a statement Tuesday.

The organization noted in its press release that the Stellar Pathways program is a "reimagined version" of the Stellar Communities program that the city of Wabash participated in starting in 2014.

"Being a Stellar Pathways finalist will further our strong existing collaboration and commitment to progress and innovation," Zartman said.

Wabash County has already worked to develop and enhance at countywide strategic plan, called Imagine One 85. That made the collaborative requirement to be considered for Stellar Pathways an easy one, the organization said in its release. It added that the planning and fine-tuning will continue before the Nov. 1 deadline for final strategic plan submissions to the state.

Duke Bennett, executive director, of the Office of Community and Rural Affairs, said the review process to get to four finalists was "very competitive."

His office's Stellar Pathways partner agencies include the Indiana Housing and Community Development Authority, Indiana Department of Transportation, Indiana Department of Health, Indiana State Department of Agriculture, Indiana Destination Development Corporation and Indiana Department of Natural Resources.

Wabash County is one of four regions designated as a 2024 Stellar Pathways finalist.

The designation was made June 18 by Lt. Gov. Suzanne Crouch and the Indiana Office of Community and Rural Affairs.

The county was one of 19 regions to submit applications for the designation. Representatives from the Stellar Pathways partner agencies evaluated submissions based on a number of factors, including the region's demonstrated ability to collaborate, communicate effectively, implement projects, address challenges, secure additional funding and engage the community.

The local application was submitted by Grow Wabash County through the Imagine One 85 initiative. It includes Wabash County, the City of Wabash and the towns of North Manchester, Roann, LaFontaine and Lagro.

"I think we had a really strong application because all of our government partners are already around the table every month and I think we stood out for that reason," Tenille Zartman, GWC's President and CEO said. "We will receive a \$50,000 planning grant to continue strategically plan our project."

In addition to the grant, the county will receive a customized, one-day workshop with Ball State University's Indiana Communities Institute on Aug. 12 to discuss project alignment and continued planning efforts.

The county's strategic investment plan will be submitted to the state by Nov. 1, and two winners will be declared in January

2025. Those two winners will each receive between \$8 million and \$9 million to be used for the various projects.

"We'll make sure that that's equitably distributed," Zartman said.

In 2014, the City of Wabash was named a Stellar Community by OCRA.

Zartman said she was worried that that designation might hinder the most recent application.

Relaunched earlier this year, the Stellar Pathways program is a multi-year, multimillion dollar initiative led by OCRA. The program works with communities in a self-determined region on a shared vision for community and economic development.

Additionally, Stellar Pathways promotes local and regional partnerships and assists in implementing sustainable solutions to challenges Indiana rural communities face.

Beside Wabash County, other regions designated as finalists are:

One Dearborn County: Stellar Pathways for Indiana Gateways, including Dearborn County Economic Development Corp., Dearborn County, Dillsboro and Greendale.

Connect LaGrange County, including LaGrange County Economic Development Corp., LaGrange County, Town of LaGrange, Shipshewana and Topeka.

Warren County Region, including Warren County and Williamsport.

Wabash County, IN – On Tuesday, June 18, the Indiana Office of Community and Rural Affairs (OCRA) announced that Wabash County was one of four finalists for the 2024 Stellar Pathways program.

"The Stellar Pathways program empowers communities to invest in transformative improvements, and these four regions have displayed the vision required of a Stellar project," Lt. Gov. Suzanne Crouch, Indiana's Secretary of Agriculture and Rural Development, said in a press release from OCRA. "All four of these teams have not only understood, but embraced the challenge of collaboration which is an important foundation for improving quality of life for Hoosiers in their communities."

Wabash County and its three co-finalists were selected from 19 regions across the State of Indiana who submitted a letter of intent for the program.

The opportunities afforded to Wabash County as a finalist, as well as a potential Stellar Designee, will allow for the county to continue its forward progress to complete many of the projects and priorities outlined in the Imagine One 85 countywide strategic plan. The cooperation already in place countywide as part of Imagine One 85 made the Stellar Pathways collaborative requirement an easy one to fulfill.

As a finalist, Wabash County will receive \$50,000 to prepare a Strategic Investment Plan that will outline the county's goals if named a Stellar Designee. The process will include feedback sessions with members of the OCRA team on the objectives outlined in the letter of intent, workshops, and ongoing consultation with OCRA to fine tune their proposals before submission on November 1, 2024.

The two Stellar Designees, which will be named in January 2025, will be allowed to apply for funding allocations from various state departments and agencies including: OCRA; Indiana Housing & Community Development Authority (IHCDA); Indiana State Department of Agriculture (ISDA); Indiana Destination Development Corporation (IDDC); Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT); Indiana Department of Health (IDOH); and Indiana Department of Natural Resources (IDNR).

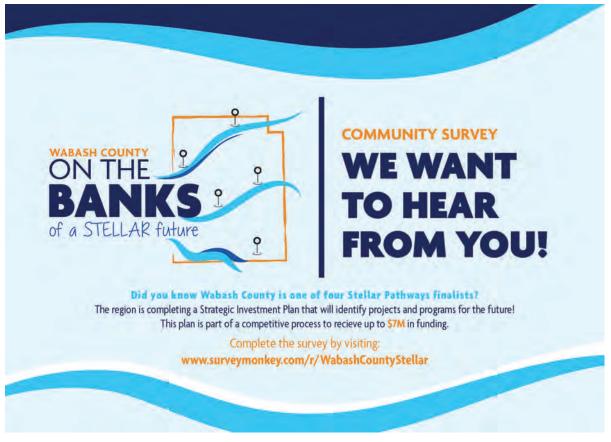
